From the desk of our Pastors . . .

I was going to use this space over the next few weeks to talk about my trip to Korea. As I have said when people asked me, it was both a wonderful trip and a horrible experience. More about that at another time.

On Sunday evening, there were 59 people killed in a mass shooting during a concert in Las Vegas. While the investigation continues and people search for a motive, our thoughts and prayers need to be with the victims and their families. Just trying to imagine myself getting a call that my son had been killed while he was at a concert was incredibly difficult. I can't begin to know what it would feel like in reality.

Psalm 116: 1-2 says, "I love the Lord because He hears my prayers and answers them, because He bends down to listen. I will pray as long as I breathe." We can be assured that God hears our prayers on behalf of everyone affected by the mass murder. We can also have faith that God is with every person dealing with the physical, emotional, mental and spiritual wounds inflicted by the shooting. That does not mean that "all will be better" quickly or that life will get "back to normal" for anyone affected. It does mean that God will carry His children as they grieve, lament, and eventually begin to heal.

It is in these times when we need to just be with God. We need to be still and know the Creator who made each of us is with us always. We need to lean into the Almighty and trust that God will be with us in these times of personal, community and national tragedy. John 16:33 reminds us that God said, "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

Let us pray that this is the last mass killing ever to take place in the world. Let us also pray that the will of the God of love and peace be done. No matter what we do in terms of gun control, venue security, mental health services and all the other pieces that are part of the national debate of these all-too-often horrific incidents, we must keep the commandments and guidance of the Lord on our hearts and minds as the most important aspect of how we approach the discussion.

To God be the glory forever and ever.

Matthew 25: 35-40 Project - A few 2017 Summer Stories

A previously homeless family of 3 adults has been assisted to housing

One adult is working and the other two have medical conditions. Coming together as a community, were: Corrine of the Division of Aging and Valerie of Milford High School who referred them to Laura of Delaware Social Services who provided initial housing funding. An electric stove from the Price family, with storage by Bernice and transport by Larry and Sonny filled a gap of cooking in the home. A refrigerator delivered by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, who also supplied a handicapped ramp, replaced a chest of ice and rickety steps. Because the Brennan family has contributed for families so many times, they are always looking for people to donate and they contacted the Parsons family who gave a house full of furniture, kitchen and household items. The Milford Community Food Pantry, of course, supported. Other individuals, volunteers Norman and Maddison and a variety of families of Avenue Church provided opportunities, encouragement, food, bedding, other household supplies to bridge other gaps. The family has expressed their gratitude many times. As a Church congregation, we are reminded by **Apostle Paul - I** Corinthians, Chapter 12 that it takes a community of people, with God-given different personalities, acting intentionally and being truly committed to make a difference for their fellowman, for such a miracle to occur.

<u>United Methodist Women provided funding</u>

A family of 2 working adults and 2 children were assisted with partial rent. He was hospitalized; her early shift, part time job, for UPS couldn't cover the rent. Working separate day-night shifts, the young children are covered by parental care. She continues night school at Del Tech to finish a nursing degree.

Grandparents had good reasons to seek temporary custody of a granddaughter. The costs strained their finances and they needed some help with electric, which UMW provided.

The husband and wife moved into housing with just their Summer clothes and a few personal items

Kitchen cooking items, table and chairs, and food were supplied. They had no clock. They had no radio. They had no television and couldn't afford the cable. At the perfect moment, a family donating a TV with built-in DVD-VCR and a box of tapes, provided wonderful free entertainment. Donating a new clock, another lady had no idea it was destined to be so important. After rent and utility, little is left over. When two sisters heard this, they filled the pantry with food, paper needs,

beautiful bedding, and a chair – a recliner so now the wife, who has cancer, finds comfort. Necessary Fall-Winter clothing was given. The husband stroked the hooded, warm coat knowing he will not be cold this winter.

Two young children were carried from North Carolina to live with a local relative with the clothes on their backs

With one simple request to the Avenue congregation, the children received: shoes, coats, pants and tops, underwear, socks.

Donating a queen bed, the two sisters gave and received a blessing

With many past years of giving for families, they called, once again, to donate a bed. A request had been made by another Methodist Church for a bed for a husband and wife new to Milford. Our sister church made arrangements and picked up the bed and carried to the family after personally praying for the giving sisters from the top of their heads to their feet.

18 Children received filled backpacks to begin School

Because a member of Avenue shops sales, uses coupons, and intentionally prepares for the next mission opportunity.

One Church member downsizing

Donated a daybed, matching wardrobe and recliner and had them transported directly to the grateful family. Milford Social Services had just referred this working family who needed a clothes dryer, beds and dresser. The dryer was given the first day of the annual Avenue Yard Sale, carried by volunteers to their residence and this furniture a few days later.

A wife donated her deceased husband's wardrobe

She brought clothing, shoes, jackets, helpfully marked with sizes, on hangers. The recipient, who attends Church, has a total wardrobe.

An air conditioner was a true blessing

This husband and wife have a travel trailer residence that is now comfortable. The donor went out-of-her way to accommodate the timing needs of the family.

A \$20.00 cash donation

This church member was volunteering at the church office this particular day and handed this donation saying: "Use this for someone who needs it". She was unaware that two volunteers were standing in the Church office ready to pick up food orders to deliver for two single, individual men, in different housing but in close proximity – a few miles apart. Both men have suffered losses and are financially challenged and need every bit of encouragement possible. Ten dollars each was a special gift.

<u>Upon hearing of the need for home insulating materials, an employee of Supplies Unlimited Delmarva/MS Hollow Metal, a Greenwood Company, informed corporate headquarters</u>

Verifying was, as easy as, a call to Avenue Church to learn that the husband and wife had obtained a condemned mobile home, gutted it and began restoring walls, floors, plumbing, electrical, wood stove, etc. while working and living in it. Avenue annual yard sales, for the past 2 – perhaps 3 years, have contributed parts, supplies, and together with other donations stove, freezer, furniture and so forth or purchases made possible by your monetary donations. Wood cut from fallen trees on church property, by men of the Church, helped fuel their stove. The donation of a chain saw gave the family an opportunity to cut more wood. Because of this employee and this company's sizeable donation, this family's home will truly be warm.
