From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Walking downtown in Rehoboth last weekend, I saw someone with a t-shirt that said, "And then Satan said, put the alphabet in math." I had never thought about it that way but as a non-math person, I can understand the concept. For all of you math, engineering and technical types...my hat is off to you. If you want to talk about Shakespeare than I am your girl. For all questions related to math, please check in with Pastor Tom.

I don't really think Satan made the decision to include letters in mathematical equations but there are times when things are going wrong or don't make sense that I do believe Satan is working very hard to stir up trouble. Something that can seem such a "normal" issue, can turn into a major obstacle that keeps us from focusing on Jesus when it becomes stressful or mind-consuming. (For millions of people, math is a real problem – no pun intended),

And those usual things – like a math test or a problem with the car or any type of typical tribulation that hits our days – can easily take our minds off of God. Those small annoyances, which we don't think to pray about because they are day-to-day concerns, can be just as harmful to us spiritually if we let them pile up and don't address them with God. We are likely to turn to the Lord for the "big problems" like health or relationship issues, but how often do we think that the enemy might be using those small things to get us to turn from God?

It's why the Bible tells us in 1 Chronicles 16:11 to, "Seek the Lord and His

strength; seek his presence continually." Scripture tells us to seek God constantly, for the big and the small things. Nothing is too small or too large for God to handle. God can handle everything we give to Him, simultaneously with all the other issues that the rest of the world gives. He is God and His power is infinite.

So often when someone is in my office and I ask about whether he/she has prayed about a problem I get the response that he/she didn't because "so many others have things worse than me." While that may seem noble and kind, it is also being unfaithful. By saying you don't think God will have time to deal with your "smaller" issues, you basically say you don't trust that God can handle it all. Why limit God?

For one week I would like you to try giving every issue you can think of to God – whether it be a major health problem, an upcoming or current stress like a math test, and all those "smaller" trials like lost keys, that keep us from focusing on the Lord. For one week, just see what it feels like to give everything to God and to know that He is carrying it for us. I will be curious to hear from you about how it felt so send me an email or stop by to tell me.

Rather than limit God, let us give all the glory, honor, power...and issues to Him, forever and ever.

Believing and being there for domestic violence victims October is Domestic Violence & Intimate Partner Violence Prevention Month (Also known as National Domestic Violence Awareness Month) By Bishop Peggy Johnson

She came to the United Methodist-sponsored DeafBlind Camp*, this young woman with a small child. Her husband dropped her off. She could neither see nor hear. But faithful volunteers interpreted for her, making tactile deaf signs in her hands. And they led her from place to place during the week of camp activities.



I was running the camp; so I did not have much contact with "Audrey."** The woman who served as her support service provider (SSP) sensed that she was burdened with something; but the nature of it was unclear.

Being deaf and blind comes with huge daily challenges. God bless this volunteer helper! After camp ended she went to visit "Audrey" at her home, and they formed a bond of friendship.

It was through that bond that the terrible truth about Audrey's husband came to light. He would beat her and kick her and put things in her way, so she would fall and hurt herself. This was unbelievable cruelty behind closed doors.

Thanks to much intervention and support, the volunteer helped Audrey escape from this abusive environment, move out of the state (with her young child), endure divorce and custody court proceedings, and begin a new life. It all started with a relationship and the simple fact that the volunteer believed her story and then did something about it.

Suffering in secret, silent agony

Many people are living, suffering in secret, silent agony because of abuse. That includes women and some men, attacked both in and outside of the home. Their abuse comes in the form of physical violence, sexual violence and emotional violence. Emotional violence can be as damaging as a fist.



October is "National Domestic Violence and Intimate Partner Violence Prevention Month." Our churches can play an important role in prevention by teaching people about appropriate ways of dealing with anger, proper dating protocols and the dangers of producing and handling pornography.

Our denomination's Commission on United Methodist Men has a wonderful, eight-week learning program to help men in our churches and communities. Adapted from a YWCA program, **Amending through Faith** seeks to cultivate a healthy masculinity that recognizes and challenges disrespect and violence against women as a stubborn cultural norm.





The faith community must respond

Everyone should come to learn about the signs and solutions to domestic violence and ways that we as the Body of Christ can help end this deadly, widespread scourge on our society's treatment of women and families. We must get more involved, so we can become wellsprings of healing and hope for wounded victims, many of whom don't believe the church cares or is willing or able to help.



The most important thing is believing the victim. Audrey's life was changed when one person found her story to be credible. John 8:32

says "You shall know the truth and the truth shall set you free." When truth is told it needs to be believed and then acted upon.

Many times, a victim will summon the courage to tell their story; but then they are not believed. In some cases, they are punished and ostracized for it. The fear of this syndrome prevents many from coming forward to tell their stories of often terrible abuse. Instead, they keep it hidden, like a festering sore on their souls. And it never heals or disappears.

Believe people when they have the courage to tell the truth. But don't just stop there. Believing means doing something about it. It means coming alongside persons to offer emotional support. It means:

- helping victims with escape plans and financial support,
- helping both victim and perpetrator find needed therapy,
- supporting "safe" houses in your area that provide transitional services,
- posting signs in bathroom stalls about how to get help, etc.

The possibilities are endless. It means stepping out and taking risks. Liberating truth is costly, but it is also a sign of our belief and discipleship in Jesus Christ. His depth of compassionate love and his actions to heal and set free oppressed persons should be our example.

*The <u>DeafBlind Camp of Maryland</u> was established in 1998 by Deaf Interfaith to provide a safe, fun, barrierfree week for persons who have a significant hearing and vision loss. Bishop Peggy Johnson was its visionary and director. She led camps there, along with Carol Stevens and others, for 10 years until she was elected a bishop.

The camp has grown from six campers the first year to over forty campers currently. Campers have varying degrees of hearing and vision loss; many are totally deaf and blind. In 2015, the DeafBlind Camp of Maryland, Inc. became a 501(c)(3) organization, allowing for tax deductible donations.

CODE PURPLE INFO & UPCOMING TRAINING!

We are building a team of volunteers to help serve our homeless guests for the 2018/2019 cold weather season! Please join us to learn more about Code Purple and how you can get involved. This vital resource is dependent on volunteerism as Code Purple Sussex County is 100% volunteer run. Most of our emergency winter sanctuaries are open each night from December 15th until March 15th. Volunteer spots include: intake, overnight, morning relief, clean-up crews, transportation, laundry and dinner service. (To *Sign Up* for dinner sponsorship and other volunteer opportunities, please use the link found on our website at codepurplesussexcounty.com **Volunteers/Servants!**). Last year we served 150 literally homeless neighbors at our shelters. We served the elderly, families, the infirm, those recently released from prison, and sometimes persons struggling with addiction or persons with mental health not being treated. Each guest is uniquely homeless...each vulnerable...each one matters!

Code Purple opens "on call" once the weather dips down below 32. We call these "bookends" and volunteers will sign up to volunteer <u>if</u> Code Purple is called. However, once December 15th arrives, we have 6 sanctuaries *stay open* regardless of the temperature until March 15th. Our Laurel sanctuary opens every night of January & February. It takes an average of 12 people per night at each site to effectively operate a Code Purple Sussex County Site (we have 11 total certified CPSC Sites). The other sites open as overflow.

That means we have a potential of 132 volunteer spots to fill each night just to provide basic coverage during the season!


