From the desk of our Pastors . . .

Another Halloween has come and gone. I admit that I was starting to get confused on which towns were scheduling their trick-or-treat nights on which nights. In Millsboro, we actually had the kids come on October 31 but I know in Harrington, for example, it got switched to Saturday. But either way, we estimate that we had about 400 kids come for candy. My husband and I sat in lawn chairs in the driveway and passed out Hershey bars and Tootsie pops.

What we didn't hand out were my favorite Halloween candies – Dots. If you are not familiar with Dots, they are like a gum drop. They are chewy fruit treats that come in small boxes at this time of year. We can only find them as part of big bags of mixed candy which my loving husband buys every year. He then puts the boxes of Dots aside for me and we give away everything else.

But as the night went on, I started to feel greedy. Perhaps there was another person out there whose favorite candy was also Dots and he/she was not getting any. Or maybe there was a little boy or girl who has never tried them and they were missing out.

And then I remembered what it said in Philippians 2:4. It says, "Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others."

I realize that Halloween candy is a small thing but it could be the start of something bigger. I could withhold Dots today but tomorrow would I hold back on sharing food with the hungry or clothing with someone who needs it? It was a slippery slope I didn't want to go down.

Don't we all have those things in our lives we want to hold for just us? Are there those items we tell ourselves are no big deal if we don't share? Jesus didn't distinguish between the "big" and the "little" things when He blesses us. We should not either.

In this way we bring honor and glory to God forever and ever.

All Saints Day

The Church calendar includes “[All Saints Day](#)” on November 1 each year to remember truly faithful Christians who have gone before us and to contemplate and perhaps even emulate their heroic lives. One of the benefits of my time serving on [the Roman Catholic-United Methodist dialogue](#) team has been a new appreciation for the saints and martyrs and their many feast days.

At the very first meeting I attended in 2016 at the St. John's Abbey (a Community of Benedictine Monks) in Collegeville, Minnesota, I saw the actual remains of [Saint Peregrine](#), who refused to worship the Roman emperor and was martyred in the year 192. His body is covered with jewels and a white cloth as it lay in a glass coffin.



Recently I learned about [Saint Lucy](#) when I observed a picture of a young girl holding a tray with two eye balls. The priest on the dialogue team explained that this saint was also a martyr who lived in Syracuse, Sicily. She died during the Diocletianic Persecution in 304 AD because she refused to marry, due to a vow of purity she made to God.



Lucy came from a family with much wealth, but as part of her Christian virtue, she distributed much of her gold and jewels to help the poor. The man to whom she was pledged in marriage was none too pleased about this “squandering” of her wealth that he expected to receive. So he turned her into the governor for punishment. The governor in turn demanded that Lucy burn sacrifices to the emperor. This she refused to do and was condemned to death.

According to legend, the soldiers who were instructed to execute her could not move her, even with a team of oxen. Then they tried to burn her, but the flames would not consume her body. Finally they gouged out her eyes and thrust a sword down her throat, and she died.

St. Lucy is often represented in Scandinavian Advent festivals as a young girl dressed in white and wearing a crown of evergreen with burning candles. She is always carrying a basket of bread. This is reminiscent of Lucy's distribution of food to the poor and to those hiding in the catacombs. The candles on her head are there to light her way in the darkness and leave her hands free to hold as much bread as possible.

This charming account of St. Lucy is still worth pondering today as we approach our observance of "All Saints Day." Lucy made a promise to God and kept it! Like Peregrine, she refused to worship the emperor. For that, she was willing to sacrifice her life through death by torture.

Lucy also had a heart for the poor and those who were being persecuted. She gave generously to them, which also led to her persecution and death.

Still today, the light of Lucy's wreath of candles shines for us saints who yet walk the earth seeking to serve others and to worship only God. Each day we proclaim our faith and devotion to God by our words and our actions. Each day we have the opportunity to give generously and sacrificially to those in need.

