## **Entertain Angels**

Many years ago, I married a young couple several months earlier than we had planned. They had run into a crisis which sped up the timeline and I was happy to assist. The young man had been stopped for speeding, and then detained as an illegal immigrant. He had been brought to the United States from Mexico as a months-old baby, and the U.S. had been the only home he had ever known. They released him for a couple of weeks while they processed his return, and during those weeks, I married the couple, instead of waiting until the summer.

Several aspects of that wedding remain firmly in my memory, as we combined the traditional U.S. Christian wedding ceremony with some traditions from their province in Mexico. In these provincial Mexican weddings, the family surrounds the bride and groom with a lasso, symbolizing God's eternal love as the bond that holds them together. Then, they invite the bride and groom to kneel while members of the family pray over them. What beautiful additions to our traditions!

A week after the wedding, immigration officials sent the man "back" to a country where he had never lived. He no longer had any relatives in that place, so he had no place to live and no job to support himself. Imagine being taken from the only home you know and sent to a place with no family or friends or place to stay or work. Imagine that your only "crime" had been a speeding ticket. He remained in Mexico for 18 months as immigration officials processed his "marriage" paperwork and the couple has been reunited. But, what an incredible trial for the two of them and their families!

This young couple served as my introduction to the challenges of people called "Dreamers." The DREAM Act stands for "Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors." (You may also have heard the term DACA, which stands for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals.) Dreamers have been brought to this country as young children, with no control over their circumstances. They have attended schools here, gotten jobs here, established family and friends here, with few or no memories of their birthplace. These acts seek to create a pathway for them to become "legal" immigrants, after passing background checks, able to work and go to school, and live freely and legally in the U.S. While we can agree that our immigration system needs revamping, we do not have to punish the young people who came here not of their own volition.

Scripture clearly gives direction on how God calls us to treat immigrants. Leviticus 19:33-34 reads: "When immigrants live in your land with you, you must not cheat them. Any immigrant who lives with you must be treated as if they were one of your citizens. You must love them as yourself, because you were immigrants in the land of Egypt; I am the Lord your God." Notice how God calls us to healthy relationships through empathy—by remembering we were once immigrants in the land of Egypt, and through covenant with God—reminding us that God is our Lord.

For those of you who might argue that God spoke to Israel in the book of Leviticus, Jesus also reminds us that when we welcome the stranger, we welcome him. (See Matthew 25:35.) And the writer of Hebrews encourages us to welcome the stranger: "Don't neglect to open up your homes to guests, because by doing this some have been hosts to angels without knowing it." Not only do we welcome Jesus when we welcome the immigrant, but we also "host angels," or messengers of God. I believe that the Mexican family in the wedding I conducted served as angels, by offering a gift of prayer from the family as a witness to their faith. How awesome would it be if we incorporated that practice into our weddings, inviting family members to pray over the newlywed couple!

So, how can you host these angels? First, as God teaches us, relationships with immigrants and our covenant with God serve as the foundation of how we respond. Where in your neighborhood do you see immigrants? How might God be calling you to offer them hospitality? Carlos Reyes, the Coordinator of Hispanic Latino Ministries here in the Conference Resource Center, tells of establishing relationships with local business owners, just by walking in and visiting. Through these "drop-ins," he has gotten to know an immigrant couple from Colombia and Pakistan, who have opened up to him in relationship simply because he offered them his presence and hospitality.

Second, as you get to know immigrants or at least listen to their stories and challenges, take the time to speak up for them on their behalf. Join the Conference Rapid Response Team (email Carlos Reyes at <a href="mailto:carlospendel@gmail.com">carlospendel@gmail.com</a>) to get more timely information on how to advocate for these people of God who have no voice in our government. Join with other churches to sponsor a "Justice for our Neighbors" legal clinic (go to <a href="mailto:njfon.org/our-services/legal-clinics">njfon.org/our-services/legal-clinics</a>). Call Congress. Call BEFORE January 19 for a Clean Dream Act -No budget for wall building attached to it- at <a href="mailto:(888) 704-9446">(888) 704-9446</a>. Give your zip code. Say that you demand a Clean Dream Act. Or, if you prefer, write to your representative at <a href="https://www.umcjustice.org/what-you-can-do/advocacy/take-action/protect-daca">https://www.umcjustice.org/what-you-can-do/advocacy/take-action/protect-daca</a>.

Finally, as we build relationships and get to know our neighbors, pray that we will **Connect** with them and the wider community, **Act** on their behalf for justice, empower them to **Lead**, and **Love** them as the neighbors God commands us to love. Then we will be living our mission: "Cultivating Christ communities through our CALL—Connecting, Acting, Leading, and Loving."

#### A WORD ABOUT WHITE PARAMENTS

## Why White?

White is the symbol of purity and holiness. It is used for the **Christmas** season as a sign of respect and reverence for the birth of our Lord.

### What do the symbols represent?

On the altar cloth, the three petaled arms of the fleur-de-lis (lily) crosses symbolize the Trinity. The smaller ones flank the large cross with the I H S initials, mean "In His Sign".

The crown above the crosses on the lectern and pulpit represents the Son of God, the Prince of Peace.

A note of encouragement is always a blessing, as well.

We also invite you to join us in fellowship any evening. 7:00 -8:30 is a great time to come and play games, share testimony, listen with an open heart to another man's story, and be a loving presence during this difficult time in our guests' journeys.
