From the desk of our Pastors . . .

I need your help and I thank you in advance. I am collecting recipes for foods that can be prepared ahead of time, then frozen, and reheated quickly for family meals. There are only two caveats to my request. The first is that they have to be gluten free or, if there is flour in the recipe, that it can be replaced with gluten free flour. The second is that it only be for sized for two-six servings since it will likely only be Michael and me enjoying it. While we both love leftovers, we won't be able to make it through a dish that serves 20.

So why am I asking? Because beginning on June 2 and continuing through August 16, I will be completing my Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) training. This means that in addition to my church duties, I will also have to spend 40 hours per week for 10 weeks doing class-type study and clinical visitations in medical settings under the direction of the College of Pastoral Supervision and Psychotherapy. To break it down, I will spend every Tuesday and every other Thursday, from 9:00-5:00, on my computer doing a skype class. In addition, I need 30 hours every week, split between the hospital and hospice, working directly with patients.

My loving and supportive husband has already figured out that for those 10 weeks I'm going to be 1) gone a lot, including evenings and 2) exhausted when I am home. I probably won't be seeing much, if any, of Chris over the summer. Both those realizations make me sad as I don't want my family to suffer. So, I'm trying to plan ahead, get prepared for the craziness of two full time jobs, and still find ways to be as normal as possible with things like family

meals. Thus my request!

For those of you wondering why I am doing this — it's a requirement for ordination. (Need I say more?) I do want to say a very special thank you to the SPRC for their support in allowing me to do this online. Otherwise I'd be making trips to Christiana for classroom training and I'd be working at Christiana Hospital. By doing it online I can do my clinical hours at Bayhealth here in Milford or at the Delaware Hospice near the Boys & Girls Club. It will also make getting home at night a lot easier and much safer since there will not be as many miles to drive. Thank you to the entire committee for your support in this matter.

I know this will be a nutty summer, but I also know it is what I need to do to live into my call from God. Proverbs 16:3 reminds us to "Commit to the Lord whatever you will do, and He will establish your plans." I am committed to serving Him and now my plans include 400 hours of additional summer work. With His help, and your support, I hope to bring Him honor and glory forever.



From the desk of the Bishop

The Cross of Chris

In a recent posting from Scripture Union "Daily Encounter" the death of Christ on the cross was described this way: "The cross will not be the brutal victory of Jesus' enemies in a fatal power game but rather an offering for others. God's power exceeds death." (April 10, 2019). It seems to me that people who look upon the cross have these two choices always before them. The world, with its obsession with power, sees Jesus' death as a tragic loss for a martyr who was on the wrong side of a religious argument. However, the eyes of faith see it as God's offering of love for the whole suffering world so that all may be forgiven, all might experience the "come along side" grace of God. I trust that we in the household of faith view the cross with those eyes. This is the thing that United Methodists can agree on! Jesus died for all and the offering of forgiveness goes on and on. Sharing that passion and resurrection Good News is the point of church in the first place.

However, the pull of the "world" on us is strong. Our human desire to "win," to beat our enemies, to be "right" sometimes screams louder than the call of Christ to "take up our cross" in humble submission and service. Christianity is a call to "downward mobility," humility, love of enemies, and sacrifice. The world can look at that as pure insanity and being a "loser." The true church has always been counter cultural that way.

On this Holy Week, to truly observe a blessed Good Friday is to commit ourselves once again to the mystery of God dying for his creation, for the irony of death being the way to true life, poverty being the way to riches, and to follow in the footsteps of one who gave his all out of love.

This is expressed so well in this simple hymn: "My Master was So Very Poor" by Harry Lee (Hymntime.com). It is a call to us to do the same.

My Master was so very poor, a manger was His cradling place
So very rich my Master was, Kings came from far to gain His grace
My Master was so very poor and with the poor He broke the bread
So very rich my Master was that multitudes by him were fed
My Master was so very poor, they nailed Him naked to a cross
So very rich my Master was He gave His all and knew no loss.

Investment Committee Report to the Church

Earlier in 2018, the Treasurer of Avenue Methodist Church, Ed Steiner, informed the Board of Trustees that according to the Book of Discipline paragraph 2355.5, "the Board of Trustees shall receive and administer all bequests made to the local church: shall receive and administer all trusts: shall invest all trust funds of the local church."

When the Trustees realized that investments were their responsibility, an Investment Committee was formed as a sub-committee of the Board of Trustees.

