From the desk of our Pastors . . .

As you read last week I had to make a mad dash out to Los Angeles to do some quick training of a management team who is looking to bump up their investor relations program. I was working with two “high powered” attorneys who had the hard work of making sure all the executives were well versed on the various aspects of Regulation Fair Disclosure. Then it was my job to go in and drill the management team on what they could and could not say, and teach them on when and how it was acceptable to share data.

The general rule of Regulation FD is that “whenever a public company discloses material, non-public information to securities market professionals or holders of the Company’s securities who may trade on the basis of the information, the Company must also disclose that information to the public.” There are all kinds of black and white, but mainly gray areas, of what is considered “material” and “intentional disclosure” and other legal elements of Regulation FD. If you are really interested ask an attorney or a securities professional. Unless you are looking for a quick nap I would not suggest reading all the regulations yourself.

Not to get into all the details but considering how easy it is to get sideways with the Securities Exchange Commission and other regulatory agencies, this is important information for senior spokespeople of any publically traded company to have. Needless to say, the three of us doing the training had the complete and total attention of our “students.”

In no way do I wish to dismiss the serious nature of what we were doing or the consequences if something was to go wrong. But as I was flying back I could not help but think about whether those same executives took the lessons of the Bible as seriously. That led me to wonder how many people in the overall population would consider the direction that Jesus gives us to be as critical as the

laws and regulations we have in this nation.

Scripture tells us we are to follow the laws of the land. Romans 13: 1 says, “Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God.” Titus 3:1 reads, “Remind them to be submissive to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work.” Clearly the Bible is telling us to follow the law.

We should follow federal, state and local laws for many reasons, not the least is that it keeps society from turning into a chaotic mess. However the Word never says it’s one or the other – Jesus or the nation. Yes, we are told to follow the law but Jesus also gives us commandments to love one and other and be focused on the Lord.

I would like to believe that those executives were in church on Sunday paying as close attention to the lessons their pastors or priests were giving them as they were to what my teaching team was saying about how to stay out of trouble. I know for a fact they were not in church as long as we were in that meeting.

I will never know if my “trainees” got the message God wanted them to get this past Sunday. I do know they are clear on how much jail time and fines they could be facing if they mess up Regulation FD.

So now I’m curious, How many people in Avenue would be willing to sit through a similar meeting of powerpoints and coffee for several hours to hear about Jesus. Anyone up for a two hour meeting on Sunday?

To God be the glory forever and ever.

From the desk of our Bishop. . .

Saints

We arrived at my cousin's grand-daughter's wedding about an hour early last Saturday. We drove from our house in Phoenixville to Pittsburgh early in the morning and did not know exactly how long it would take to get there. When we finally found the enormous St. Stanislaus Kostka Catholic Church in downtown Pittsburgh we had plenty of time to explore the grand cathedral. It was ornate in many ways: a high arched ceiling, marble pillars and numerous statues.

The real glory of the building, however, was in the stained-glass windows. Each displayed a picture of the Holy Family, an apostle or some Catholic saint. It has been said that saints have the light of Christ shining through them. Indeed, capturing the afternoon sun, these windows, with their gleaming bold colors, were a luminous feast for the eye.

But as I looked at them closely, I felt all that glory was a bit "unreal." The lives of these saints depicted in the windows, at least the ones I knew, were not so glamorous and victorious in real life. Their ministries were plagued by struggles, persecution, sacrificial deprivation and martyrdom.

But there they all were in this church sanctuary looking very perfect, bright and cleaned up. Even the statue of Jesus on the cross did not look too terribly gruesome. I'm not being critical really, because for all of this, I am grateful. In this stylized beauty of "life on the other side," after all the suffering and death, we find the redemptive lesson of the Christian walk.

I Peter 4:12 states "Dear friends, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that has come on you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you." The Christian life is one of struggle. God's people are in direct opposition to the powers and principalities of this world; and there will be personal suffering and persecution. It is one of the "givens" in our faith journey.

