Cultural Sharing

This past weekend, I had the joy of attending the Nanticoke Powwow. A Powwow involves inviting other tribes (over 40 tribes this year) to join with the Nanticoke to "preserve traditions, to sing to the Creator, and to dance to the heartbeat of the drum." (Quoted from the Nanticoke Indian Association Website: http://www.nanticokeindians.org/page/what-powwow.) From the parking attendants to the dancers to the artisans selling their crafts, I loved the pride of heritage that everyone exuded. Hospitality mixed with their cultural pride, as people invited all in attendance to understand and appreciate the native heritage. The native people from many different tribes did not ask others to disrespect their own heritage, but simply to appreciate the various native customs and traditions.



During the dance sessions, everyone gathered around the dance arena. The singers and drummers began to play the beat and the dancers moved to the circle. An emcee explained the dances, their history and tribal affiliation, and the regalia the dancers wore. He explained the significance of the circle in native culture and the respect people give by not cutting across the circle. He also explained how the drumbeat symbolizes the heartbeat, which represents life.

At one point, the emcee told a story of a western US tribe whose members encountered members of the US Cavalry. The Cavalry members "conquered" the tribe and took all of their regalia (which is very intricate, hand-made, symbolic, and beautiful) and burned it in front of the tribe, and forbade them to dance, all in order to discourage the continuation of the native heritage and culture. The emcee said, "That act really hurt and felt very disrespectful, but native people are resourceful and kept the dances and the crafting alive in secret." He went on to explain that Powwows give them the opportunity to remember their heritage, to teach their culture to their children, and to share their traditions with non-natives. And, he continued to introduce each dance, each tribe, and each type of regalia. I really appreciated how he could explain the past hurts done to the native people, while not putting them in a position of victims. Instead, he praised their resilience and continued to explain the beauty and depth and meaning of their cultural symbols.

As I drove home, I reflected on the difference of the approach of native people in sharing their cultural heritage and the approach of white-supremacists, who feel threatened by any other culture than their own. Some of the alt-right protesters in Charlottesville, Virginia chanted, "You will not replace us." They fear diversity and view any acceptance of other cultural heritages as threatening to their own heritage, privilege, and power. Although a bit delayed, both houses of Congress unanimously passed a resolution calling on President Trump to condemn white supremacists, neo-Nazi's, the KKK, white nationalists, and other such groups, labeling them domestic terrorists. I find this comparison between the Powwow and the Charlottesville protests ironic. The dominant culture in the U.S. (the European or white culture) has done its best to eradicate other cultures, particularly native cultures, as the nation expanded westward. Although many people now respect and value the native traditions, groups of white supremacists still threaten all who do not look like them. Yet, here, the native culture which has been so threatened, offers a warm, genuine welcome to all, including descendants of the culture which threatened to destroy them, and people who still benefit from that destruction. We have much to learn from their hospitality.

The book of Hebrews, among others, teaches us about the importance of hospitality. Hebrews 12:1-3 reads: "Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured." This passage calls us to welcome others, and especially strangers. The words invite us to practice empathy as a means of mutual love and to be intentional about hospitality.

Think about the culture of your church. Every church has a culture which is unique to them. Call to mind your traditions and rituals. Do you kneel for communion or receive through intinction? Do you leave your pews for the passing of the peace or simply turn to those seated near you? Do you allow coffee and other drinks in the sanctuary? Is the dress code casual or more formal? Do people have conversation in the sanctuary before worship or do you expect that time to be silent? Think of these and many more examples of your church's culture.

If a stranger comes in to worship, how will they understand your culture? How do you intentionally explain your traditions? In what ways do you help people feel welcome? What if someone makes a mistake and breaks one of your traditions? How do you treat them? What happens when a new pastor or leadership team brings a change to your culture? How do you receive it?

I invite you to reflect on how we show mutual love to one another through our hospitality. Can we imitate the native emcee, demonstrating pride in our heritage while welcoming others into our body? What practices can help us feel less threatened by new traditions and cultures? How is God calling us to show empathy to one another and to strangers? As we become more aware of our own cultural traditions, I pray that we will not feel threatened by diversity, but discover the beauty in all of God's creation. Then, we can pray in hope to realize one day our vision: "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ to today's world."
