I love my college alma mater. I am a proud Nittany Lion from Penn State, as many of you know but recently the university did something that made me wonder if every member of the trustees had lost their mind.

When I was at Penn State, we had a very active outing club. It was made up of six "sub-clubs" that included the camping/hiking, ski, spelunking, rock climbing, kayaking and scuba clubs. As a sophomore, I became president of the ski club and in my junior year took over as president of the entire outing club. The main objective of each sub-club was to offer instruction to beginners in each sport, and trip or "outings" for the more advanced members. It was a great way to learn new skills or spend time improving the sports you already were involved with.

So, imagine my shock and disbelief when the university decided that the outing club could no longer "go out" and do anything that took the members beyond cell phone range. For those of you who think I am kidding...well I wish I was. Feel free to Google the whole thing. The National Review did a particularly good story on the situation.

The Club is almost 100 years old and for most of those years everyone involved was out of cell phone range because we didn't have cell phones. What a shock

Pray for the Women

At the close of our Welcome Reception in the Democratic Republic of Congo, the women clergy came forward with a special presentation to Bishop Peggy Johnson. Not deemed "worthy" enough for the main ceremony, they came undaunted by that insult. They gave Bishop Johnson a gift in honor of the work that she does and, more importantly, of the hope that she brings them. Maybe one day, they said, even Africa will elect a female bishop. You could see the yearning in their expressions: yearning to have their gifts for ministry accepted and celebrated, yearning to serve God with all of their hearts and souls and minds and strengths without hindrance due to their gender.

Contrast that with another reception the bishop received, this one from a church where she went to preach. The church leaders there presented her with a wooden statue of a woman bowing down at a man's feet. They told her that her husband is the head of her and she serves him. They clearly made their point: they did not respect her leadership as a woman.

Later, when we visited the pastors' school, we saw very few women clergy. We also learned that every new pastor gets sent out to start their own church when they finish their training. Can you

imagine the challenge of these women, who receive no respect in their communities, trying to plant a new faith community? I admire their courage and sense of calling that is strong enough to overcome such discrimination.

Imagine, then, the feelings of disappointment in The United Methodist Church, whose conferences failed to pass an amendment stating that "men and women are of equal value in the eyes of God." This amendment stated that "maleness and femaleness are characteristics of human bodies, not the divine," and promised that The United Methodist Church would "seek to eliminate discrimination against women and girls, whether in organizations or in individuals, in every facet of its life and in society at large." We, in the United States, tend to assume the truth of these statements, and our privilege blinds us to the detrimental impact of failing to pass this amendment. It passed in all of the Annual Conferences by 66.5%, just short of the two-thirds majority needed.



Sadly, in Central Congo, the amendment received NO votes in support. My heart breaks for those faithful female pastors who still withstand much discrimination and abuse at the hands of men. Our Peninsula-Delaware Conference supported the amendment overwhelmingly, by 260-18. I very much appreciate the statement that support makes, declaring women as having equal value to men in the eyes of God.

However, because of my time in the DRC, I cannot sit back in the midst of my privilege while my sisters in other parts of the world suffer. I have added to my daily prayer a request for guidance on how to respond. How can I support my sisters in Christ around the world? How does God call me to support, in particular, my clergy sisters in the Democratic Republic of Congo?

I invite you to join me in this prayer effort, as you feel led. Perhaps, by praying together, God will reveal to us a way to tangibly demonstrate our support of women around the world. Maybe we can



support the fresh water wells being dug in the DRC. Women spend hours each day traveling to a river to carry murky water back to their homes. Clean water from wells saves women hours of work each day. Additionally, the clean water prevents so much disease. Our Congo Partnership, supported by your apportionments and by the special offering we take at Annual Conference, paid for a drill to be shipped up country to dig wells for very isolated communities. While there, we witnessed the workers striking water and celebrated as the fresh water began to flow out. What if we pooled our resources enough to purchase a drill to keep up country, traveling from

village to village to provide clean water? Then, we would be living out our vision of "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ to today's world," as we provide both fresh water and the Living Water of Jesus Christ. Please join me in prayer and let's see what God has in mind.

WHY RED?

As we celebrated high holy days of Easter, we enjoyed the beautiful white paraments which symbolize purity, holiness and virtue. Now we move into the season of Pentecost, and change the color of the paraments to red. The color of fire, red symbolizes the presence of God.

The symbols on the altar paraments are the initials, I H S, the first three letters of the Greek spelling of the Holy Name of Jesus. This is the symbol of the Holy Name of Jesus.

The Patonce Crosses on each side of I H S have expanded ends, with three petals on each arm.

The three petals represent the Trinity, and the total of twelve petals represent the Apostles. The Crosses on the lectern and pulpit are also Patonce crosses.
