From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Now that the 2016 Olympics are over, the City of Rio de Janeiro is starting to get back to normal. Yes, the Paralympics will take place in September but not as many countries will participate because they simply can't afford it. That is a shame because the competitors are amazing and the competitions will be contested just as hard. I'm sure Brazil will be ready to handle these games as they were in August, but being smaller means that not as many people will be in town for the event. So slowly, Rio will get back to its usual rhythm and daily routines.

The touristy areas around Copacabana Beach and Ipanema will continue to be busy and the more exclusive neighborhoods of Rio will settle into the day-to-day business of living life. But in the favelas the goal will be to continue trying to get out of what are the improvised regions of the city.

A favela is a slum found within the cities of Brazil. With little to no infrastructure and less in the way of economic opportunities, the millions of people who live in the neighborhoods of the favelas find themselves merely existing at times. With the density of the population continuing to grow there is no way to expand out. There is no room for parks or green areas for the children to play so the most popular pastime forces the kids to look up. They participate in kite fighting. If you drive along the highways of Rio and look at the sky above the favelas you can see a multitude of kites in an intricate dance around each other. The idea is to twist and turn your kites so that it cuts the string of an opponent's kite by using the line holding your kite. The tether that holds the kites is usually covered in a mixture of glue and crushed glass so that it can "saw" another line. Whoever cuts the line of their opponent first . . . wins. Sadly, cut hands and fingers are the usual side effects of this "game."

Brazil is not the only country where kite fighting takes place. It is also common in Pakistan, India, Korea and Afghanistan among other countries. But it takes on a special importance in Brazil where the children consider it a metaphor for raising themselves out of the current situation they are in with the hopes that someday it will be better for them.

How much better would it be for them to raise their eyes to the sky and hope in Christ? Acts 7:55 tells how Stephen "full of the Holy Spirit looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God."

It is only through God that true hope will come. As we consider and pray for our brothers and sisters around the world, let us say a special prayer for the children of the favelas in Brazil. Let us pray that those kites are just that - a child's toy and not that thing on which hopes and dreams are projected. Our prayers lifted before God will hopefully include that all eyes as well as hearts and minds be lifted to the Almighty Lord who will bring these children and all generations out of oppression.

To God be the glory forever and ever.

The Olympic Spirit

Periodically this week, I have taken the opportunity to read about the Olympics in Rio and to watch the videos of a few of the events. We have certainly seen some poor sportsmanship among the athletes. From the public shaming of Gabby Douglas, to the Egyptian athlete refusing to shake hands with his Israeli opponent, to the constant replay of the diver's belly flop, the Olympics and the public reactions have showcased our human condition. When we train athletes from such an early age and pour inhumane expectations on them, we can forget that they are human beings and not machines. This aggressive culture breeds self-centeredness and a national zeal that lures us into forgetting that the Olympics are games, sports, fun contests of athleticism.

Yet, grace comes crashing into even the most competitive of moments. We witnessed that in the 5000 meter race. Two women, Abbey D'Agostino (USA) and Nikki Hamblin (New Zealand), collided sending both of them sprawling on the track. They had 2000 meters to go and the crash dashed their hopes of qualifying for the final event. But, in that moment, we witnessed a reminder of our common humanity. Abbey D'Agostino got up and began to run again when she noticed Nikki still on the ground. So, Abbey turned back. She gently helped Nikki to her feet and said, "Get up. We have to finish this." Nikki rose to start running and saw that Abbey had fallen again, so she returned to help her. After she completed her run, she saw that though Abbey had sustained a more serious injury, she still ran on. Nikki waited for her at the finish line and hugged this woman whom she had never met.

Later in an interview, Nikki described that event as the defining moment of her Olympic experience. She remarked that long after she forgot her time or her splits, she would never forget the kindness of Abbey. Declaring her a sign of the Olympic spirit, Nikki raved about her newfound friend, this "amazing woman" who demonstrated what the Olympics mean. She stated: "I'm never going to forget that moment. When someone asks me what happened in Rio in 20 years' time, that's my story . . . [Abbey] shaking my shoulder, saying 'Come on, get up'." Even though the two finished last, the Olympic officials will allow them to compete in the final race. As I reflected on this story today, I remembered a Bible verse one of the Conference staff referenced in our weekly worship this morning. Romans 8:5 states, "People whose lives are based on selfishness think about selfish things, but people whose lives are based on the Spirit think about things that are related to the Spirit." These two athletes definitely reflected the "things that are related to the Spirit."

Of course, I also thought about the church. We all have a race that is set before us, a journey toward God which we run in community but also on our own. Hebrews 12:1 reminds us: "So then let's also run the race that is laid out in front of us, since we have such a great cloud of witnesses surrounding us. Let's throw off any extra baggage, get rid of the sin that trips us up..." Often sin trips us up as we run our race of faith. Yet, we do not run alone. We have other runners, "a great cloud of witnesses," both those who live and those who have died in Christ, cheering us on, helping us to get up and finish our race.

Yet how do we treat people whose sins have tripped them up? We all know we have fallen because of sin, but some people's sins seem so obvious to us, tempting us to say, "Well, at least I am not..." (You can fill in the blank for yourself.) I remember reading a story in *What's So Amazing about Grace*, by Phillip Yancey, where a prostitute confessed to a pastor. When the pastor suggested she attend church, she replied: "I already feel horrible about myself! Why would I go there? They would only make me feel worse." Ouch.

What would people in your community say about your church congregation? Do you sigh in relief that at least you remain on your feet for now? Do you keep running, oblivious of the pain of those around you? Do you focus so much on what feeds your needs that you miss the opportunity to assist others? How might God be calling you to stop, to see the pain of someone around you, to go to them (setting aside your own needs), to gently touch them and help them to their feet? Who is that injured runner in your life who needs your encouragement to get up and try again, even when sin has tripped them up? What sin tends to trip you up? How can your awareness of that sin help you remain humble and more willing to help others?

I pray that this Olympic story may remind us to live our vision as an Annual Conference to be "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ in today's world." May our connection with the Spirit keep us aware of others around us who remain in pain and need the hope which only Jesus can bring. May each of us listen moment by moment to hear the Spirit's invitation to encourage others on the journey of faith, whether they have not yet begun, or recently tripped, or are nearing the end. Let's be that cloud of witnesses.
