From the desk of our Pastors . . .

My dear friend Pastor Heidi has written another beautiful reflection for the month. Her words are below.

We celebrate Christmas in the "time after the Christmas story," but let's reflect for a moment on what the Bible tells us about the first reactions to it. As the story goes, the prophets of God foretold the coming of the Christ-child. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light: those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined...For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (Isaiah:2,6 NRSV).

Mary was filled with humble wonder as she accepted and contemplated her role in the event. "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word" (Luke 1:38 NRSV). Her cousin, Elizabeth and the unborn John acknowledged him with joy upon hearing Mary's voice. Joseph accepted the responsibility of keeping the baby Jesus safe and raising him. That is the "before" story.

How did the rest of the world react? The story tells us that after the angel messenger delivered the good news to the young shepherds, "suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!'" (Luke 2:13-14 NRSV). The young shepherds hurried from the fields to find the child, shared the good news, and returned to the fields "glorifying and praising God" (Luke 2:20 NRSV). The rest of the world, as represented by the wise men from the East, journeyed from afar, "were overwhelmed with joy" (Matthew 1:10 NRSV) upon finding him, and brought him

gifts. King Herod, was fearful (what if this was true?), and took angry steps to mitigate the threat to his power.

We benefit from living in the next chapters of the Christmas story. As the rest of the world, how will we react? What thoughts, gifts, or talents will we bring to this year's celebration? How can we prepare some best memories for our children, other than some game or message on social media? A useful tool to approach this question is to let your mind wander back to the best Christmas you have experienced: not necessarily the most memorable, but your favorite Christmas. What was the moment that made it the best Christmas? How can we use the elements of that favorite Christmas memory to influence how we approach Christmas this year?

As a child, Christmastime was a huge event. My mother was from tropical Hawaii, and then, she found herself in a land of long winters. As the minister's wife, it was tradition for her to host the congregation in our home. She decked everything out graciously including red and green cellophane on each window panel and votive candles in jars lining the sidewalks. People came in waves; the kitchen was bustling with ladies filling trays of goodies; there were coffee and tea pourers; my parents greeting the guests; and much singing of Christmas carols in the living room.

Then, there were the things to ponder: my father broke with church's tradition of being Santa Claus, explaining that it was his job to tell Jesus' story; my first taste of discrimination when my mother felt that I was type-cast as a Chinese coal digger in the Nutcracker Suite; generosity in the form of my grandfather's box of Christmas pears and Hawaiian candies.

My best Christmas memory, however, was when I would take some time each year to view the completely white ceramic statue of Mary that my mother would place by itself on the buffet with just a few pine greens. When I first viewed it, Mary was looking down on me as I thought she might have viewed her baby.

I wondered, "What was she thinking?" "What would God ask of me?" "Would I be courageous enough to reply, "Here am I"? Later, I wondered, "How many more times during Jesus' life would she look at him like that? How amazing is it that God loved us so much that He gave us His Son? What an impact this tiny baby would make on the world!

The holidays are upon us in this "time after the Christmas story." A time of celebration, anticipation, wonder, and perhaps, we have allowed them to become stressful, overwhelming, and anxious times. The choice is ours to seek out at our core the quiet blessings of Christ's birth and express them as we are able, or to get caught up in the world's whirlwind of all the things and traditions around us.

UMW GENERAL MEETING – DECEMBER CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION





Why blue?

These beautiful paraments are blue, a color increasingly used for Advent in Protestant churches. Blue is the color of royalty to welcome the coming of a King. Blue symbolizes the night sky where the star appeared to announce the birth of Jesus. Blue can also signify the waters of Genesis 1 and the beginning of a new creation.

What do the symbols represent?

The symbol embroidered in the center of the altar parament is the Chi Rho (X P). It is composed of the first two letters in the Greek word Christos. The Greek letters, Alpha (first) and Omega (last) which flank the Chi Rho,



symbolize Jesus as the Christ who has come and will come again, as well as the continuity of God's presence in human history.

CHRISMON ORNAMENTS

Many years ago, Marge Steiner volunteered to create these needlepoint symbols for the tree in the Sanctuary. Several women worked on them using white, gold and silver threads, representing the liturgical colors of Christmas. What we have are many reminders of the symbols of our faith. How many can you spot on our tree?

Chi Rho (X P) are the first two letters of "Christ" in Greek.

The **Lion** is a symbol of strength and power. Jesus is the Mighty Counselor. The **Heart** represents of love of God, sent into the world at the birth of Jesus.

The **Triangle** represents the Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirirt.

Precious **Oil** was one of the gifts brought by the Three Wise Men who came to worship the Baby Jesus.
