From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Just like the rest of the nation, I followed the news about Hurricane Irma very closely. In the days leading up to the landfall I prayed that somehow it would miss populated spots altogether. As we now know, there was a great deal of damage and loss of life.

The images of traffic backed up attempting to flee the path of the storm got me to thinking about what was in each of those vehicles. Certainly, there were family, friends and pets whose very lives were being saved by the evacuation. What else was in those cars and trucks? What would I take if I only had a short window to decide and get on the road? What treasures would I grab on my way out of town?

Matthew 6:21 says, "for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." As I contemplated what I would take, I realized that what was truly important to me were not the things that the secular world assign much value to.

My first priority would be pictures and photos especially of Chris as a baby and of family members who have gone on to God's eternal kingdom. Artwork that my son did in elementary school, gifts that had been given to me by those who love me, and other sentimental items that could never be replaced would come next. Only then would I add my phone and computer but not because those items are financially worth much but because they represent the ways I would be able to stay in contact with my family and friends.

My jewelry, furniture, televisions and other "higher ticket" items didn't even warrant consideration. They simply were not important in the hierarchy of what I considered true treasure. What would you take if you were on route 1 heading north out of the way of a hurricane? Where is your treasure that follows your heart?

One other note is that in every car, truck, boat, and in the homes and shelters of those who rode out the storm, God was there. Nobody had to think about packing the Lord or placing the Creator in some little corner where there was a small amount of space. God was already there and always would be. As Jesus is the true treasure for all of humanity, we can give thanks that every person carries with him and her the fullness of God's grace no matter where they go or what is happening in their lives.

From the desk of the Dover District Superintendent

Holy Change through Gracious Dialogue on Race

It was at Drew Theological School that I experienced such a diverse community. I lived in a family dormitory on campus with my children with international students from all over the world. I saw my children playing at the playground with children from China, Canada, India, Japan, Iceland, Austria and West Samoa. Their parents were our neighbors for 3 years until I graduated. My family had nobody in America, but these people who served as my extended family members. We borrowed things from each other when we didn't own something. Some of my neighbors attended my children's teachers' conferences for me when I had to take classes and babysat when I was away. The differences and accents of my neighbors were a natural part of my everyday life. Having come from a racially homogeneous country, South Korea, I had learned to embrace and enjoy all the differences—food, culture and expressions of their values—with ever-increasing curiosity. There was so much in them that brought such richness of life to us—life abundant for differences.

However, in churches that I have served, somehow diversity seems to be an issue. Many questions tend to arise with challenges of learning how to become an inter-culturally sensitive and competent leader at the crossroads of "fear zone" or "safe zone". What are these challenges? How can I overcome these? I ponder and wrestle as an Asian-American pastor.

I came to have more hope through my personal reflection and deeper dialogue with participants in the latest 2.5 days' **intercultural competence training** hosted by the Dover District's Revelation 5 Task Force, the district's racial reconciliation team to take **GRACIOUS LEADERSHIP** in the face of stereotypes, prejudices, discriminations and destructive racism. Participants were a diverse group of African-Americans, Hispanic-Latinos, Euro-Americans, Native Americans and me as an Asian American. Through training we came to believe and hope that **we can build bridges by having gracious dialogue on race and other hot issues of our time** without pointing fingers or punishing individuals or groups but by empowering individuals and groups with skills and knowledge to function effectively and faithfully in a multicultural diverse community.



As the Rev. Bill Cruse, the regional director of Kaleidoscope Institute (KI) founded by Eric Law, emphasized, we learned: "It is NOT anti-racism in the form of demonizing any individual or groups. It is about naming the principalities and powers (including racism) that separate us from each other and from God in the past and the present, and learning how to resist them as a community. It is NOT avoiding our history and present differences and pretending that everything is okay. It is about fully acknowledging our history and our present differences while being able to reconnect with the reconciling power of the Spirit to restore the community of Christ. It does NOT take a one-time, top-down, fix-it, oneway learning event. It is <u>a life-long mutual learning process</u> through which we continue to strive to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with God, as individuals, in our communities and in our ministries."