Joan D. Chittiste is a Roman Catholic nun and writer. In her book *Scarred by Struggle, Transformed by Hope*, she describes a huge disappointment in her young life, when she was denied by her order the opportunity to study for a Master's Degree in writing. Instead she was sent to work at a camp.

She writes, “Struggle is a fact of life. What we struggle against, what we struggle for, what we with struggle with, all test and hone us. It is the resistance itself that seasons us.” She goes on to even describe suffering as an “unsparing lesson but a necessary gift.” (page 34)

The saints of old knew mighty struggles, and so will we. The light in the stained-glass windows remind us of the enduring presence of Christ in our lives, even in the midst of struggle. He offers us the radiant light that darkness cannot overcome (John 1:5). And that light reminds us of the final victory we will surely achieve in the next life.

As we prepare for and celebrate All Saints Day, let us keep in mind the worthy saints, that great “cloud of witnesses,” who cheer us on from the resplendent windows of heaven’s balcony, as we struggle down here in the dim shadows below.

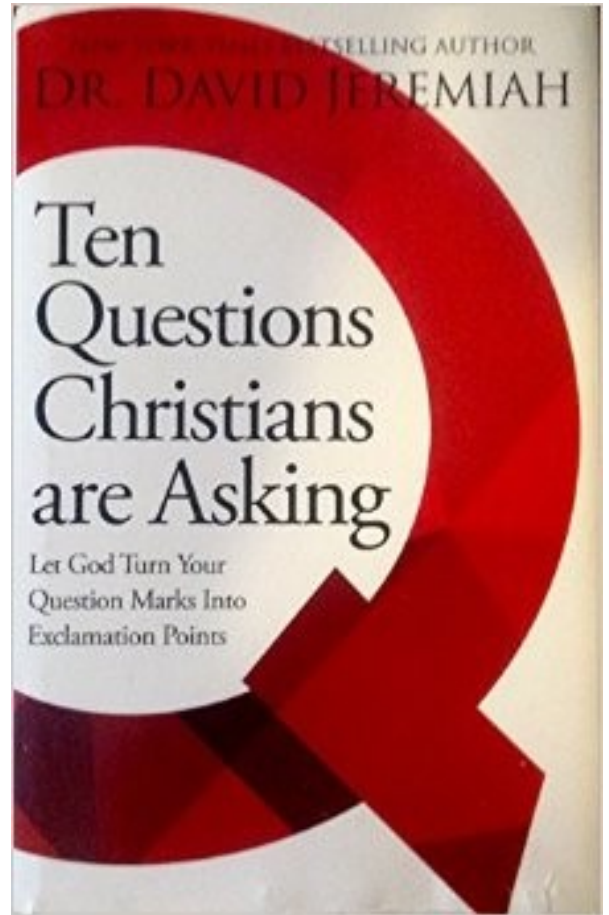

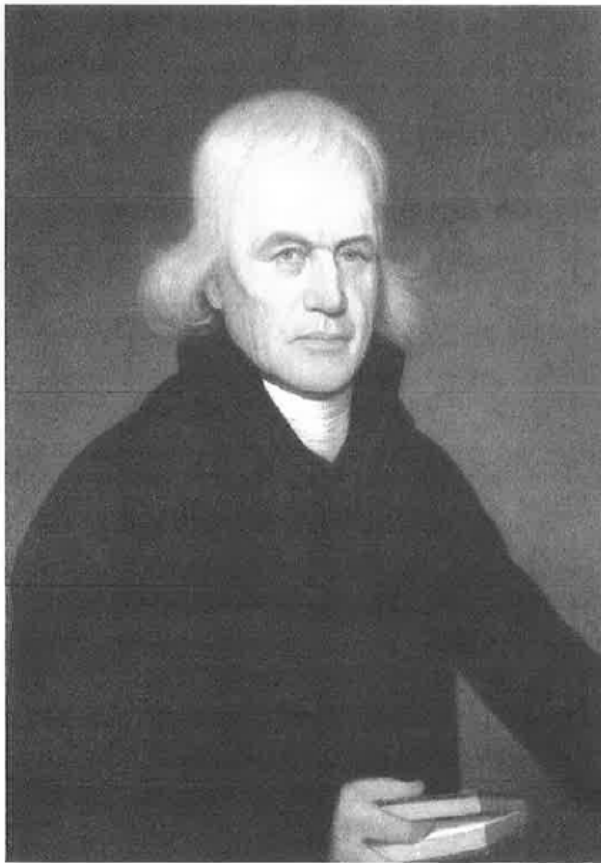

Barratt's Celebrates Francis Asbury's 200th

This year marks the 200th anniversary of the death of the man who probably did more to shape American Methodism than any other individual. Francis Asbury was born in England in 1745, but his career played out in America. From 1771, when John Wesley sent him as a missionary to the colonies, until his death in 1816, Asbury traveled well over 250,000 miles on horseback, formed connections with all sorts and classes of people, and took the lead in transforming a small religious movement into a fast growing church which would help shape popular religion in the new United States. More Americans had met Asbury than had met the President.

Although the world has changed greatly in the last 200 years, it is likely that Barratt's is one place where Asbury would still feel at home, because the building today appears much as it did in his day. Appropriately then, Barratt's Chapel is involved in the 2016 celebration of Asbury's life.

