From the desk of our Pastors . . .



Last weekend, on July 10, I had the privilege of being asked to preach at Asbury United Methodist Church in New Castle while Rev. Tracy Mooney was off with members of her congregation doing a service project in Appalachia. It is always interesting to step into the pulpit of a church that you know little to nothing about because each congregation has their own way of doing things and more importantly, their own unique traits...just like families do.

Considering the events of the past week I felt the Spirit leading me to preach on the issues dividing the nation and the need to come together as one body in Christ. Asbury has a mixed race congregation so it's not surprising they all got behind the message. Bottom line – they "get it." In many ways I was "preaching to the choir" in that this was not a new concept or something they needed to be swayed to accept. Asbury is eagerly devoted to the commandment of loving our neighbors as ourselves.

But then I had a second request and I had even less idea of what I was walking into. Tracey had asked me about a month ago to sub for her so I had been planning on it for some time. However, on the Thursday before my sermon she sent me a text asking if I would also fill in for her at the Ghana United Methodist Church which meets in Wilmington. Local pastors from the Wilmington District take turns preaching and serving communion there and it was her week. She had forgotten to ask me while making arrangements for her church back in June to cover that need as well.

After getting permission from our District Superintendent to be able to consecrate the elements and serve communion, I agreed to do it. All I was told about this group is that I would be fed in ways I never expected.

So after finishing up at Asbury I got in my car, set the GPS, and off I went to the Ghana United Methodist Church. It turns out they meet in a conference room of a warehouse in an industrial complex. As I also discovered, they are not the only church that meets in that same

area as I ended up at a different church for about 20 minutes before we (the pastor of the church I was at and myself) figured out I was in the wrong place.

When I got to the Ghana Church, where the service was well under way, I had about 10 seconds to take a quick breathe before I gave the message because I was so late. I had not prepared a different sermon for this group because to be honest I had not thought the message would be inappropriate for any audience. However, as I stood in front of this congregation completely made up of African Americans and immigrants from Ghana I could not help but ask myself how they would react to my take on what had happened in Minnesota, Louisiana and Dallas.

Considering our different circumstances I wondered if anything I had to say would be believed. I came from a background that had never experienced what they deal with and I had no idea if I would have any credibility in their community. I have never had to doubt the local authorities, fear for my son in the justice system or wonder who might be out to harm me because of the color of my skin. I come from a family where careers in law enforcement is a family tradition. Of my six male cousins, four are police officers so most people would understand my respect and admiration for what our police do in all communities. (Three of my cousins, and an uncle are/were NYPD and the other cousin is a detective in the Allentown, PA police.)

So while I was very different in many aspects, we were all equal in the most important way. We are all equal in the eyes of Christ because we are his beloved children, regardless of race, nationality, age or economics. Maybe because I was so out of my comfort zone this message was received by the Ghana church even more enthusiastically than the congregation at Asbury.

Here was a complete stranger preaching to them about being one in Christ. I have no idea what other Pastors have shared in the past but considering how divided we can be in this nation over race relations it would not have surprised me to learn the Ghana Church was wondering where my head would be on this matter.

My heart however, and the hearts of every person I came in contact with that day was with Jesus Christ who told us to love each other. NO EXCEPTIONS.

Tracey was right. I was fed by this experience in ways I had never expected. I was humbled that the Spirit led me to that place with the message I had prepared. I was grateful that the words coming from my mouth were well received at both churches and as such, I have hope that we can and will get past the problems we have in this country.

I also know without any doubt that Avenue would have agreed with my message as well. That makes three for three the number of churches I was in contact with who accept and live out the message of Christ to love everyone as God loves us. Those are pretty good odds and I have faith that churches across the world from all Christian denominations, if they are truly following the teachings of our Savior, will feel the same way.


The message and teaching of loving one and other as Christ tells us to love is our foundation. Now we have to turn our attention to making sure justice is done. That means justice for every victim and that includes all who were wrongfully killed. But it also means making sure that accusations, made in the emotional heat of the moment, do not cause people to do or say things that incite more violence. "With justice for all" is not only a Christian virtue but an American one as well.

Micah 6:8 reminds us that God "has told you O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Things are going to get even crazier over the next few weeks as we go into the political national conventions and then move into campaigning for the presidential election. It also makes for the perfect conditions to witness to the love of Christ. We MUST be the examples of Christ's grace and mercy to all people. Through our witnessing to God's love in this world, we will be able to not only help heal our country but make it stronger as a result.


