From the desk of our Pastors . . .

As I am on vacation this week, I have attached the words of Heidi Hill, a friend of mine from Kansas. This is all hers but I'll be back next week. God bless you all!

About 25 years ago I finished a watercolor painting entitled, "Pause for Reflection." In the painting, on a dark blue pond, a pair of creamy white water lilies rising up from their floating pads were mirrored on the water's still surface. The painting has several layers of meanings, but the one that struck me this month has to do with making the time to review our lives: sometimes, our lives as a whole; sometimes, yearly, as we acknowledge the start of a new year, or as we observe Lent; sometimes, as we say the Lord's Prayer and reflect on "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

"It is by grace you have been saved, through faith - and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8 NIV). As Christians, we review our lives as an act of faith, and we rejoice to discover where God's grace has been at work. We are called to be brutally honest, as we think back on our lives, however long or short; assess the value of what we have been doing; recognize that God will forgive us for our sins; and experience God's grace in how we have lived and who we have become. Have we decided to live up to the potential that God gives each of us?

According to John's description of the reinstatement of Peter, Jesus says, ""Very truly I tell you, when you were younger you dressed yourself and went where you wanted; but when you are old you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go" (John 21:18 NIV). Even when we are younger, we face difficult times and challenges that are out of our control. So, what should we do?

Jesus' next words to Peter inform us, as well: "Follow me" (John 21: 19 NIV). How can we follow Jesus in these days? I think the answer lies in part in Matthew 26:36-46, when Jesus is praying in the Garden of Gethsemane. We, too, can pray. We can pray constantly. We can trust God's plan for us, and accept what we cannot control or change. As a result of that trust in God, we can give over to God the control of our lives and our future, and cast out fear and anxiety. We can remember what Moses said to Joshua, "It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; he will not fail you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed" (Deuteronomy 31:8 (NRSV). We know that nothing exists without God. God's love is the greatest gift. Without this divinely incomprehensible gift, all our hoping and working and praying is in vain.

"Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy" (Jude 24 KJV). Help us, we pray, to humbly receive the loving gift of God's son, Jesus, as we uplift all on the prayer list and in our hearts for comfort, strength, courage, hope, exceeding joy and His peace.

# The Hard Work of Understanding

It's official. My son, Eli, who starts his senior year at UD next week, has a girlfriend. He has been dating her for about six months now. But, he finally asked her if she would be his girlfriend, and she agreed. They had been apart all summer, so Eli didn't feel it was a given. You see, his girlfriend is from China. She attends UD also and they met, of all places, in a Spanish class last semester. As you can imagine, attending college here in the U.S., she speaks fluent English. When we met her on Eli's birthday in May, she impressed us not only with her technical grasp of the language, but also for her understanding of its nuances, such as sarcasm and humor. We've really enjoyed the couple of times that we have spent with her.

When she returned to school last week (she came back early, since she'll be serving as an RA), Eli described their time together as an adjustment period. They had "spoken" every day this summer online. But since China has a firewall to block most western websites, they had to use an app called "WeChat." She typed her message in Chinese, which Eli read in English, and vice versa. She had not spoken much English since she left last spring, and Eli had not had to pay such close attention to understand her words through her accent and cultural assumptions. He laughed about needing to use his whole self to listen to her, as he wants to understand her meaning and the emotions and motivations behind her words. Because they are in an official relationship, Eli can assign positive intent to her, even when her words do not come out correctly.

As I reflected on the effort Eli puts into this communication, I thought about how little effort we often put into understanding others. We all know our county stands divided right now on so many issues, with the latest being the removal of Confederate statues and the violence in Charlottesville. Have you attempted to listen to someone from the opposite side as you? Just to be clear, I am not talking about neo-Nazi's, the KKK, the alt-right, or white supremacists. These groups incite violence and hatred and intimidation. We DO NOT need to listen to them spew their hatred. But we do not need to respond in kind. Remember Dr. King's words: "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that." Jesus invites us to pray for them; but we do not need to listen to their hatred.

But what about people who defend the Confederate statues as "history" or defend these groups' right to free speech? Or, if you are on the other side of the conversation, what about the people who view the statues as methods of intimidation and oppression? Have we tried to listen? I have, and I confess, sometimes I feel as if they speak a foreign language. We do not see the world in the same way. We watch the same events and yet have vastly different interpretations of them. While we think we

speak the same language, we begin from completely divergent cultural assumptions, so our words do not mean the same thing. (It reminds me of that quote from "The Princess Bride:" "You keep using that word. I do not think it means what you think it means.")

To complicate matters further, many times our friendships become limited to Facebook. We do not spend time around people to whom these "issues" bring more dire consequences. And, in fact, those of us who have privilege (where the whole of society reflects our viewpoints, the color of our skin, our nationality, our values, etc.), we speak so often and so loudly that we drown out the other voices. It reminds me of someone who speaks a foreign language slowly and loudly in hopes that we understand them. Speaking a foreign language more loudly does not promote friendship and understanding.

Instead, we can learn two things from Eli's experience. First, we need to invest time into truly listening. Those of us with white privilege have spoken enough. Jesus invites us to listen to the voices of those who see things differently, those who are oppressed or on the margins. These are the people Jesus hung out with when he walked the earth, and he continues to be present with the oppressed today. When we listen to people who hurt from these actions, we begin to hear not only their hearts but the heart of Jesus as well. Try putting yourself in their shoes, and attempt to see the world from their point of view. Listen not only to the words, but also to the hurt and emotions behind the words. Suspend judgement and the need to defend yourself and just listen. People long to be heard. Can we give that gift to others and begin to understand?

Secondly, once we listen to oppressed people, we form friendships and relationships with them. Suddenly, it is no longer about "us" and "them," but about "we, the people of God." As we deepen relationships, we learn to assign positive intents behind words and actions, instead of questioning people's motives. **That simple step alone—assuming positive intent—can squelch many arguments** before they arise. If I assume that you intended good out of something, even if it did not come across that way, I will take the time to ask for clarification to understand. When I assume negative motives, I dismiss any misunderstandings as "attacks" or intentional spite. Can we trust God enough to give up our need to be right so that we might gain a greater understanding of our neighbor?

Maybe these steps feel overwhelming to us. Yet, our society needs us to lead to a new way of community. Our society knows how to hate, but true acts of love come rarely. When we love with the sacrificial love of Jesus, people notice. When we take the time to listen and form friendships, people notice. When we assume positive intent, people notice. Then, we can point to God who makes all things possible through the hope of Jesus Christ. And, we can be about our mission of Cultivating Christ communities through our CALL—Connecting, Acting, Leading, and Loving...until one day, the world will know.
