From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Hurricane Florence is still out in the ocean and there seems to be some dissention among weather forecasters about where it will make landfall. No matter where it lands however, there is sure to be wind, rain and quite possibly widespread power outages. People along the path will be stocking up with essentials.

The potential rain event and the need to make a Walmart trip for supplies made me think of the 70-year-old woman who is in a video on YouTube that went viral a month ago. In this video you see her pushing her cart in a Walmart parking lot towards her car in a massive downpour. By the time she gets her items in the back of the vehicle, she is getting wet. But rather than climb in her car and head for home, she takes her cart back to the cart collection location and gets completely soaked. It is not until she secures her cart that she gets into her automobile and heads to the warmth and safety of her residence. I am very sure she was not expecting her actions would be recorded but as the woman who shot the video said, it was just amazing to see someone do the right thing especially under these circumstances.

Some of you may be thinking she was nuts not to just get out of the rain as quickly as she could. Others may appreciate her thoughtfulness for thinking of the employees who have to come and gather the carts from the parking lot. And yet others will think it was no big deal either way because she was already wet. What would you have done in a similar situation?

Scripture tells us that we are always to put others before ourselves. In Romans 12:10, we are reminded of what Paul says when he writes, "Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor."

I think the woman in the video outdid a lot of people by showing honor and sisterly love to the Walmart employees she probably didn't even know. Her small but powerful gesture spoke volumes about her character and the love in her heart for her brothers and sisters.

By doing the right thing, and witnessing to God's love even when it is uncomfortable or inconvenient, we too can bring honor and glory to God forever and ever.

Healing Connections

This summer, I had the opportunity to visit with friends whom I had not seen in over twenty years. When Bo and I were first married, we moved to San Diego, to report for duty on our ships. We lived in Coronado and joined St. Paul's United Methodist Church there. Soon after we joined, the pastor asked us to lead a Young Adult Bible Study (we were only 22 years old!), to be held in the home of Fred and Evy. At the time, Fred and Evy seemed ancient to us. We laughed this summer when we realized that they were the age we are now, which no longer seems so ancient.

Fred and Evy were each in their third marriage. Bo and I had known very few divorced people, so at first we were tempted to judge them. However, as soon as we met in their home, we realized how wrong our judgment had been. They demonstrated such unconditional love for each other, and that love spilled over to us. We felt so welcomed and accepted in their home, that we continued to meet weekly for dinner long after the Bible Study ended. We began to call them, "Mom and Dad-West" for the west coast, and they embraced that role fully.

Bo likes to tell the story of going to their home for dinner one night while I was out to sea. If you know Bo, you know that he has a very "Southern" sense of time, meaning he often shows up late. That day, he left his ship about half an hour late and rushed to their home, apologizing as soon as he walked in the door. He noticed, as he apologized, that Fred and Evy seemed very relaxed and not upset at all with his lateness. He commented on it and they replied, "Oh, we know you always come a little late, so we adjust." They jokingly referred to it as "Stith Standard Time." That story reflects the abundant grace they had for everyone in their lives. They helped us whenever one or the other of us was out to sea. They helped us pack our house and clean it when we moved. They provided us with such faithful friendship.

So, although we kept up with them through letters and email and Facebook, we had not seen them since our daughter was nine months old. This summer, we traveled to see them with wounded spirits. Our son, Elijah, had died unexpectedly, grieving our hearts and wearying our souls. We arrived at their new home uncertain of what to expect. But, we should have known. Fred and Evy welcomed us again with such love and grace, providing a balm to help heal our hearts. We picked up as if we had never been separated, sharing stories and reminiscing, crying and laughing, as we allowed ourselves to just be loved.

