From the desk of our Pastors . . .

A few weeks ago I was on a plane from Detroit into Philadelphia. It was a commuter jet and there were only 50 seats on the aircraft. Since it was about half full, it was an easy boarding process and we pulled away from the jetway right on time. The flight from Detroit is just a little over an hour so the passengers were expecting a quick, painless and efficient flight.

Imagine our surprise when we didn't get the "usual" pre-flight announcements. We got the speech about the "nearest exit possibly being behind you" and the reminder to "secure your own oxygen mask first"" but then we got the detailed directions on how to "assume the brace position in case of a crash landing" complete with a rehearsal. We practiced not once but twice. If it was someone's first time on a plane, it would have panicked them completely. It confused the rest of us who basically have the pre-flight announcements memorized. Needless to say, by the time we took off everyone was feeling a little uneasy.

That concern only got worse in-flight because we were slowed down by air traffic control and we looked as if we were going to be delayed by almost an hour. For some reason the flight attendant took it upon herself to get on the radio and explain to the entire plane how we were "going to be late, how being such a small plane with such few passengers we were not a priority for landing, that anyone with connections less than two hours would probably miss them, that if you were going out of the international terminal (like the five people going on to Greece) you were really in trouble"... and the list went on and on and on. The one "positive" thing the flight attendant came up with was "if you are lucky and your outgoing flight is also delayed, you might make it."

I was shocked. The poor woman sitting in front of me with her small daughter, was panicking because she was from Greece trying to get home.

Than to make matters worse, she had us practice the brace position one more time before landing. In all my years of flying and as often as I have traveled around the world, I have never had a situation like this come up. By the time we were on the ground and at the gate, we were only 20 minutes late. There was an excellent chance that everyone could have made their connections.

Those of us who were terminating our travels in Philadelphia stayed on the plane so that everyone trying to catch another flight could get off first. That left about 10 people holding back on the aircraft and when it was "just us" and the crew one of the other passengers asked the flight attendant in a "rather pointed" manner what she had been thinking to say and do what she did.

"I was only trying to be practical," she said. "Why try and pretend that everything would be fine when there was such a chance of things going wrong?"

All I could think was that I was very glad to be part of the kingdom of God where the news is all good! Things on the earth are not perfect and bad things happen but the final outcome for those who believe in Christ as Savior is all good. Acts 8:12 says "But when they believed Philip preaching the good news about the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were being baptized, men and women alike."

There is a lot of bad news in the world and so many people are trying to cause others to fear what is happening. What a joy it is for those of us who can share the good news of Christ in this world. As we kick off another season of ministries and events in this church, let us all remember that we have the ability to bring people into the light and the way by sharing the good news of what God is doing in this world.

From the desk of our Conference Director Vicki . . .

Prayer as Connection

Over the past twelve years, we have camped in 32 states in our little pop-up trailer. A couple of months ago, we decided the time had come to trade it in, as the cost to repair it exceeded its value. So, we bought a "couple's coach" camping trailer, a trailer designed for just two people. On our first camping trip with my daughter, she said: "Nothing says you are welcome here like an invitation to sleep on the table." Although I grieve the passing of an era of camping with my children, I look forward to continued adventures with Bo. When a friend recently asked how I liked the new camper, I replied: "I love it! I do not necessarily love the camper itself, but I love the experiences it provides." We can travel to new places and still feel at home.

We used to store the pop-up in the garage, but the new trailer does not fit. So, we found a rental place to store it. Last week, the owner of the storage unit called to tell us that our camper, along with five others stored there, had been robbed. The person took a crow bar to the door to pry it open. The police had apprehended the man walking down the street with a wheelbarrow full of items, from DVD's to a television. We expected the worst.

Imagine our surprise, then, when we went to take a look at the camper and the inventory of the missing items included: 12 DVD's, two extension cords, two pillows, a blanket, a little cooler, all of our spices, most of our toiletries—shampoo and soap and shaving items, a chess set, and some canned tuna. Who in the world steals those types of items? Then it hit us: a homeless person steals those types of items. Even though the damage to the camper far surpasses the value of the items taken, we found ourselves praying for this man.

At the police station, we learned a bit more about him. His name is Jason. He escaped from a prison work-release, and possibly was living with a friend or on the streets. Bo and I joked about putting a sign on the trailer saying: "If you need anything in here, please call us and we will give it to you." Still, our hearts ached for Jason. What struggles was he enduring? What events led him to this point of desperation? Does he struggle with an addiction? Did he ever have a support system to help him make the right choices, secure a job, etc.?

More importantly, we asked ourselves how God wants us to respond to

Jason. Somehow, our lives have been connected, first through this robbery, and now through prayer. What does the Realm of God look like in this situation? Might the Spirit want to use this event to draw Jason away from a destructive life and toward healing and wholeness? What does Jesus call us to do with this connection?

Although we do not have answers yet, we have thought about writing to him in prison. We want to attend his trial, if we are able, to establish a relationship with him. And, we want to gather a community together to surround Jason with support when he gets out of prison again. What sort of support might he need? I can think of a few: counseling, drug/alcohol recovery, education, job training, vocational support, prayer, and a community of people willing to offer friendship, time, and grace to Jason. Since he has returned to prison, we have some time to gather these resources and continue in prayer for him.

His action demonstrates that, although God longs for us to live in community, these communities have become disconnected for a multitude of reasons. Yet, our sense of God's vision for our conference (Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ to today's world) encourages us to work to reconnect those who feel lost. Jesus explained this desire in Luke 15: 1-10, saying that the shepherd would leave the 99 in the wilderness to go after the lost one. Clearly, Jason has lost his way. But, because of the disconnectedness of our community, which leads some to have much and others to have nothing, we have also lost our way. Jesus invites us to offer hope to those, like Jason, who may feel hopeless and display their hopelessness through their behavior.

So, I invite you to take a prayer walk through your community and the community surrounding your church building. Where do you see evidence of disconnection as a community? Who seems lost and hopeless? How might God be calling you to live differently so that all people might experience the hope of Jesus Christ? What action, specifically, is the Holy Spirit prompting you to take? Let's covenant to pray together the phrase from "The Lord's Prayer": "Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven," as we remain open to the calling of God for our churches to offer the hope of Jesus Christ to today's world.
