From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Once again, my dear friend from Kansas, Pastor Heidi, wrote a beautiful monthly meditation that I feel compelled to share with you. Here is her take on the season of Pentecost to come. To God be the glory forever and ever.

Some people are morning people, and some people are evening people. When I was a child, my bed was next to an east-facing window. I remember waking to the first bird calls, and then, feeling the first rays of the morning sun gently cross my pillow. Oh, how I love the morning! Now, I listen for the cardinal's morning melody. How do they know that the sun is surely rising soon? And then, I watch for the sun's rays as they first breach the horizon. Perhaps the difference in my appreciation of the morning now, is that I like to turn my back to the sun, and watch the rays march across the prairie or down the mountainsides. I appreciate the soft morning light in the western sky as it changes the clouds from a soft pink to a peach against the blue sky revealing all the hues of the land or waters that welcome it. The sun seems to take its time to awaken each blade of grass, each creature, each wave, each ripple, each rock and each grain of sand in their turns.

Fifty years ago I wrote a song entitled, "My Mother's Garden." It came from thinking about Jesus' revolutionary idea expressed in the Sermon on the Mount: "You have heard it said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven; for he makes his

sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust (Matthew 5: 43-45 RSV). The last refrain of the song went like this: "For God sends down the rain and the sun to water and warm all the garden."

Ascension Thursday and Pentecost will soon be upon us, so you may be wondering where I am going with this meditation on mornings. It seems to me that we do not need to worry sentimentally about the comings and goings of the sun or the rain, for, as Christians, God's lovingkindness is the constant in our lives. We are free to greet each day with grateful hearts and understand in the core of our being that "God is love" (1 John 4:8). As the writer of Lamentations said, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning" (Lamentations 3:22-23 NRSV). What we can do, is to appreciate God's creation, and more importantly, our being in it. Even more, like the psalmist, we can find the joy in it, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalm 119:24 NRSV). Or like the morning birds, we can exclaim, "Awake, my soul! Awake, O harp and lyre! I will awake the dawn" (Psalm 57:8 NRSV).

God's love is eternal, divinely mysterious, unchanging, and passionately active in our lives as communicated through his only begotten son, Jesus. "This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins" (1 John 4:10 NIV). As we are grateful for each morning, and for the knowledge that God loves us more than we can ever understand through the gift of His Son, it seems that we cannot help but to serve Him. As we learn to love one another, we find that God abides in us. Perhaps we do not even recognize the actions that come from our gratitude for God's love; but far more than the actions that we devise ourselves, the actions coming from our gratitude are the proof of God's grace acting to heal and restore us. As the psalmist expressed, "If I take the wings of the morning, and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast" (Psalms 139: 9-10 NRSV). Each morning, we can feel blessed by Christ's ascension, the descent of the Holy Spirit as our Advocate, and the inclusion of all mankind in the outpouring of God's love.

Fruit of the Peace Tree

My favorite moment came from an unplanned part of the ceremony. Isn't that how God frequently works? This past Sunday, at Camp Pecometh, the Peninsula-Delaware Conference held a Peace Tree Ceremony with the six Native tribes in our area: Lenape, Nanticoke, Nanticoke Lenni-

Lenape, Accohannock, Assateague, and Nause Waiwash. During the 2016 Annual Conference of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, we opened our worship with a time of confession and repentance toward our Native brothers and sisters, and we promised to continue to walk this journey with specific actions. As part of worship, our Conference leaders made specific promises to walk in this path of repentance and reconciliation and we also chose the symbol of the Peace Tree. After that worship service, we planted the Peace Tree (a white pine) at

Pecometh and began to plan a ceremony involving the tree.

We recognize that reconciliation involves a journey of a thousand steps. This Peace Tree Ceremony will be an additional marker of that journey. We pray that the Peace Tree will serve as a reminder that relationships take time and that they must be nurtured and fertilized and watered in order to grow. We recommit ourselves to building, healing, and restoring these relationships.



The Tree of Peace symbol arose from the Iroquois Nations. The five tribes had been at war on and off for over five centuries. Creator sent a man who preached the good news of peace. He eventually convinced the tribes to commit their lives to peace. Bringing the tribes together, he dug up a white pine as a Tree of Peace. Underneath that tree flowed a deep river. At its roots, he had the tribes lay down their weapons, letting them fall into the river below to be carried deep into the earth. As he replanted the pine, he instructed the tribes that they had "buried the hatchet," and therefore committed themselves to peace.

During the ceremony, the Bishop and Cabinet members read words written on sticks. These words have become weapons, further injuring our Native sisters and brothers. The words included various massacres (and

particularly the Sand Creek
Massacre, where a Methodist pastor
killed over 200 Native women and
children), boarding schools (The
Methodist Church ran 14 of the 150
boarding schools during that era),
the taking of Native lands and
territories, the forced relocation of
Natives, the forced assimilation into
European culture, the Doctrine of
Discovery, the use of mascots such



as the Redskins, rape, and a multitude of health crises such as a three-fold risk of suicide among Native young people as compared to the national average, higher poverty, lower education, higher incidence of diabetes and tuberculosis. As we read each "weapon" aloud, we dropped them into a basket. The pastor holding the basket, Rev. Shane Moran, then dumped them into the hole next to the Peace Tree.