The members of the committee are Greg Abbott, Jim Clendaniel, Jack Dickerson, Carolyn Humes, Gene Sharp, Glenn Stevenson and Lloyd Webb. At the first meeting in December, Carolyn Humes was voted Chairman of the committee.

The Committee was tasked with following the Book of Discipline guidelines, which requires the review of the Investment Policy (ours is dated 1998), coordination of Avenue's investment accounts (not involving the operating accounts) and consider the best decisions for our church's future.

In addition to being sensitive to the socially responsible guidelines endorsed by the Peninsula Conference, we felt that it was incumbent upon the committee to develop recommendations that are based upon prudent and sound business principles. To that end we asked all of the entities interviewed to develop investment strategies that would:

Maximize our investments

Maximize principal safety

Be sensitive to the conference guidelines

Access to funds in an emergency

In addition, we asked them to identify benchmark indexes to which the committee could fairly compare their results. With that in mind, eight different entities were interviewed, as listed below. Four had to be eliminated, as explained individually. We ultimately decided that it would be prudent to divide the portfolio between two firms.

The second meeting was held on Jan 3, 2019. By now, we knew that Avenue's Endowment fund and the Bach fund was invested with Mid-Atlantic Methodist Foundation, with the money being held and managed by Fulton Bank in Lancaster, PA. This was the majority of Avenue's funds. Morgan Stanley was holding the recent gift from Jo Wood, following the authorization given in the May 16, 2018 Church Council minutes.

In order to familiarize the committee members with the working of the Foundation, our Associate Pastor Wendy Butterworth and retired Rev. John Van Tine, both of whom had been involved with the Foundation at their previous churches, were invited to explain their knowledge and experiences.

They were followed by the 2 representatives from Morgan Stanley, to present their recommendations for Avenue's account. A 60/40 division of large cap growth/large cap value and laddered Treasury securities was recommended, with the Methodist social values in place.

In addition to Morgan Stanley, we were considering mutual funds that can be purchased without the benefit of a brokerage firm or bank. Most of them, for example the American Funds, which is a very reputable Family of Fund, have a 2.5% upfront fee, plus .8% internal management annual fee. Many of the mutual funds are not socially responsible, in order to increase the yield, they have the "Philip Morris" type of investments as part of their portfolio. Mutual funds are "set in stone", meaning that the investments in the funds cannot be adjusted to suit the individual. The committee rejected mutual funds.

Another possibility mentioned to us by a financial advisor was Strategic Income Bonds. They have these components - bank loans mortgages, floating rate debt, High-Yield Debt, Term & Revolving Loans, Sovereign Bonds, Foreign Developed-Markets Debt, Emerging-Markets Debt, Top-Level ETFs, Futures, Options & Swaps. These are not investment grade instruments, but was in fact an example of giving up quality for yield. The committee did not support that type of investment.

The next meeting was held 2 weeks later on Jan.16th. The Mid-Atlantic Foundation representatives, (Jack Brooke and Rob Morgan), Edward Jones and Merrill Lynch were invited to make presentations.

In the meantime, committee members explored two Financial Planners (Insurance agents), and a firm that the State of Delaware uses – SEI Investments -- one of the 3 companies who manages Delaware Land and Water Conservation Trust Fund (\$50M). (The other 2 are Morgan Stanley and JP Morgan). The church did not meet their minimum threshold of \$25M.

In all, 8 different companies were screened. 4 did not have the suitable parameters for our needs, the other 4 were then further analyzed. Two were eliminated because of high fees. Edward Jones, expected our committee to choose and manage the investments instead of them. That was not acceptable. Another firm was unable to set the account holdings with social responsibility as recommended by the Methodist Church.

With all of this analysis and background, the committee used the following criteria to arrive at a recommendation: fees, returns and smaller details. After the analysis was complete, the two firms that rose to the top were Morgan Stanley and Merrill Lynch. Their fees were the same and lowest of all, their return on investment was the highest and their actual investments in the account were known to us. Banks, such as Fulton, create their own propriety funds, only identified as Large Cap Growth, Large Cap

Value, International and such. The investor does not know the identity of the companies making up the fund.

The committee hereby recommends that Jo Wood's gift stay in Morgan Stanley and be managed by a professional money manager, using the Methodist social values, with 60% in high quality equities and 40% in laddered US Treasuries. The committee also recommends that the Endowment and Bach funds be invested with Merrill Lynch, with similar parameters. This will require the transfer of those accounts from the Mid-Atlantic Foundation.


