From the desk of our Pastors . . .

This week I am sending you an article that my dear friend Pastor Heidi from Kansas wrote for her monthly newsletter. As we prepare for Lent, I invite you to consider giving up happiness as Heidi plans to do. For those of you wondering if she has lost it completely...read on.

I don't like New Year's resolutions. Have you ever been able to keep a New Year's resolution? As January passes and we head toward the Lenten season, I have to confess that I have never been able to keep a New Year's resolution beyond a few weeks. Giving up or taking on something for Lent, however, has had lasting results. I have given up worry, impatience, and last year, I gave up procrastination and took on being more deliberate about observing Sabbath time.

This year I intend to give up happiness, and take on joy-fullness. Before you ask, "Why would you do something like that?" Let me explain. Over 50 years ago, my father gave a sermon on happiness versus joy. Choosing Christ's joy over happiness made sense, but it shocked me think about giving up happiness. As a ten-year old, my mind went immediately to "What happens to 'Happy Birthday'? and 'Happy New Year?' and 'Happy Valentine's Day'?"

I began to realize that happiness is fleeting, time-bound, and framed by all those not-so-happy moments. Happiness is briefly pleasant, but quite

finite. Joy is for the here and now. God's faithfulness will see us through the good times and the difficult periods, like Jesus' trials in the wilderness. The joy of God's faithfulness is deeply rooted in our beings, and wildly soaring to places beyond our imaginations. Christmas is a time when we celebrate joyfully with the angels, shepherds, and Wise Men, the birth of Jesus: the great gift, the Light of the World. As Peter writes, "Without having seen him you love him; though you do not now see him you believe in him and rejoice with unutterable and exalted joy" (1 Peter 1:8 RSV). In accepting God's gracious gift of Christ, our hearts overflow with joy; through our faith in God's faithfulness, we have hope in our joy-full futures, whatever obstacles may be in God's plan for us; and through this faith, hope, and joy, as Jesus instructed, we learn to love our neighbors as ourselves.

In another expression of joy, Jude writes: "Now unto him to is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy" (Jude 24 KJV). Through this beautiful benediction, we are reminded that joy is for all our present times, all the journeys in our lives, and until all the ends of our earthly lives. The God that we embrace with such joy-fullness will not forsake us.

And to God be the glory forever and ever.

#### Your Mission? To Serve

Earlier this week, I had the opportunity to gather in Atlanta with other Directors of Connectional Ministries throughout the United States, and two from Central Conferences of Liberia and Zimbabwe. One morning, our schedule included a visit to Coca Cola. I wondered what type of "leadership" presentation we would hear, but remained open to what God had in mind. Four representatives from Coke stood at the front of the room and gave testimonies about living as a Christian in the corporate world. They came from different departments and different levels and they reflected gender and racial diversity. Yet, their message sounded in unity. They each saw their work place as their mission field.

They spoke of praying for their co-workers daily before work. One woman shared about being led to begin a prayer chain at work. (She asked the Coke executives, who allow them to use their work email to communicate prayer concerns.) Another woman told of leading a weekly Bible study at work, in a room that Coke provides. Each of them related how they respect other people and other religions, and remained open to sharing about their own faith. They allowed their lifestyle evangelism to create opportunities for building relationships and eventually sharing their faith.

One of our group members asked about their "lifestyle" evangelism and each shared some of their character traits that the Holy Spirit has developed in them. Each one spoke of humility and the importance of being teachable. They spoke of servant leadership and actively looking for opportunities to serve those who work for and with them, and those who work above them. No matter what position they found themselves in, they intentionally looked for ways to serve others throughout their day. One man described how he took time to invest in other people as a way of serving them. He tried to care as much about them as Jesus would. Another man told us that he "takes off his judgement hat" every time he walks through the door, so that he can remain open to serve others.


At the end of the sharing time, one of the men related the following story. He had been working with a woman originally from a Monrovia who worked for him. Her family followed Islam, but she did not practice. A single mother, she had two young children who began asking questions about God and faith. One day, after developing a safe relationship with him, she asked him what he believed. We all laughed at the "softball" God had thrown him.

He shared his testimony with her, how Jesus had changed his life and how the Holy Spirit continued to change his life. He reported that she walked away, but returned several weeks later with some additional questions. Eventually, he invited her to go to the weekly Bible study and to come to church with him, which she did. They developed a friendship through their church and work. A year later, doctors diagnosed the woman with terminal cancer. The man and his family and his church walked that journey with her, providing support and care for her along the way. When her family came to visit her, they felt overwhelmed by the generous love given to her, by people they considered "strangers." She asked to be baptized with her family present and a year later, she died surrounded by members of that new church family.

Our group of Directors of Connectional Ministries left the Coca Cola headquarters filled with hope for God's mission for the church in the world. We affirm frequently that God calls all of the baptized people to ministry. But, often we hear people say: "I could never run my business like a Christian." Or, even more frequently, we hear: "We should run the church like a business." Yes, the church can learn from business principles. AND, business can learn from Christian principles. Can you imagine if everyone began their day asking God to reveal opportunities to SERVE others? Sadly, as Christians, we often expected to BE served. We want schools to cater to us. We want the courts to cater to us. We want businesses to cater to us. And, we want the right to speak the gospel without the hard work of establishing relationships.

Yet, Jesus called us all to servanthood in our relationships. In his final meal with his disciples in John, he put a towel around his waist and washed the disciples' feet. He served them and commanded them to serve others. How is your church doing at serving the community around you? (Notice I asked how are you serving not how are you providing services for your community. Serving requires a relationship, but providing services does not.) In what ways would your community identify your church as serving the good of the community as a whole? And, what about you? In what ways do you serve others throughout your day? How can you keep your eyes open to opportunities to serve?

No matter what goes on around us, Jesus lives! We can continue to see his presence as we intentionally serve others. Your mission, should you choose to accept it? Go and serve. Not only will you offer others the love of God as you serve, you also will meet Jesus in that place. Together, we will become "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ in today's world!"

#### A WORD ABOUT GREEN PARAMENTS

#### Why Green?

Green symbolizes the promise of new life. It is used during Ordinary Time, a period where there is no special season. This includes the period between Epiphany and Lent, as well as the season between Pentecost and Advent. We will be using green paraments starting this Sunday until Ash Wednesday.

#### What do the symbols represent?

The three-petaled arms of the fleur-de-lis crosses are symbols of the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The crown motif represents Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who is our heavenly leader or king.

UNITED METHODIST MEN (UMM) are proud to serve their third Pancake Breakfast of the year on February 11, 2018.