When Pastor Shane picked up the shovel and began to bury the weapons, the Cabinet had been instructed to just stand there. However, I saw a second shovel. I picked it up and asked Pastor Shane if I could help. He agreed and I shoveled some of the dirt into the hole. It felt good burying those hurtful events.



It felt as if we were truly putting them to rest and committing ourselves to a time of mutual peace. After a few shovels, I looked up and noticed the rest of the Cabinet standing behind me. They, too, wanted to participate in burying those hurtful words and weapons. I watched as each member took a turn at the shovel. After just committing ourselves verbally to continue this journey of reconciliation, we acted out our dedication to work against remaining injustices by burying the hatchet of words.

We had not planned for that moment. Yet, the Spirit showed up, offering us a beautiful moment of acting out the promises we had made. I thought of how the whole process reflected our Conference Vision and Mission.

In conversations with tribal leaders, listening to their pain and triumph, we became "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ to today's world." Through our actions, we "Connected" to God and one another; we "Acted" to prevent repeating past mistakes; we "Led" the way in demonstrating to the world that reconciliation takes time and commitment; and we "Loved" one another through repentance and forgiveness. In that way, we also "Cultivated Christ communities through our CALL—Connecting, Acting, Leading, and Loving." Where have you seen the Spirit show up in your life recently? Open your eyes! Look in those unexpected moments. Jesus will appear. He is risen!







Greetings:

"I can do all this through Him who gives me strength." Philippians 4:13 NIV

On May 26, 2018 I will be departing for Cambodia. I cannot begin to tell you how thankful I am for you and all your prayers and financial support. Please know that you will be part of the ministry in Cambodia. I can not do this without you and the power of the Holy Spirit.

Since my last letter, I attended training at Mission Training International in Palmer Lake, Colorado. I participated with others preparing to leave for an extended season in a foreign country. During these four intense weeks we became a family, and they will forever have a special place in my heart.

The first two weeks of training involved language learning, covering such topics as; what to expect, a day in the life of a language learner, lifestyle of language learning, community and family language learning, motivation and morale, phonetics, and practice drills. At the conclusion, my confidence level for the ability to learn Khmer (Cambodian Language) increased significantly.

The following two weeks dealt with heart issues regarding transitioning, managing stress, communicating, grief & loss, embracing rest & keeping The Sabbath, and how to say goodbyes & hellos. Let me just say there were several tears shed during this time period. However, I feel more prepared for the challenges I will be facing. Being in rhythm with God and taking confidence in knowing His grace is sufficient will greatly aid my transitioning to Cambodia.

Meanwhile, I am finishing up a lot of loose ends here in the States and saying good goodbyes so that I can say good hellos when I arrive in Cambodia.

Speaking of good goodbyes, I would like to invite you to a special Commissioning Service which will be held May 20, 2018 at 9:30 AM at Lincoln United Methodist Church, which is my home church to send me forth. This will be my last Sunday in the United States for a season. It would greatly warm my heart if you could attend.

Again, on May 26, 2018 at 10:55 AM I will board Emirates flight EK232 from Dulles International Airport to Dubai International Airport (13-hour 10-minute flight). When I arrive in Dubai there will be a 90-minute layover before boarding Emirates flight EK388 to Phnom Penh International Airport (9-hour 10-minute flight).

Everything I currently know how to do will be coming to a halt once I arrive in Phnom Penh, Cambodia. Therefore, I need your prayers. My goal for the first year is simply to survive and hold on tight to Jesus as I step out in complete faith. When I first arrive in Cambodia I will be staying in a hotel until I locate an apartment. I will also need to purchase a phone, get somewhat settled, figure out how to buy groceries, where or how to pay bills, find a language helper, get familiar with the area and begin language school on July 2nd.

In closing, I want to say thank you to all my partners and also inform you the address to TMS Global has changed. Their new address is TMS Global, P.O. Box 936559, Atlanta, GA 31193-6559. WHAT IS THE BIG CANDLE IN THE FRONT OF THE SANCTUARY?

This is the Paschal candle. It is one of the most sacred and enduring elements in Christianity. It is adorned with one or more Christian symbols, often the cross to represent His redemptive sacrifice; symbols of grapes, for the Eucharist - the true presence of Christ and our spiritual strength; and the Lamb of God, which is Christ.

The Paschal candle is a rich symbol of our faith. It reaches its pinnacle at Easter. Each year on Easter Sunday it is the first candle lit. The "new" fire serves as an image of the Resurrection. The candle, which represents Christ himself, is placed on a special Paschal candle stand near the altar. This candle, also called the Easter Candle, originated in the earliest days of Christianity, when evening prayer began with the lighting of a candle. This practice was probably inspired by the Jewish custom of lighting a lamp at the conclusion of the Sabbath.

In the time of Constantine, we are told by the historian Eusebius that the emperor "transformed the night of the sacred Easter Vigil into the brilliancy of day, by lighting throughout the whole city pillars of wax, so that this mystic vigil was rendered brighter than the brightest daylight."
