Falls can be debilitating for more than just Olympic athletes. Over this past year we have had scores of our church family take tumbles that caused some serious wounds and bone breaks. Thankfully, after time and care, most have healed successfully. There are still some of our members who are recovering from these incidents so please keep them in your prayers.

But perhaps the most "famous" fall belongs to Adam and Eve. Because of their disobedience in eating from the tree of knowledge they were cast out of the Garden of Eden. Subsequently all generations of humanity have had to deal with the outcome. The Doctrine of Original Sin could be a small group study for a month but suffice it to say that different theories abound about what effect it has had on our eternal relationship with God.

In our own lives we figuratively fall every day. While we are on a spiritual journey towards perfection we have not yet arrived. Our

hearts may want to follow God's commandments and our desire is to not sin. Yet we still fall short of that goal.

We also stumble on our spiritual path thanks to trials and tribulations. Life brings times of pain and concerns and there are occasions when that brings us to our knees. As humans we have plenty of reasons to fall.


But it is in those falls when we see God holding us up and lifting us when falter. It may be hard to deal with the outcome of those slipups but when we recognize what God is doing for us in the midst of our difficulties we recognize that we are blessed to have a Creator who walks with us through all of our ups and downs.

Psalm 145:14 says "the Lord upholds all who fall and lifts up all who are bowed down." The Lord never lets us walk alone and when we face our mistakes and issues – both of which can cause us to fall – we have a savior who is there to help us up and keep moving forward. We learn from our falls and we go on. Having our Savior loving us through it all is the best prize this world could ever give.

From the desk of our Conference Director Vicki . . .

My daughter, Joy, and I sat at the dining room table after dinner recently having conversation about race. We began with systemic racism, which the Black Lives Matter movement wants to address, and moved to police officers and individual attitudes. We arrived quickly at the prevailing feelings in our society of fear and defensiveness and weariness, and a sense that we remain stuck hiding behind these walls. Joy expressed a feeling of hopelessness, as if anything we do will be too little, too late. So, we explored that topic for a while and came to a place of challenge and commitment: What are we each doing personally to address the issues of racism and fear and break down barriers to build relationships of trust? And what steps are we willing to take? In that place, we found hope, a hope which reminded me of one of my favorite quotes: "Hope arouses, as nothing else can arouse, a passion for the possible." (William Sloane Coffin) And, we know that "All things are possible with God." (Mark 10:27)

Yet, even with that hope, peace seems far away. We get glimpses of it, though, whenever people take the risk of listening to "the other," their enemies or people who do not agree with them. We tend to stick with people who agree with our point of view, or else we avoid the topics. However, we can only hope for peace when we cross those lines. Desmond Tutu, a Bishop in South Africa, wrote: "If you want peace, you don't talk to your friends. You talk to your enemies." The work of peace is not for the faint of heart. Still, God calls us to that work, to be ambassadors for Christ who is our peace, as he tears down the dividing walls of hostility. (See Ephesians 2.)

I read a wonderful story demonstrating how these dividing walls can come tumbling down. Perhaps some of you have heard it, by now. In Wichita, Kansas, police officers and protesters from the Black Lives Matter movement came together for a feast on Sunday, the same day a man killed three police officers in Baton Rouge. At a Black Lives Matter protest last week, Police Chief Gordon Ramsay met with some of the leaders to hear their concerns. Notice, he first listened! Then, he suggested that instead of another protest, which leaders had

scheduled for Sunday, the police force and community come together for a barbeque. The Black Lives Matter leaders and community responded positively, with over one thousand in attendance.

At the picnic, called "First Steps Cookout," the police cooked and served hamburgers and sat with members of the community, starting to build and renew relationships. One woman said that she felt she could introduce police to her teenaged son, and they could get to know him as a person, instead of a threat. Police officers felt that the community also got to know them as human beings, instead of only seeing the uniform. The police held a question and answer session afterwards to continue to listen to the frustration of the community over unequal treatment. Chief Ramsay said: "This isn't something we're going to change overnight or tonight. It's just going to take continual effort on everybody's part. And work on policy changes, relationships. And that's what's going to get to the heart of the issues." Can you glimpse the hope there?

Ultimately, these issues that divide us are heart issues, are they not? They are spiritual issues which can only be solved through the grace of God: giving us the courage to trust again, even after our trust has been repeatedly broken; changing our attitudes toward one another as we learn to grow in relationships; and strengthening us to address the harder issue of systemic racism, our policies and practices which favor one group of people over another. This work of righteousness (setting our relationships in right order and alignment) takes hard work, but it does bring hope! And it begins with each one of us.

So, I ask you today: What are YOU doing to tear down the dividing walls of hostility between racial groups and law enforcement? What is your CHURCH doing to build trust within the community between disparate groups? Lyndon B. Johnson said: "Peace is a journey of a thousand miles and it must be taken one step at a time." What step will you take to join me on this journey of peace?

Psalm 85 reminds us that God: "...speaks peace to his people and to his faithful ones. Don't let them return to foolish ways...Faithful love and truth have met; righteousness and peace have kissed...Righteousness walks before God, making a road for his steps." Let's create a road for God's steps toward righteousness (right relationships) and peace.


