## **Arrested but not Deterred**

In a blog post entitled “Ten Things You May Not Know about Martin Luther King, Jr. by Christopher Klein, April 4, 2013, we read some interesting facts about the Civil Rights leader who changed the world forever. For example, I never knew that his birth name was Michael and was later changed to “Martin” after his father went to Germany and learned about Martin Luther’s reformation work. King’s father legally changed his name as well. It was a premonition of the work that young Martin was later to do.

I did not know that Dr. King started college at the age of 15 or that he had experienced an assassination attempt by a woman who stabbed him with a letter opener in a department store. I did not know that King’s mother was assassinated by a Sunday service intruder while she was playing the organ in 1974. How did I miss this? Church shootings are sadly new news! On and on the article goes with amazing facts about the life of a man whose legacy continues to shine a light in all of the areas of freedom and justice for all.

The thing that I was not surprised to read was that King was arrested 29 times for his faithful social justice work . Be it civil disobedience or trumped up charges or something as trivial as jail time for driving 30 miles per hour in a 25 miles per hour area, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was no stranger to prisons and jails. Still today “truth” is often put in jail. Power is not pleased with the concept of equality. To unleash that on the world is an affront to those with all the authority and privilege. The

crucible of incarceration gave King time to write important letters, and to pray, but it no doubt steeled his determination to keep doing the work because his imprisonment was in itself a glaring example of the injustice he was confronting. Still today people are put in prison unfairly and often it is the very thing spawns liberation. Former President Nelson Mandela's 27 years in prison created the fire power for a whole new way of life for the people in South Africa. King's imprisonment did the same.

How many times would I be willing to be imprisoned for my convictions? How can we work to make our law enforcement and prison systems more equitable for people of color and people who are doing the sacrificial work of promoting human rights? These are thoughts I ponder on the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. I thank God for his courage and his voice that continues to challenge and shape our world.

### **A WORD ABOUT GREEN PARAMENTS**

#### **Why Green?**

Green symbolizes the promise of new life. It is used during Ordinary Time, a period where there is no special season. This includes the period between Epiphany and Lent, as well as the season between Pentecost and Advent. We will be using green paraments starting this Sunday until Ash Wednesday.

#### **What do the symbols represent?**

The three-petaled arms of the fleur-de-lis crosses are symbols of the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The crown motif represents Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who is our heavenly leader or king.

5. **Knitting.** Members of the knitting group will be giving instruction on basic knitting. They will furnish the yarn and expertise. Just bring your own knitting needles. Or, if you already knit, you can bring your project with you and knit away while enjoying friends and fellowship.

Some supplies will be provided, but more are needed, so please bring some items to help build the kits. Consider items such as: bottled water, granola bars or breakfast bars, packs of tuna, canned meat, individually wrapped crackers, cookies, containers of fruit, plastic utensils, single-serve beverages or food items, toothbrush and holder, medium sized toothpaste, bath soap, wash cloth, hand towel, brush, comb, deodorant, nail clippers, spiral notebooks, pads of paper, 24 count crayons, blunt scissors, 2 inch eraser, sharpened pencils, pencil sharpener, ruler, sponges, cleaning supplies, paper towels. Most of us are very familiar with what is needed, so please be generous.

The event begins at 10:00 A.M. and ends at 2:00 P.M. However, you can feel free to come and go as you please. If you can only spend an hour or two, you will be able to experience some wonderful fellowship as well as help others. Plus, Joanne's yummy "yard sale" hot dogs, chips, and dessert will be provided around lunchtime.

Greetings Friends! Our winter has certainly arrived and with the frigid temperatures, our Code Purple Sussex County shelter here at Avenue UMC has served 36 men so far this season. We have averaged 12-14 recently and we have been blessed with the support of community members and our church family. You may notice, we have placed a chalkboard in the lobby to note specific needs, as we discover shortages in supplies throughout the week. We are so grateful for the rapid response to last week's requests of jeans and sweat pants.

One way community groups and clubs can work to support Code Purple Sussex County, is to prepare GO BAGS for the shelter. Our guests can take a GO BAG in the morning as they leave for the day. This time of year, GO BAGS are best stocked in a large zip lock bag and include a water bottle, a protein, such as a pop top hearty soup or package of tuna, crackers, fruit cup, or applesauce, napkins, and a spoon/fork. A note of encouragement is always a blessing, as well.

We also invite you to join us in fellowship any evening. 7:00 -8:30 is a great time to come and play games, share testimony, listen with an open heart to another man's story, and be a loving presence during this difficult time in our guests' journeys.
