There is one thing that should be recognized every day however, and that is Jesus. Even if we are diligent at showing up in worship on Sundays, we need to make our Savior someone we celebrate every day of every month of every year. One day a week is not enough.

Revelation 4:11 says "Worthy are you, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power, for you created all things, and by your will they existed and were created."

The God who has created all, who has saved us from death, and is walking with us through every moment of our lives deserves our love, praise and acknowledgement each and every day. For to Him belongs the glory and honor forever and ever.

The Commission on a Way Forward and the upcoming Special General Conference in the United Methodist Church

The Commission on a Way Forward was constituted at the last General Conference of the United Methodist Church in May 2016. It was assembled to study the way that the church could minister to all people even with very different views of human sexuality and homosexuality across the connection of the church. The Commission has brought together persons deeply committed to the future(s) of The United Methodist Church, with an openness to developing new relationships with each other and exploring the potential future(s) of our denomination in light of General Conference and subsequent annual, jurisdictional and central conference actions.

We have a profound hope and confidence in the Triune God, and yet we acknowledge that we do this work in a climate of skepticism and distrust, from a human point of view. We are a connection, and we admit that our communion is strained; yet much transformative mission across our world is the fruit of our collaboration.

The matters of human sexuality and unity are the presenting issues for a deeper conversation that surfaces different ways of interpreting Scripture and theological tradition. The work has been meant to inform deliberation across the whole church and to help the Council of Bishops in their service to the next General Conference in finding a way forward.

Bishop Schol of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference has written a letter to the church which is below. It articulates well the positions of the Council of Bishops about the various plans that were developed by the Commission. Bishop Schol wrote this:

The Commission with input from the Council of Bishops completed its work and sent the full report, more than 100 pages to the staff of the General Conference for translation and release to the church. In addition to the Commission's report, additional legislation related to homosexuality has been sent by churches, individuals and groups and also must be translated. It will be months until the translation is complete.

What seemed appropriate to the Bishops, translate the one report by July 8, is unrealistic with the additional legislation.

I recognize how important this material is not only for the General Conference delegates but for all United Methodists as we seek to discuss, understand and pray for the way forward of our beloved United Methodist Church. I regret that a commitment was made that in hindsight was not realistic.

The Commission's report outlines three proposals and their variations include:

1. **The Traditionalist Plan:** Strengthen the existing language about homosexuality in the Book of Discipline and create swift and strong punishment of anyone that does not follow the Book of Discipline. It also provides exit plans for churches who no longer feel the United Methodist Church represents their values.

The Council of Bishops is not recommending this model because it will create disruption, church trials and pain for individuals and congregations that would distract us from our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The Bishops also do not believe or want to encourage “exit plans” that encourage people to leave the church because they do not agree with an aspect of the church. The Bishops believe we are stronger and healthier through our differences, not by dividing the church.

2. The Connectional Conference Plan: Create a Connectional Conference Model for the church which allows congregations to decide to be a part of one of three “branches”/conferences in the United States - progressive, centrist or conservative. Each of these conferences could modify the Book of Discipline and align church practices to their theology and understanding. Present annual conferences and even congregations could choose different “branches”/conferences.

The Council of Bishops is not recommending this model to the General Conference. A similar model was created in 1939 which separated a majority of African Americans and the rest of the church into distinct conferences. It was finally disbanded in 1968 and caused lasting pain to many in our denomination. It would not be helpful for us to be separate but equal, separating us by theology and segregating gays and lesbians. It would also require years to implement, maybe as many as 10 years and that would detract us from the mission of Jesus Christ and focus us on institutional matters. In essence, this plan creates three denominations within a denomination.

3. The One Church Plan: Create a One Church Plan that allows:

- Congregations to decide their marriage policies.
- Pastors to determine who they will marry.
- Boards of Ordained Ministry and clergy executive sessions to determine fit and readiness for ministry.

The Council of Bishops is recommending this model to the General Conference because it preserves appropriate local decision-making and does not require congregations to think and act alike. It preserves our unity in the midst of differences, allows for contextualization and provides the least disruption to the mission of Jesus Christ.

This proposal represents the Bishops’ best discernment around these critical and sensitive matters. The Bishops request that you intentionally and purposefully pray for our church as we enter into this season of deliberation and discernment.

I recognize there will be United Methodists that will not be in agreement with the proposed plan by the Bishops. Some will find it hard to be in a church that allows discrimination against gays and lesbians. Others will not accept that parts of our denomination will allow congregations, pastors and conferences to make their own decisions about marriage and leadership for the church that may include gays and lesbians. I recognize the Bishops’ recommendation will generate different feelings and opinions. I humbly ask you to stay open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in the church and in your life. I hope that while we may not all think alike, we will all love as Jesus loved.

Regardless of the outcome of the 2019 Special General Conference, I pledge to you to be your bishop, a bishop of the whole church. The Special General Conference could adopt or modify one of the plans listed above or make no change at all. I cannot not envision United Methodists in Greater New Jersey not gathering and serving together in one Annual Conference. We are united in common purpose and we continue to be graceful in our disagreements.