Living the Christian life has never been easy. But as we remember the lives of devoted saints that have gone before us, we are grateful and encouraged that their holy example cheers us on for higher levels of service and sacrifice.

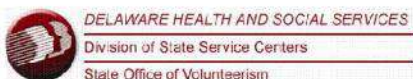

Information to start thinking about

Find a Shoebox

Start with an **average-size cardboard or plastic shoebox**. If you want to wrap it, **cover the box and lid SEPARATLY**. OR, use a church-provided box found in the foyer on the dates above -- these are not to be wrapped.

Girls or Boys?

Decide whether you will pack a box for a girl or a boy, and the age category: 2–4, 5–9, or 10–14. The brochure contains labels for the gender and age of a child. Cut out your choice, check the age group and adhere to the top of the box.

Fill with Gifts

Select a medium to large “wow” item such as a soccer ball with pump or stuffed animal or doll, then fill with other fun toys, hygiene items, and school supplies. (We will provide you with a list of gift ideas.) Local Dollar Stores are a great place to start. **Remember, no liquids, toothpaste, gum, candy, used or damaged items, war-related items, seeds, food, liquids or lotions, medications, vitamins, breakable items, glass containers, aerosol cans, or anything that can melt in hot climates.**

Pray

Most importantly, pray for the child who will receive your gift. You can also include a personal note and photo.

All boxes must include \$9

After filling your box, make out your **check payable to Samaritan's Purse**, then complete the front of the envelope found in your brochure (you can use Avenue United Methodist Church, 20 N. Church St., Milford, DE 19963 instead of your own personal information) -- place inside the box. Your \$9 helps with shipping to over 100 countries where millions of shoeboxes are distributed. Your donation also provides *The Greatest Gift Gospel* booklets, which are written in the children's language and distributed along with shoebox gifts.

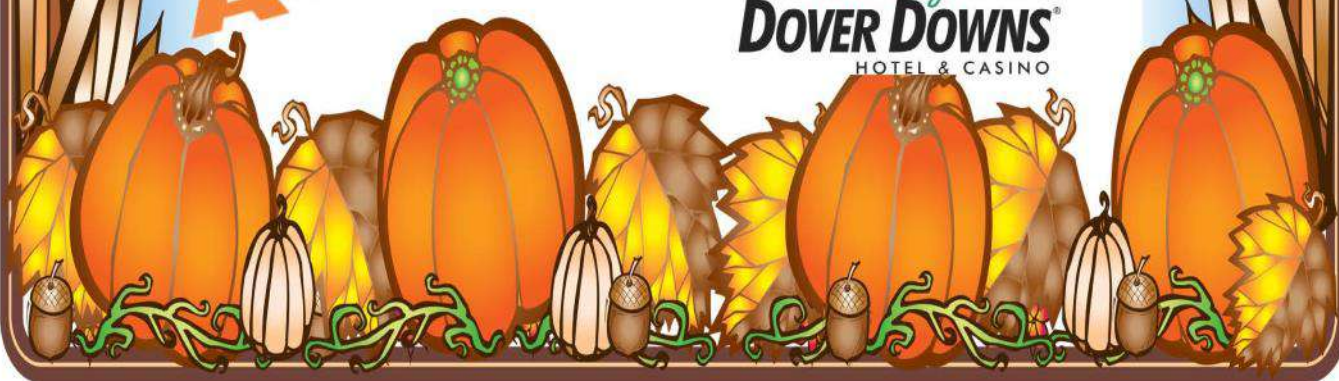

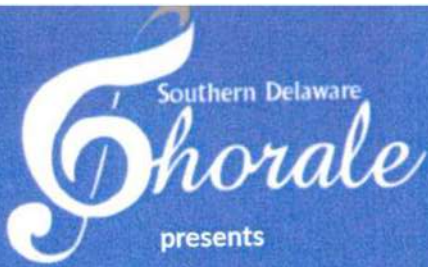