And, love us they did. From wonderful homecooked meals to thoughtfully planned outings, from relaxed schedules to the healer of all ills—ice cream, Fred and Evy lived up once again to their role of Mom and Dad-West. Their hospitality and grace opened our eyes once again to the presence of the risen Christ and renewed our hope. After two wonderful days, they sent us off with food and snacks, new clothing and gifts, which reminded us of stories in the Old Testament where people loaded down camels with food and gifts to send people on their way to continue their journey. Even now as I reflect back on that visit, God floods my soul with peace and gratitude for that sense of welcome, of belonging, of healing, and of being renewed and sent back on the journey.

Of course, I think about the connections of this story with our churches. So many people in our communities have broken hearts and wounded souls. They long to have somewhere to belong, where they will not be judged, where they will be accepted and loved for who they are, where they will receive abundant grace and healing. Yet, many people do not think that they will find these gifts in a church. In response, they reject the church before they can be rejected. But, that rejection does not heal their spirits. As followers of Jesus, we believe only the presence of the living Christ can bring that healing.

Yet, Jesus did not sit around waiting for people to come to him. He went to where they were, offering healing and love along the way. As followers of Jesus, we need to follow him out of the churches and into our communities, where the people are. Yes, many of the people have been hurt. And, as Bo and I learned when we adopted Elijah, "Hurt people hurt people." So, we will be hurt in the process. Yet, we will also experience great joy in being in the presence of Jesus.

We want to help equip you to meet people where they are. This fall, we will offer two workshops (in the place of The Well), designed to empower churches to minister to the wounded in their communities. The first, on October 20 from 9:00-noon at St. Luke's UMC in Denton, Maryland, we will offer a workshop called, "Churches as First Responders to the Military and Veteran Population." The training will include recognizing military or Veteran congregant families facing problems, understanding military culture and its impact on families, and roles in ministering to congregants with moral injury. Many of our veterans suffer from PTSD, which negatively impacts their families and often leads to addiction issues. See <u>the flier</u> for more details and registration.

The second workshop will deal directly with opioid addiction. Rev. Dr. Barry Steiner Ball will offer a workshop on November 17 to empower churches to minister to families, children, and all people impacted by opioid addiction. We cannot sit by idly while this addiction epidemic ravages our communities. Churches CAN make a difference. Save the date and check back on the website as we update the information.

As churches, Jesus invites us to follow him out into our communities to offer radical hospitality, abundant grace, and healing. We will make mistakes. We will get hurt. And, we will experience the amazing presence of Jesus. Andre Trocmé, a priest in a French town which hid Jewish people from the Nazis, when asked about why he took the risk, said: "I could not stand to be apart from Jesus." I pray that we also may find it hard to be away from Jesus, so that we will take the risk together to become "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ in today's world."

CODE PURPLE INFO & UPCOMING TRAINING!

We are building a team of volunteers to help serve our homeless guests for the 2018/2019 cold weather season! Please join us to learn more about Code Purple and how you can get involved. This vital resource is dependent on volunteerism as Code Purple Sussex County is 100% volunteer run. Most of our emergency winter sanctuaries are open each night from December 15th until March 15th. Volunteer spots include: intake, overnight, morning relief, clean-up crews, transportation, laundry and dinner service. (To *Sign Up* for dinner sponsorship and other volunteer opportunities, please use the link found on our website at codepurplesussexcounty.com **Volunteers/Servants!**). Last year we served 150 literally homeless neighbors at our shelters. We served the elderly, families, the infirm, those recently released from prison, and sometimes persons struggling with addiction or persons with mental health not being treated. Each guest is uniquely homeless...each vulnerable...each one matters!

Code Purple opens "on call" once the weather dips down below 32. We call these "bookends" and volunteers will sign up to volunteer <u>if</u> Code Purple is called. However, once December 15th arrives, we have 6 sanctuaries *stay open* regardless of the temperature until March 15th. Our Laurel sanctuary opens every night of January & February. It takes an average of 12 people per night at each site to effectively operate a Code Purple Sussex County Site (we have 11 total certified CPSC Sites). The other sites open as overflow.

That means we have a potential of 132 volunteer spots to fill each night just to provide basic coverage during the season!
