From the desk of our Pastors . . .

As a Christian, I understand Jesus' directive to love everyone. We hear it in scripture over and over but my favorite verse is from John 13:34 that says, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one and other; just as I have loved you, you are also to love one another." I understand it and I can appreciate why Christ tells us to do this. I just wish I could live by that commandment all the time.

Because when a situation happens like it did Monday night in Manchester, England, when a terrorist detonated a bomb that killed 22 at a concert attended mostly by children and young teens, it's very difficult to be anything but angry at the perpetrator. As I write this, the youngest identified victim is 8 years old. Who could ever want to kill a child? It is beyond my imagination.

My heart is just aching for the all the people who were at the concert. More than 21,000 people were in attendance and they will forever be affected by what happened. Then there are those who were injured and killed that I am praying for. And of course, I am praying for the families of the victims. As a parent myself I can't begin to think of what a nightmare this situation would be. But as horrible as it all is, I have faith that God will carry all the victims through with His love and mercy.

Where I am struggling is to find any compassion or love for the suicide bomber. I am so angry at the insanity of his actions that I find it nearly impossible to pray for Salman Abedi, the man identified as the culprit. I can go through the motions but I don't find my heart truly behind what I am forcing myself to say. I admit that my thoughts are anything but kind and forgiving and I wonder how God could expect me to pray for the bomber. I want to lash out at everyone he is working with (ISIS has claimed responsibility) and do

whatever it takes to keep something like this from ever happening again. I confess that I was thinking more about revenge than justice.

This is why the first person I am going to pray for (after the victims) is me. I am going to pray for a heart that God wants me to have. I am not naïve enough to think my feelings of anger and fear (and a deep desire to lock my son in a closet so he will be safe) will change overnight but asking God to set my heart in the right direction is the best I can do. And sometimes the best we can do is enough for the moment because God will take it from here.

I'm not even going to pray that God gives me the love for this man that we are commanded to have. Instead, my prayer will be that God sets my heart in the proper direction and in God's perfect timing, whether it be a year or a decade or the rest of my life, I have faith that the Creator will make it right. That stops me from feeling like I am being pulled in two different directions — what I should feel and what I am actually feeling. I'm putting my very human heart and emotions in His hands.

I know, based on the comments of people who have come into my office since this tragedy unfolded, that I am not the only person to feel this way. So as we deal with this issue and/or the myriad of others that we face when we need to forgive and love, but find it difficult at best and seemingly impossible at worst, let's pray for ourselves. It's not selfish to do that when we are not living as God wants us to live. The words we pray every week when we pray to the Lord that "thy will be done" is not just in the lives of others but in our own as well. For it is in all ways, and through everyone, that we will bring glory and honor to God forever.

From the desk of our Conference Director

Down to the River

When I served aboard USS JASON (AR-8), we had a Baptist Chaplain. He knew I grew up United Methodist, and he used to tease me about needing to have a "real baptism" by "dunking." Baptism contains two movements: God's initiative in reaching out to us, which we Methodists call "prevenient grace," and our human response, which for us happens typically in confirmation. As Methodists, we practice infant baptism because we put the emphasis on the divine initiative. Baptists and others who practice "believer's baptism" put the emphasis on the human response, which we Methodists call "justifying grace." So, the Chaplain loved to tease me and promised that one day he would dunk me in baptism.

Several months later, our ship sailed to support a battle group in the Western Pacific. The battle group sailed to protect Kuwaiti oil tankers from attack. Transiting out there, we hit some very rough seas. On Sunday mornings, we would gather below decks in the Crew's Lounge for worship. Because of the rough seas, the Chaplain felt a little nauseous. (Chaplains are not known for their sea-legs or their knowledge of ships.) Before any of us could warn the Chaplain, he had opened the port hole for fresh air. As the ship descended the next wave, sea water came pouring into the Crew's Lounge. Several of us scrambled to close the port hole before we crested the next wave, and we got soaked in the process.

After the shock wore off of the very wet Chaplain, he seized the moment. "I told you I would dunk you in baptism!" We all laughed at the situation and mopped up the deck before finishing our (now very wet) worship. No one ever let the Chaplain forget that moment. Being a good sport, he always replied that he needed water in order to pray.

This coming Monday, we will be going down to the river (the Christina River) to pray, as we hold Annual Conference at the Chase Center at the Riverfront. We invite all of you, whether you will attend the conference or not, to join us in prayer over those three days. Like my ship, our church has hit some rough seas recently. And, like our Chaplain, we may need lots of water in order to pray for the Holy Spirit to navigate us through this storm. But, we know the One who created the earth, including the storms, and we know the One who calmed the storms long ago. So, let's get "all hands on deck" praying for God to guide us to our next destination on this journey.
