From the desk of our Pastors . . .

As I write this, the election has been over for a week. This nation has a new President-elect and whether we like the outcome or not, we need to deal with it and go forward with the work of unifying this country. I recognize this will be difficult and there is anguish, pain and concern on behalf of the Clinton supporters. Most likely it would have been the same with the Trump supporters if Hillary had won. Either way, we must work together.

This has to include respect for and listening to the positions and opinions of the “other side” no matter what we each individually believe. As Americans and Christians we can find strength and answers by truly hearing and considering the reasons and beliefs of those around us even when we don’t agree. I remember when being part of the debate team and learning to listen and respond to opposing positions with facts and respect was a high and noble achievement. Now we tend to get angry, uncivil and nasty and that is never okay.

We can agree to disagree. But it does not mean that when an individual or a group disagrees with a position or suggested action being presented that anyone has the right to use violence, defamation or intimidation to change minds. It also does not mean that the only acceptable outcome is for someone to come around to the opposite way of thinking and if it does not happen that the other person or group is wrong, antiquated, stupid or ignorant. Opinions are just that. They are opinions and everyone is entitled to have their own. There are more than 322 million Americans which means there are more than 322 million possible opinions

Because there are so many varying opinions about what to think and how to get things done, it is easy to speculate that there will be many people who will be upset and disappointed when their opinions are not shared by others and the way they think things should work don’t happen. Frustration, exasperation and disenfranchisement are not unexpected either.

We learn very early in life that we are not always going to get our own way. If that were the case many of us would have existed on a diet of bad-for-us foods and been up past

midnight from the age of eight. We are going to have to recognize that as we go into 2017 and beyond we are not always going to have things work out the way we want them to and disagreements are going to take place. Temper tantrums, going behind one's back, spreading rumors or telling lies to diminish the authority of an individual or group is also unacceptable and certainly none of this is the way Jesus would have expected His followers to act even when there is disagreement. The Bible has many examples of when the Disciples disagreed with each other and yet they found ways to work together for the sake of God's kingdom. And always we need to love one and other as Jesus has commanded

At this time in our nation's history there will be plenty to disagree about in the months and years ahead. Abortion, the death penalty, homosexuality, immigration, trade agreements, global warming, nuclear weapons, and civil rights are just a few of the issues we will need to deal with as the new President takes office. As a side note, if anyone is curious as to where the United Methodist Church currently stands on any of those subjects it is spelled out in the Book of Discipline. Not everyone will agree on the positions of the UMC either. That's okay.

On the Wednesday night after the election the lead anchor for CBS Evening News Scott Pelley closed his broadcast with a story about how he had been approached with a question he had never been asked before. Someone came up to him and asked if "we were going to be okay?" The person raising the question was concerned because nobody "had anticipated what was to come regarding the outcome of the election."


Pelley then went into an explanation about how the founding fathers had seen the potential. He outlined the system of checks and balances that had been established in our government and described how it would be enough to keep the country moving forward no matter who was elected to the Presidency. It will take time to decide if Trump was a "good or bad" President but it's safe to point to several other Presidents in history that were "not so great" and yet as a nation we are still strong.

But more importantly than the founding fathers, God has seen what is to come. The Almighty has already been through it and is ready to help all of his creation deal with the uncertainty as well. Wrap-Around Love

For our first anniversary, my husband, Bo, and I drove north up the California coast from San Diego, where we were stationed in the Navy, to San Francisco. Among the many places we explored, we loved exploring Muir Woods, where the giant sequoia trees grow. Like anything we did in California, we explored the forest with crowds of people. However, once away from the parking lot and into the woods, a hush fell over the crowds. We felt like we were in church. The trees provoked such a sense of awe and majesty that people fell silent. Like seeing a star, we looked back into the past represented in these trees which can live over 2500 years.

One of the most well-known trees, General Sherman, has spanned a life-time of around 2400 years, growing to 275 feet tall and 102.6 feet around at the base. With trees so tall, one would think that the roots would need to grow very deeply to support the weight. However, the tap roots only extend six to 12 feet underground. Instead, the roots expand outward from the tree sometimes up to 50 feet. As they grow, they become entangled with the roots of other trees, reinforcing the strength and holding the trees up. In other words, they wrap their roots around each other's roots in order to be stronger.

This strength also shows up in the ways the trees have adapted to the environment. The California coast often experiences earthquakes. If the shifting ground causes one of these trees to lean, the tree automatically begins to grow new roots on the side to which it leans, thus buttressing up the tree and becoming more wrapped up in other roots.

Often seeds fall on these newly exposed roots and begin to grow. Although naturally resistant to fire because of their level of tannins, they actually need fire in order to reproduce. The cones from these sequoia trees hold seeds the size of tomato seeds. But, the cones cannot burst open to release their seeds unless they become very dry. Often, fire provides the right amount of dryness for the cones to open up and let go of their seeds. Fire destroys the undergrowth which might hinder the new saplings, and as it burns the ground brush, the ash provides fertilizer for the new seedlings to grow. Ultimately, though, the new seedling needs to wrap its roots around the roots of the more mature trees in order to grow to its full potential.

Great nature lesson, you may be thinking, but what does it have to do with us in the church? Jesus said, "I am the vine and you are the branches...Apart from me, you can do

nothing.” (See John 15:5.) Branches stay strong when they intertwine and stay connected to the vine together. We need each other and the love of Jesus now more than ever before. Half of the country rejoices while the other half mourns in fear, with committed Christians on all sides of the divide. But, we as the church need to get entangled into each other’s lives, particularly those who represent the opposite side from your perspective. Because we are so divided, we need to listen to each other more, wrap the love which Jesus has so freely spilled out upon us around each other’s hearts. We need to hear the cries of **BOTH** those hurting today and those whose hurt and fear led them to vote for the winning side. We must realize that the people who voted differently from us are our sisters and brothers in Christ, as hard as that may be to understand. Connected, to the vine and to each other, we can withstand even this painful divide.

In fact, if we remain open to the Spirit in the midst of this great divide in our country, we may find that the hard shells crack open to reveal seeds of hope. Remember that “God works all things together for good for the ones who love God.” (See Romans 8:28.) Perhaps we have beaten on each other (with the hatred we spewed throughout this campaign) long enough for the cone to break and give way to new life. Maybe the ashes left behind from the fiery rhetoric of this campaign can nourish us to choose a more excellent way. (See 1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13, otherwise known as “the LOVE chapter.”) We need this kind of wrap-around love: “Love is patient, love is kind, it isn’t jealous, it doesn’t brag, it isn’t arrogant, it isn’t rude, it doesn’t seek its own advantage, it isn’t irritable, it doesn’t keep a record of complaints, it isn’t happy with injustice, but it is happy with the truth. Love puts up with all things, trusts in all things, hopes for all things, endures all things. Love never fails.”

We may express this eternal love in different ways in our own context, but ultimately, however we live this love, it needs to nourish the community around us so that new life can occur. One church in our conference (St. Paul’s UMC, Odessa) offered communion last night on election night, as a reminder of this love which never fails. ([See link](#)) ***How will you wrap your love around the hearts of others in your life, particularly those who disagree with you? How can your church wrap its love around the hearts of those in your community?***

I believe that when we wrap that love around the hearts of those in our churches and our communities, we will fulfill our mission: **Cultivating Christ communities through our CALL—Connecting, Acting, Leading, and Loving.** And we will realize our vision of being “**Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ to today’s world.**” Because, in the end, God’s love in Jesus Christ never fails.
