I had finished my work for the Sunday service, the visits for the day were over, Michael had plans, and I was home alone with some free time. It hardly ever happens. I decided to take advantage of the evening by making up a batch of homemade cream-of-tomato soup that I could freeze and have it available this winter.

It's quite a process with chopping of tomatoes, onions, carrots, celery, garlic and requires spices, sugars, chicken broth and a lot of time. After everything is mixed together it has to simmer for several hours before it can be "finished off" and the cream added.

After I got the soup on the stove, I decided to use the simmering time to clean my kitchen and dining area. It was not the type of clean-up I do every day after I make dinner. I don't know what or why it happened but when I hit the button, the lid popped off and the entire batch of tomato soup went flying. It covered the counters, the walls, the floors, and all the other areas I had just meticulously cleaned. All of my hard work and hours of effort went out the window in a brief moment of chaos. I wanted to drag myself off to bed and forget it until the morning but I cleaned it up the best I could and whined excessively to the cats who watched the whole episode with a hint of cynicism. More importantly, I wish I had never told Michael because as it turned out, the house was no better off than before I started. And I didn't set clean the kitchen for his benefit. I simply did it because it was the right thing to do.

This situation made me think about Matthew 6:1. It says, "When you do good deeds, don't try to show off. If you do, you won't get a reward from your Father in heaven."

I don't think God was responsible for the soup exploding in my kitchen. But perhaps the Lord was using the situation to bring this scripture to my mind in advance of me doing something the Creator would not appreciate. The Almighty does teach lessons in ways that we don't anticipate.

On another note, I wish you all a blessed, happy and contented Thanksgiving. I will miss you next Sunday as I am celebrating the holiday with family in Olathe, Kansas and will be joining my sister at the Church of the Resurrection, led by Adam Hamilton. ## Just Shine

I remember a Christmas story about a child who wanted a part in the Christmas pageant. She received the part of the star. Her parents thought she might be disappointed, but she loved her part. She would stand in front of the mirror daily to practice. Her mother asked her what she had to do as the star, and she replied, "Just shine! I'm practicing shining to get people safely to Jesus!" No wonder Jesus called a child into the middle of the disciples and invited his followers to be just like that child. Jesus calls us to "just shine!" But, often we forget to do that simple role. We forget to let our light shine.

I wonder if it is because we have become discouraged. Last week at a gathering with my colleagues, one pastor shared the story of *The Little Red Lighthouse and the Great Grey Bridge*. The book tells the story of a little lighthouse on the Hudson River, whose flashing light and gonging bell warned ships of where the land jutted out, so that they would not run aground. It did a great job keeping ships safe and guiding them through the river.

One day, however, some men began construction on a great grey bridge, which is the George Washington Bridge to Manhattan, across the Hudson River. The bridge also had a light, much higher than the little lighthouse. And, the bridge served as a connecting point between two groups of people. So, the little red lighthouse felt very sad and no longer shined its light or rang its gong. One day, in the midst of a great fog, a tugboat traveling up the Hudson kept looking for the flash of the little red lighthouse, and listening for its gong. But, the little red lighthouse no longer shone or rang its bell. The tugboat, with nothing to guide it, went aground on the rocks and broke apart. The lighthouse learned that ships and boats still needed its light to navigate safely around Manhattan.

My friend compared churches to the little red lighthouse or the great grey bridge. He said that God longs for us to serve as a bridge to the community, connecting people

with each other and with Jesus. Many thriving churches do just that. But, some churches no longer have the resources to build a bridge to the community. Maybe their membership has aged to where they cannot offer mission and ministry to their community. Perhaps their budgets have shrunk too small to fund any kind of bridging ministry. Or, some have just gotten discouraged, comparing themselves to bigger churches and more active ministries. So, they have turned their light off.

But, Jesus still needs churches to be lighthouses. If they cannot be bridges, they can still shine the light of Jesus Christ into their corner of the world, guiding people safely around obstacles and helping them navigate this river we call life. Even the tiniest of churches can still be a lighthouse. All you have to do is be like that little girl: **just shine!** 

What might shining your light look like as a church? Perhaps you can still fill backpacks for children with food for the weekends. Maybe you can adopt a local school and serve as mentors to the children. Or you could throw your doors wide open to any and all who need prayer. What if we became known as the church who loves and who prays? I do not know how God calls your particular church to shine. But, I know that God does call each of us to at least shine. If we have more resources, we can build a bridge to the community. Yet, even if you cannot build a bridge, everyone can shine the light of Jesus Christ.

As the days grow darker as we approach the winter solstice, we recognize the need for more light. How might God call you to "just shine?" How can your church be a lighthouse to the community, shining the light of the world (Jesus Christ) everywhere around them? How can your church perhaps partner with another church to collaboratively build a bridge to the community? What if two lighthouses shone together? More people could navigate the stormy times of their lives, finding Jesus' love when all else threatens them. We could live our vision of "**Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ in today's world.**" So, let your light shine and do not be afraid of the new bridges to the community. God's purpose remains the same: to share the wonderful love of Christ to our world. Let's get shining!

Remember the story of Jesus on the road to Emmaus? Well on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, volunteers were permitted to walk the road to Emmaus with Jesus.

Jesus was named Joe, Ronnie, Charles and Keith. They were dropped off by good Samaritans who knew that the temperatures would be unbearable... Some walked. But they came to seek refuge for a night. Two of them had never been in a place like Avenue before. Two of them already knew the ropes. They were frightened of being judged, frightened of being locked up and not allowed to return to the environment that they were comfortable in. The lady that brought Charles to the shelter, said he slept in their storage container behind their house.

Keith got dropped off by detox center he had been in, by a driver, because the Center needed his bed and the next step of his rehab wouldn't be ready for him until Wednesday. Both Joe and Keith came with the clothes on their back and that was it.

But that's not the end of the story. Turned out, Keith is a brittle diabetic. His brother had just passed away secondary to his diabetes. He had no way to test his blood sugar, nor insulin to treat it. He wasn't feeling well later in the evening on Friday, and someone found out about his diabetes. (He hadn't told anyone about it because he didn't want to be a bother.) One of our volunteers went home and got their glucometer and checked his blood sugar. It was high but not dangerous. Two very special volunteers, the next morning knew he needed a glucometer. One of the men was going to go to the drug store and purchase one for him. Then the other volunteer knew how to get one for Keith for free. The thoughtful volunteer literally took him and got the supplies he needed until Keith could get the necessary prescriptions he needed from his attending physician.

This is only one story about how volunteers went out of their way to walk with these men in whatever way they could. Truly, there were many wonderful acts of love extended by the many volunteers who came each night to show kindness and warmth to men who were afraid, tired, hungry and grateful. Thank You to each volunteer, for your love and caring for those ignored by society.
