From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Last week was my final (currently) scheduled trip for the year. I was out in Long Beach, CA, with the team I usually work with when we do crisis drills and we were working with some old friends at BP Oil. We were simulating the response to an oil spill off the coast of California where, if this had been an actual oil spill, the sludge would have made landfall between Malibu and Santa Monica.

The job of my team is to act as the media. We literally spend two days "pretending" to be the press, calling the JIC (joint information center), interviewing the incident commanders and public affairs staff, writing fake stories based on their comments and basically making their lives miserable. We operate just as the real media would...calling at all hours of the day and night, overloading the team working media relations, thus forcing them to take their game up several notches. We knock them with as many as 50 calls an hour because in the event of a real disaster, every media outlet in the world would be calling them. They need to be ready.

In my first hour of the drill I "played" characters from ABC News, the New York Times, CNN, the Associated Press (AP), the Wall Street Journal, the BBC, Huffington Post, and a plethora of other media outlets. I have different questions for each news outlet and I use different names so when the BP team calls back the "newsroom" and asks for a specific person, I know which character I have to jump into.

"Rebecca Smith" from the WSJ always asks how much the clean-up is costing the company and how it will affect their long term financial health. "Jennifer Hansen" from Scientific America asks technical questions about the oil skimming process, equipment needs and the possibility of insitu burning. Depending on the scope of the drill we may also "role play" environmental groups, elected officials and local populations seeking information and financial restitution. This time I also stood in for Senator Barbara Boxer. Also in this drill, because we were in the LA area, we also took on the characters of reporters with Entertainment Tonight and TMZ. We even go so far as to pretend to be producers from the late night shows and the Comedy Channel seeking information for the joke writers.

Then after we "interview" the folks from BP, we write short news articles and post them to an internal website so that the response team can see what type of media coverage their comments will produce.

The group I work with includes a cameraman from CNN, the head of public affairs for the

Astronaut office of NASA, and a former PAO for the Pacific Fleet who do this as a freelance opportunity, among other very talented and experienced communicators. We are affectionately known as the "Snark Squad" or the PITA team (pain in the ***) by those we drill.

Our goal is never to hurt anyone. Our mission is to train and prepare those who will be on the front lines. There are times when those are hard lessons. For example, the woman who very calmly informed the "reporter" from the Wall Street Journal that BP has a "very strong tradition of paying for environmental damage" did not see (in the heat of the moment) how BP having a history of oil spills, large settlements and loss of life could be the best position to have. I have wonderful traditions around Christmas and thanksgiving but if there have been enough spills for there to be a tradition, there was a serious problem.

Most of my career was spent preparing spokespeople to be in front of a reporter which I always said was easier than being in front of one myself. Thankfully I did none of the on-camera or spokesperson stuff. But my team spends two days, pretty much non-stop, working in shifts (because the worldwide press is always on deadline somewhere), making sure that other people are ready for their 15 minutes of fame. After the drill is done, we do a hot wash. It's basically a debrief where we as the reporters walk through the ups and downs of what happened and why something worked or didn't.

It's kind of interesting at the end of the drill to finally meet the people we have driven insane for two days. They don't know who we are and we don't know who they are. The drill took over the entire Hilton Hotel in Long Beach so we had passed each other in the line for food or on the way to the restroom but we were not identified as to the roles we played. As far as the drill team knows, we are simply folks badged to "truth and control" so we could just as easily be on the finance or logistics teams.

So at the hot wash for this drill we were not stunned to hear that we had put this crowd through the ringer. As we were going around the room I was surprised to hear one woman say that she had literally prayed that the whole thing would be over quickly and she was asking God right up to the end to "make it all okay."

I don't ever think anything is a wasted prayer but in this case, her prayers had been answered even before the drill started. It was only two days and no matter what, at the end of the two days, it was going to be over. In real life, like with the Deepwater Horizon disaster, it went on for months at the same pace. This was only 48 hours and we did quick, superficial media stories. In the event of the real thing, it would have been much more intense.

But more importantly, the whole goal of the exercise was to make things okay. We were there to train, teach and prepare the media relations and communications teams for what to expect in the event there was a real incident. Because she didn't see the big picture, she missed how her prayers were answered before it even started.

How many times do we do that in our prayer life? We ask for something simply to make our lives easier in the moment when we fail to see the bigger picture. I know I ask for Chris to get good grades in college because I don't want to go through the hassle of dealing with him if he doesn't. In reality, I should pray that he learns the important stuff, stays safe and healthy, and if college is not right for him that the Lord open doors to point us to where he should be.

Can we all take this week to look back on our prayer life and determine which areas need to be adjusted? Scripture reminds us in 1 John 5: 14-15 "this is the confidence we have toward Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have the requests that we have asked of Him."

Hindsight is always 20-20 and at the time we are going through something we don't always know that we have been blessed with an answer that far exceeds anything we could have imagined. The woman who prayed for the drill to be over quickly is far more blessed by the experiences of learning than simply by getting through a difficult time. In all ways may we seek to find those blessings...and learnings...in our lives.

From the desk of our Bishop . . .

African American Museum Opens in Washington DC

Last week I attended the first board meeting of the quadrennium of the General Board of Church and Society. I am proud to be serving for another four years on this agency that speaks for issues of faith, justice and peace for our denomination. At the end of our 3 days of conversation, presentations, worship and organizing (last Friday) a group of us walked down the mall in Washington, DC to the site of the African American Museum that was to open on Saturday. People had already gathered even a day before and excitement and joy was in the air. We paused to pray outside the huge bronze-colored building and a several African American visitors joined us and said "we are with you."



I invite everyone to make the journey to Washington to see this museum. At the dedication on Saturday President Obama stated "The African American story, perhaps needs to be told now more than ever." This is unquestionably true in the wake of more police shootings of African Americans in Tulsa and Charlotte. We need to hear the stories of the lives of real people.

In a recent Podcast from Ministry Matters entitled "Terence Crutcher, Police Violence and Racism in America (September 23, 2016) Shane Raynor, the editor of "News and Religion" interviewed several church leaders about what the church needs to be doing. Rev. Hannah Bonner, an elder in Eastern PA Conference on extension ministry who works at a faith community in Houston, TX known as "The Shout" shared about her experience working with the community after the death of Sandra Bland in what was said to have been a suicide in prison after a traffic stop. Rev. Bonner said that one very important thing we can be doing is focus on the lives of the African American people and not on their death. We should take time to learn about their life and legacy and not just about how they died.

An important response to the horrors of this continual plague of violence is for white people to learn, listen and understand with open hearts. This museum gives people an opportunity to understand the history. Visitors will experience the journey from slavery to civil rights to Black Lives Matter and hear famous and obscure stories of triumph and tragedy. May this prepare the church to offer what it uniquely brings to the world: the message that all people are inherently and divinely created and that everyone is deserving of respect and justice. This is the church's prophetic word for the world today and it appears there is a war going on with those who wish to maintain oppressive systems of inequality.