On the last day of our training, we were discussing our takeaways and how to apply our training to our ministry. One African American pastor shared how her congregation mingled with Native Americans at the POW WOW while worshipping together at the venue and how she wants to continue to embrace racial diversity in her congregation with intentional leadership. One Native American participant stood up in tears to initiate his hug toward her, thanking her for such an intentional outreach. Another participant shared how he was surprised by diverse experiences and struck by the pain and singular strength people had. All this happened when we got together for intentional vital conversations with GRACE. It takes **holy boldness** not to pretend everything is okay. We were no longer strangers to one another at the end of it.

The training ended with worship where we all declared the hope of Jesus Christ in the spirit of holy boldness to practice their gracious leadership through gracious dialogue against hatred and destructive 'isms'. They were empowered with a determination to make holy change in a diverse, changing world. The Dover District's Revelation 5 Task Force and 15 trained intercultural coaches came up with specific follow-up practice to reach out to young people, especially high school students, to coach them to be more inter-culturally sensitive and competent leaders in the future as the district works in partnership with a nonprofit community partner, Pathway to Success.

Where is your church in this gracious leadership through gracious dialogue on racial reconciliation? There is always a call for the hope of Jesus Christ we can offer. Let's search for the opportunity of offering the hope and fulfill it in the spirit of holy boldness to make holy change in response to God's reconciling action through Christ. "...God was reconciling the world to Himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. (*2 Corinthians 5:19-20, NIV*)

Notes from the Leadership Team – September 5, 2017

The leadership team met last Tuesday to discuss preparations for Charge Conference and review items from the Trustees. The meeting opened with prayer and then proceeded to review the work of the various administrative committee.

SPRC is working on Charge Conference reports and other personnel related items.

Finance has prepared a draft budget that we hope will be presented at Charge Conference for approval. Giving has been good this year exceeding the numbers in 2016, and the renovations that were completed through the Journey of Faith campaign have been paid off.

The Pastors reported that the new year will bring a focus on discipleship. Both Pastor Wendy and Pastor Tom are hoping that everyone this year will grow closer in their relationship with God. Mission Groups is one way of pursuing this goal. Mission groups marry a ministry that the group feels called to and a time of spiritual formation. Avenue has already started our first Mission Group with the leaders of our Code Purple shelter. The group prays and studies Scripture for half an hour and then focuses on the upcoming season of Code Purple. The group can be organized around any mission, planning a mission trip, knitting blankets for newborns, developing a new worship service are all good examples. Hopefully the Holy Spirit will call individuals to form groups as the church moves forward.

The Trustees reiterated a number of issues that they have been having with the facility:

- Fire doors should be kept closed when not in use.
- The preschool is a partner in everything that we do.
- The staff needs to be aligned with the safety committee in order to execute the plan as needed.
- The Trustees have a plan and need everyone's help to make it work.
- If you would like more information about the Trustees master plan for the building and grounds, please talk with Jim Clendaniel or Jack Dickerson. They would be happy to walk you through the details.

The bulk of the rest of the meeting focused on projects that the Trustees were considering. These are presented in no particular order and all are on the table for consideration.

- Redo the landscaping in the front of the church to eliminate weeds and enhance the beauty of the facility. Reduce maintenance costs of the landscaping to help save the church resources. Cost: \$5-10,000
- Digital message board for the outdoor sign on the corner. Cost: \$20-30,000
- Storage building somewhere on the property. Would probably be a 50' x 100' pole barn with utilities. This would eliminate the need for the outdoor sheds that are out back of the parking lot. Cost: \$50-100,000

- Put in centralized climate control for the building to be able start up or shut down areas that are in use or not. Limit the autonomous control of the thermostat in each room. Provide utilities cost savings. Cost: \$40-50,000
- Build a storage area under the existing portico between the sanctuary and the music room. It would replace the sheds out back and the need for a pole barn. It would also be integrated into the existing building. Cost: about \$100,000
- Repave and line the parking lot as needed. Cost: \$75-100,000
- Redesign and renovate the nursery to make it more adult and child friendly. Cost: \$10-20,000

Other suggestions are welcomed. No action was taken on any of these projects, except for the landscaping—that project is out for bids and will be reviewed and possibly approved when the competitive bidding process is completed. If you have feedback please share it with the Trustees.