On November 13, the premier modern biographer of Asbury, Dr. John Wigger of the University of Missouri, will be speaking at the annual anniversary service. Dr. Wigger's recent book *American Saint: Francis Asbury & the Methodists* has received widespread acclaim. The service begins at 4:00 p.m. Mark your calendars and plan to attend!

Coombes House Designated Historic Site No. 512

A few miles west of Barratt's Chapel, along State Route 12, sits the Benjamin Coombes house, which was built in 1778. Although the Coombes family were Quakers, they befriended Francis Asbury, inviting him to



stay with them and to use their house as a preaching place. Asbury would sometimes stop there when he was traveling toward Barratt's.

The house is located on a working farm. The present owner, Joe Hughes, welcomes visitors by appointment. This site also includes a portion of the original 18th century road.

At its meeting in June, the Peninsula-Delaware Conference voted to designate the Coombes house as a Conference Historic Site. The house is now included as Site #512 in a national listing of Methodist historic sites. A bronze plaque will be presented to the owner at a brief ceremony at **2:00 p.m. on Sunday, November 13**. The public is invited to attend and tour the house. The Coombes house is located at 7320 Burnite Mill Road, Felton, Delaware. 

Sunday, November 13th Tour Historic House and Barratt's Chapel

2:00 p.m. —The Coombes House will be dedicated #512 on the National Listing of Methodist Historic Sites because Francis Asbury sometimes lodged there on his way to Barratt's Chapel. It is the residence of Joe Hughes at 7320 Burnite Mill Road, Felton, DE. (Turn West onto Burnite Mill Road (Rt 12) at Felton. The house is less than 5 miles from Rt. 13), a working farm, with a portion of the original 18th Century Road. You are invited to tour the house, meet and greet various people serving in various historical capacities and the author and keynote speaker for the 4:00 p.m. Barratt's Chapel service. Light refreshments will be served. It's about 15 minutes to Barratt's Chapel.

4:00 p.m. —Barratt's Chapel will celebrate 232 years of Methodism and Francis Asbury, sent by John Wesley, a missionary, to the colonies, serving from 1771 to his death in 1816. Dr. John Wigger, of the University of Missouri, acclaimed biographer of Francis Asbury, will be the featured speaker at Barratt's Chapel. Avenue's Sanctuary Choir will be present. Dr. Wigger's most recent book is "American Saint: Francis Asbury and the Methodists".