If there is change, I will not make appointments or lead in a way that seeks to change your mind about homosexuality. Each of us arrives at various beliefs based on our experiences, understandings and convictions. If General Conference does not make any changes to our Book of Discipline, I will continue to lead in our mission and respect our clergy and laity serving contextually in their ministry with their community.

I call us to stay focused on our mission, to make disciples of Jesus Christ and to grow vital congregations to transform the world. Let's not allow differences to deter us from serving Christ in and through our congregations. We have made great progress and God has a future with hope for us.

Thank you for being United Methodist, for your commitment to Jesus Christ and for your service to the church and the world. In the midst of the vast diversity found within our United Methodist Church, the Bishops continue to work for the unity of the church and long for each of us to BE OF ONE HEART in our desire to discern the mind and will of Jesus Christ for the mission of our church.

Church Council Minutes from May 16, 2018

Present: Pastor Tom Pasmore, Pastor Wendy Owen (acting secretary), Carolyn Humes, Jack Dickerson, Jack Sheaffer, Vaughn Webb, Mike Swain, Jim Clendaniel, Bob Berglund, Sarah Pasmore.

Jack Dickerson led us in the opening prayer

The minutes from the last Leadership Team meeting from May 1, 2018 were distributed. There were no questions.

Administrative Reports

Finance:

The 1st quarter budget was met. Expenses are in line. Monthly giving is being watched closely because of the passing of several large givers. Cash is good. The funds in the money market are higher than the liabilities.

The discussion of Jo Wood's estate funds included a proposal to open an account specifically for these funds. Jim Clendaniel was authorized to act on behalf of the church in all matters related to the banking and investment accounts. Jim agreed to act in that capacity. Tom Pasmore made the motion to open the account, with Jim Clendaniel as the authorized agent on behalf of the church. It was seconded by Vaughn Webb. The proposal was passed unanimously.

There was also notification to the church council of the memorial money from the Crabb estate going into the IRA as directed by the Crabb family.

Trustees:

There were two main issues of the Trustees. The two were the decisions of the Trustees to not allow the RVRC to rent space in the building and the requirements of the Trustees in order to continue with Code Purple.

Code Purple: In order for Code Purple to continue to use Avenue, the following requirements must be met. Guests will be fed and processed offsite. Guests will come in and out of the Wesley Room only. All activities will take place in the Wesley Room and there is no time when guests should be upstairs. There should be two volunteers on site at all times. There will only be to-go bags for breakfast and lunch and all food service issues will be eliminated. There is no need for people to be on the second floor and transitions from floor-to-floor will not be needed.

In addition, there will be no women allowed to stay over-night and female volunteers will be able to volunteer at the women's shelter. The sofas and furniture will be off limits, with the exception of the cots. Everyone must be run through the law enforcement system to check and make sure there are no sex offenders before being allowed to stay over at Avenue until they are cleared. If not cleared, they will be sent to Seaford.

Jack Dickerson made a motion that Code Purple be allowed to stay at Avenue with the caveats listed above. Jack Sheaffer seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Rich Vanstory Resource Center (RVRC): The Trustees decided not to rent to this organization that does outpatient support for drug addicted individuals. There was a concern about safety. The Trustees asked for a vote of the Church Council in affirmation of their decision. Jim Clendaniel made the motion, which was seconded by Jack Sheaffer, to deny the request of the RVRC and it passed.

There was a review of the Greeter program. Bob Berglund reminded the group that there was to be no parking in the fire lane and only alongside the church in the designated spots. There was a discussion of how we can see and monitor who comes to the doors by using the camera and the greeters. The electronic

locks would be programmed for the openings and closings as decided by the Trustees. A question was raised on how often there are church shootings in this country. The trustees also agreed to meet with the choir and remind them that the fire lane needed to stay clear.

The banner for the yard sale was in design at the time of the meeting. The old wooden sign would not be going back up but the yard sale banner would replace the VBS banner once VBS was over.

The church van was not needed for the mission trip to Florida because of the number of people who flew there. The mechanical issues associated with the trailer have been fixed and the power steering still sounds loud but is safe. The issues with the trailer have been fixed. The boy Scouts will detail the van as a service project for the church.

SPRC:

There was no formal report from SPRC as there was nothing to discuss.

The minutes of the last church council meeting from February 21 were reviewed and there was a motion by Jack Dickerson to approve them, seconded by Vaughn Webb and the motion was unanimously passed.

The question of whether girls would be allowed to enter the Cub Scout pack, with the plan to allow them to join Boy Scouts in the future was brought before Church Council. Pastor Wendy brought up concerns about how the programs, which includes separate girl dens, would be staffed and supported. It basically brings into the church two packs. There were also questions about the boys and girls being together in the scouting ranks. Sarah Pasmore gave excellent reasons as to why it would be good for the girls to have similar opportunities of the boys. The vote then went before the council and there were seven votes for denying access at this time and revisiting the situation in the future. There was one vote against denying girls access. Two people did not vote.

At 8:05, Pastor Tom gave the closing prayer and the meeting was concluded.
