From the desk of the Director of Connectional Ministries

Detours on the Journey By Rev. Dr. Vicki Gordy-Stith

Last week, I hosted the Northeast Jurisdiction Directors of Connectional Ministries, representing ten conferences from nine episcopal areas, from Maine to West Virginia. In the past, we have met in Baltimore and New York, going to museums and attending Broadway shows. What could I do on the Eastern Shore to compete? I decided not to compete but to offer them something they could not get anywhere else—an Underground Railroad Tour and steamed crabs. (Yes, I know you can technically get steamed crabs in Baltimore, but they are not as good.) I borrowed a church van and we set off on our adventure.



About 45 minutes into our trip, before we even arrived at the Harriet Tubman Visitor Center as the first stop on the tour, the van began pouring out smoke. We pulled over, retrieved the fire extinguisher just in case, and opened the hood of the van. My husband, Bo, who served as our driver, saw sparks and more smoke, so we slowly made our way to the nearest town, Easton, Maryland. There, we stopped at an auto repair shop and discovered that it could not be fixed easily, and I began calling car rental places to get us on the road again. Since we had seven passengers, however, no one had anything available. I asked my assistant to call around to other churches, and she hit a brick wall. Then, Bo called St. Mark's UMC in Easton, and they allowed us to borrow their church bus. I thanked God for the connectional system we have.

That connection strengthened when the Uber driver arrived to take Bo to St. Mark's. When he got in, Bo told the driver where he was going and the driver replied that he was a member at St. Mark's but had not been in a long while. Bo shared that my father had served at St. Mark's and it turns out the man had joined when my dad pastored there. During the short ride, Bo had a chance to tell the man that the doors to the church are always open, should he ever wish to return. He replied that he might, seeing as this encounter might be a sign. So, our detour turned out to be a divine encounter.



Along the Underground Railroad, we learned that Harriet Tubman had many detours on her rescue missions and several of these detours resulted in divine encounters. In preparing for the journey, I had read a book, called, *Tubman Travels: 32 Underground Railroad Journeys on Delmarva*, which describes several passages Harriet Tubman had taken. One day, when she was around 11 or 12, she ventured out to the Bucktown Store to pick up supplies for her owners. While there, she encountered a slave attempting to escape and his master in hot pursuit. He caught his slave at the store and asked Harriet to assist him in tying the slave down. She refused, which marked her first public act of resistance, and altered her life.

The slave wiggled free and the master, attempting to stop him, threw a two-pound weight at him. The weight missed the slave and hit Harriet in

the head, splitting open her skull and driving a piece of her shawl into her head. Because she was a slave, they sent her back into the fields immediately with blood rushing down her face and did not allow her to get help until she collapsed. She nearly died and lived forever after with a traumatic brain injury which brought on seizures and vivid visions. Oddly enough, these visions appeared to be from God. Harriet often followed the instructions she received in these visions as she helped others follow the path to freedom. Again, what might seem to be a huge detour on life's journey turned out to be a divine encounter for Harriet.

After Harriet escaped from slavery herself at the age of 27, she knew she could not be free until others also experienced freedom. So, she returned many times to rescue others out of bondage, becoming known as Moses. Often she could hide from those seeking her because they searched for a male Moses, not a small (she was five feet tall), disabled (from her seizures), woman. One other story of a detour on a rescue mission which resulted in a divine encounter involved the largest party she ever led to freedom—11 people. They began their journey in freezing rain, traveling at night and wading in water to avoid detection from the dogs. Several of the people had become weary and she promised them a warm bed and food at the next safe house, where they were to arrive in the morning. Imagine her shock when she arrived at the safe house just before dawn only to discover that the man who had been helping her no longer worked there because of suspicions he was helping runaways. She returned to her party, exhausted and out of ideas.



So, she led them to an island in a marshy creek where they spent the day and she turned to her only resource: prayer. She prayed all day and trusted God to provide for her. Around dusk, Harriet saw a man walking by in Quaker dress. She had never seen him before and he seemed to be mumbling or singing to himself. As he drew closer, she could hear the words: "My wagon stands in the barn-yard of the farm across the way; the horse is in the stable; the harness hangs on a nail."

Could she trust this stranger as her messenger from God? She decided she had nothing to lose. After dark, the group made their way to the farm and found the wagon and horse, as the man described. Additionally, the wagon had been generously filled with food and supplies and straw to keep warm. The runaways traveled in that wagon to the next safe house and onto freedom because of another divine encounter she experienced after a detour. One of her biographers wrote: "But these sudden deliverances never seemed to strike her as at all strange or mysterious; her prayer was the prayer of faith, and she *expected* an answer."

We may in our United Methodist Church feel like we are on a journey which has taken a detour. Yet, I believe, if we pray the prayer of faith like Harriet Tubman, we will discover that these detours contain a divine encounter. And, these divine encounters will lead us on a different path, but one which still lead us to freedom. I invite you to join with me in this prayer of faith for our church as we wrestle with a Way Forward. (See information here.) I also invite you to open the eyes of your heart to what might seem like detours along your day. How might God be inviting you to a divine encounter through those seeming frustrations? How can we treat every encounter we have—every conversation, every email, every casual contact—as an opportunity to share a divine encounter? When we live with such openness, I believe we will experience ourselves as "Connected Christians offering the hope of Jesus Christ to today's world."
