From the desk of our Pastors . . .

So the Olympics are coming up. I admit that I am an Olympics addict. On August 5 at 8:00 I can promise you that unless something super serious comes up, I will be on my sofa in front of my television watching the opening ceremonies from Rio de Janeiro as if it were the Super Bowl. There will be snacks and sodas and it will be an event for me, just like it was with London and Beijing and Atlanta and every other Olympic games – winter and summer – that I can remember.

For me, there are several very unique things about it being in Rio. The first is that because I have spent a large amount of time down there I have some perspective on where venues are and how the logistics may have to work. Brazil is an "interesting" country in which to get things done. It's a nation with a lot of major issues so please pray for all of the citizens. This event, along with the Paralympics, is going to be very taxing on the infrastructure of the city and I hope that all goes well.

On a more upbeat note I am very excited that there is only one hour of time difference. The events will pretty much be in real time.

I am not much of a "sports snob" when it comes to the Olympics. I will be just as excited to view the archery competition as I will be to see if Michael Phelps can sweep gold medals in this unprecedented fifth Olympics. I'll watch swimming, track and field, volleyball, golf and the other two new sports – sevens rugby and kitesurfing. I don't even know what sevens rugby is but I'll be trying to catch it

when it is broadcast to find out. I'll watch basketball, fencing and water polo. And yes, I'll watch gymnastics but with one exception. I cannot bring myself to watch the balance beam.

There is just something about that discipline that freaks me out. These little tiny women do things that appear to defy gravity and certainly defy logic, at least in my mind. It scares me to think of one of them falling and hitting their head. They do these tumbling passes of back flips and twists and jumps and things named after former Olympians that cause me to have cramps in my muscles just by looking at them.

I seriously have to look away during those routines and it is best if I don't even listen because the sports commentators get so excited about what is to come. They are always saying things like "get ready for this triple back flip with two twists on a blind landing...which she had trouble with in warm-up." It just gets to me. I pray there is not an accident because it would be on instant replay about 87 times.

But what really gets to me is that after the countless hours of practice and sweat and all the other sacrifices that go into becoming an Olympic caliper athlete, it will take just one fall off a piece of wood that is 16' long and 4" wide for their chances of a medal to be gone. One momentary mistake and a group of judges will have the audacity to consider them a failure in their quest for perfection. Eight human beings, capable of making mistakes themselves, will determine the fate of these women who have put their entire lives into this very moment. That just breaks my heart when it happens and I can't watch. I'll be in the kitchen making more snacks or cleaning my countertops or something.

And the judges do it with such precision. They don't even show compassion or understanding. They simply deduct points for mistakes, lower the value of a routine based on skills completed and basically have the destiny of these people in their hands. And all it takes is one little mistake to completely derail the entire competition for these athletes. One mistake, done in front of billions of people, and they are forever relegated to being "the agony of defeat."

This is one of the reasons I am so grateful it is God that is "scoring" us and not a panel of hard core judges. I am grateful that God sees the best in all of us and forgives the rest of what we do. In the eyes of God, we are always scoring a 10 because the creator loves us so very much.

That does not mean we are perfect. We are far from perfect. But God loves us perfectly.

Romans 8:37-39 tells us that "in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor

rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, no height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

No matter what we do or how badly we mess up we have a God who loves us unconditionally. Jesus will guide us and help to correct our actions when we go the wrong way but the Savior will never abandon us. God loves all of us all the time – NO MATTER WHAT.

We are going to mess up plenty of times in this life but God will love us through it. The Creator will never look at our mistakes and count us out or consider us a failure. Just knowing that God is with us, loving us, beside us, and giving us grace and mercy makes us the biggest winners of all.
