From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Pastor Tom and I disagree about the Oxford comma. If you are not familiar with that term, it's the comma that occasionally appears in sentences that have a list of more than three items and is placed right before the "and." For example, there is an Oxford comma in "peanut butter, jelly, and bread." Tom is for it. I am against it. (Please feel free to weigh in with your preferences in my office. I'll be putting a "yes Oxford comma" and a "no Oxford comma" sheet on my door and in a week we will see which option is preferred in Avenue Church.)

It is not that I have a gripe with commas. I think commas are critical to good grammar. It changes the meaning of sentences depending on where you put them but the Oxford comma, to me, is unnecessary. Tom disagrees.

It seems a silly thing to debate but Tom grew up using the APA style guide and I was trained using AP style. I believe we would both say we are entrenched in our opinions. However, we don't let it affect our working relationship or the work we do on behalf of Jesus and His church on earth.

Sometimes in our lives it seems that the smallest things turn into the biggest battles. People take stands based on principles, tradition, or simple stubbornness and will not consider an alternate or opposite opinion. What one person considers to be irrelevant can be the very thing that someone else thinks is major. Loading the dishwasher. The way the toilet paper rolls. How much cheese goes on pizza. There are many other examples I am sure you can cite.

It's important to have strong beliefs and hold them closely. As Christians, we believe in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus to bring us to the kingdom eternal. We look to share that good news with people who don't know the grace and mercy of God so that we can give them hope and peace. We look to bring people to Christ through our witness and by being good examples of Christ's love and mercy in this world. As someone in seminary once told me, some people are so lost and in need of hope that I need to do more than preach a

message. I need to be the message.

Notice the words however. "Bring" and "share" and "give" are the ways that we make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world. We don't force or direct or demand that people turn to Christianity. We gently guide them to the truth and the way.

As we move into the new normal of the Trump presidency there will be times and issues that will cause us to be happy or upset, mad or glad. It is important however that we listen to all sides of a debate and give folks with different opinions the respect and acknowledgment of their position, just as it's important they do the same with us.

It is very likely that change is about to come to this nation. I can't predict or speculate what it will be or how it will affect us collectively or individually. Nobody can because only God knows what is to be. But even if we disagree politically we need to remember that we are in this together as children of God.

Romans 14:1 says "As for the one who is weak in faith, welcome him, but not to quarrel over opinions."

Let us remember that we are told to love one and another. By adhering to that commandment, we can bring honor and glory to the Father, Son and Holy Spirit forever and ever. Amen.

(And you are right...there is no Oxford comma in that sentence.)

From the desk of our Conference Director Vicki. . .

#Pen-DelUnity

Many years ago, while serving in Newport, Rhode Island in the Navy, Bo and I joined Calvary UMC and served as High School Youth leaders. One January on Martin Luther King Day, we lingered at breakfast since we did not have to go to work. Bo opened the newspaper and saw that our church was hosting a celebration and luncheon. But, much to our surprise, the paper listed us as providing the special music! Somehow, that detail had slipped through the cracks and no one had actually invited us to sing. But, like the good sailors we were, we got dressed and headed to the church in time to sing. We chose "His Eye Is on the Sparrow," not only because of its history as a Spiritual, but also because we sing our version *a capella* and would require no accompaniment.

At the luncheon following the worship, an older woman approached us with a melancholy smile. She introduced herself and told us that she came today to hear us sing. We had never met her before, so we invited her to tell us more. She explained that her last name was "Stith" and that she had never met any extended family. So she had hoped we were family. An awkward silence followed just for a moment as we all let the reality sink into our hearts. She was an African American woman, which meant that some Stith's in the past had owned or fathered slave children from which this woman descended.

Instead of leaving us stuck there in that place of disorientation and guilt, the woman threw open her arms and hugged us. "We ARE family!" she exclaimed; "The best kind of family!" I remember how my heart just melted at that embrace and comment. This wonderful woman of grace transformed a moment of potential hostility into an opportunity for reconciliation. She reminded us all of that passage from Galatians 3:28: "In Christ's family there can be no division into Jew and non-Jew, slave and free, male and female. Among us you are all equal. That is, we are all in a common relationship with Jesus Christ." (The Message.)

Fast forward twenty-six years later to an exhibit in the newly opened National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC. I had traveled there this past November with the Directors of Connectional Ministry from the North East Jurisdiction. In one of the first exhibit halls, a picture of a slave block in Savannah captured my attention. Bo and I had taken our kids to a plantation in Charleston and learned there that 60% of the slaves entering the US by way of the Transatlantic Slave Trade came through Charleston, with as much as 40% going through Savannah for sale. My heart broke as I came to terms

once again with how very cruel we human beings can be to one another. The museum laid bare the terrible violence that African American people have endured and continue to endure.

As I stood there in silence, I heard a woman behind me quietly weeping. I turned to face her and she said to me: "Recently, I found out that our family came from Savannah. In researching some ancestry, I came across a family who shared our last name. They descended from the same great grandfather; however, they came directly in line from the slave owner and we descended from the slave owner's rape of one of his slaves. I reached out to this family and they refused to recognize that we are kin." I looked this young African American woman in the eye and saw the depth of her pain. Somewhere in the deep of my subconscious, I must have remembered the words of that elderly woman to Bo and me long ago, because without thinking, I responded: "I would claim you as family. In fact, you are my sister." She, like the woman long ago, threw her arms open and embraced me, a stranger whom Christ had made family.

As we conclude our celebration of MLK day this year, I hold these two memories in my prayer, listening for God's invitation to me and to us today. These questions arise: How can I continue to initiate and nurture relationships with people from different cultures than my own? What steps can we take, as individuals and as churches, to live out Paul's vision of being one in Christ, regardless of anything that divides us? Where do we still see racial injustice and how is God calling us to work toward healing those breaches? How will you and your church remember Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s work for racial justice?

Just after I sent out the totals for the *Eternal Gifts* giving campaign, we received several additional pledge cards. I am pleased to report that, with the additional cards included, you all have committed to sharing \$336,174 of the gifts that you have received from God with Avenue Church. To put this number in context, it is a 6.7% increase of over last year when we accumulated pledges of almost \$315,000.
