Once again my friend Pastor Heidi has beautiful words I would like to share with you. Here is her December meditation.

Some friends and I were talking about how much we enjoy the traditional hymns, especially around the holidays. New praise songs are expressive and inspiring, but there is something about the melodies, harmonies, and the words of the traditional hymns that fill our hearts. As we enter this Advent Season, the hymn that I find myself constantly humming is the 6th century, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." The title itself captures my heart. As we sing "O Come, O Come," we express our yearning and our certain hope for the baby, Jesus, who came to us, the Christ who is with us now, and the Christ who is to come.

Throughout time, humankind has named the people and things that make up our world. Most of the time, a name is simply a way to identify someone or something. When it comes to our children, sometimes we give them a family or friend's name. Sometimes, we like the sound of it, or like a name beginning with the letter "D" or "J." Sometimes, we deliberately name our children with words that have meaning. Do you know why you were given your name? Does it have a special meaning? If it has a meaning, does the meaning express your parents hopes for you? Or define you in some way?

The Gospel according to Matthew begins with Jesus' wonderful and colorful genealogy to demonstrate how He is descended from Abraham and from David. When the genealogy arrives at Joseph, the husband of Mary of whom Jesus was born, it proclaims that Jesus is called Christ (Matthew 1:1-16). Following the long list of

names, that proclamation in verse 16 is a huge, astounding, precious, and joyful leap into God's divine mystery. The chapter also describes how Jesus' name is declared by an angel of the Lord to Joseph when the angel appeared to Joseph in a dream and commanded, "you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21 RSV).

Like the names, Jacob, John and Elizabeth, the Hebrew name, Jesus, was fairly common at the time. The name Jesus, however, means "The Lord is salvation" or "Yahweh is salvation." The name Jesus tenderly identifies the child as the Son of man; the meaning of the name underscores His identity as the Christ, Son of God. The name Christ in Hebrew is "Messiah." As the Son of God, Christ delivers us from our sins through love and divine compassion, and fulfills the Isaiah 7:14 prophecy. As Matthew recounts: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel, which means 'God is with us." (Matthew 1:23).

Jesus has other titles included in the hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" such as "Day-spring," which alludes to Easter, and "Desire of nations" to "bind all peoples in one heart and mind; [and]...Fill the whole world with heaven's peace." The hymn "There's Something About That Name" by the Gaithers (1991) is a newer song about the power of Jesus' name. As we sing "Jesus, Jesus, Jesus; there's just something about that name" we are transported to that place where we know that God is with us now and forevermore.

Also consider perhaps the most powerful song about Jesus' name: "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" with the beginning lyrics: "All hail the power of Jesus' name, Let angels prostrate fall; Bring forth the royal diadem, and crown Him Lord of all." Surely, Advent is a time of joyful celebration that God loved us so much that He gave us Jesus who is Christ to save us.

Sweet Potato Rolls

The parking lot was full when I arrived at Nelson's UMC in Hebron, Maryland. The annual "Sweet Potato Roll Sale" was in full swing on that crisp fall day in late October. For many years the members of the church work for an entire week preparing for this fundraiser that garners over \$30,000 annually for their many mission projects. Some people actually take a week of vacation from their secular employment to help out. I came to visit the church

on "pick up" day for a promised gift of two dozen of these highly-coveted home-made delights. I learned that some people who have moved out of the area drive long distances to the church each year to continue to make their purchases.

The pastor, Rev. Dr. Becky Collison, explained that the whole church gets involved in this process. There are those who cook, peel, mix, rollout, cut, butter, package, label, and sell. The day I was there the fellowship hall was filled with church folks engaged in roll-making and the room was buzzing with a spirit of joy and cooperation. Everyone was using their talents to accomplish this great work of making 4,900 dozen or 58,800 rolls (all of which had been pre-ordered and many had to be turned away). People were arriving at their assigned pick-up time and some were purchasing quite a few dozen. They said they would freeze them and bake them for Thanksgiving Dinner. These rolls were a family tradition during the holidays.

The curious thing about these rolls is that they are square and not round as one would expect. For years the church folks made round rolls but at some point, they realized that they could make them more efficiently if they were square and placed in a



rectangular pan and scored. The new shape took some getting used to but some ingenious member of the church made a contraption that actually scores the slab of sweet potato dough and the speed of the production took off. After all, a square roll tastes the same as a round roll. The benefits of the new shape outweighed the need for it to adhere to tradition.



In churches, we have a saying "we've never done it that way before." Sadly that attitude keeps us from doing something new and better that the Lord is calling us to do. Our ministries and missions are good but sometimes they need a creative new edge, perhaps using some new talent, new kinds of outreach, more diversity, a broader reach. Nelson UMC uses some of its profits from the roll sale to fund an after-school program for children at risk in the community and the whole town is experiencing the benefits of this ministry. They have also paid for the installation of a wheelchair ramp and have donated to a number of overseas mission projects. What new thing can you be doing at your church? How can you "sing to the Lord a NEW song?" (Psalm 96:1) Who does God want you to reach for Jesus Christ that requires you to change the way you do things? I know a church that does Vacation Bible School the whole day on that Saturdays before school starts so that parents are free to go out shopping. They have doubled their attendance. Many churches are beginning to use credit-card machines to accept donations because increasingly people do not carry cash or checkbooks. There is a church in Texas that has installed washers and dryers in their education building to help the homeless population have clean clothes. Some of our churches are studying their carbon footprint and are beginning to use china dishes and cloth tablecloths instead of disposable paper and plastic products.

The possibilities are endless. Our God is a God of new ideas and longs for us to make new ways for people to experience divine love. "Behold I am doing a new thing. Now it springs up, do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." (Isaiah 43:19) May you follow the example of the square sweet potato roll-makers at Nelson's UMC and go out to start something new!

CHRISMON ORNAMENTS

Many years ago, Marge Steiner volunteered to create these needlepoint symbols for the tree in the Sanctuary. Several women worked on them using white, gold and silver threads, representing the liturgical colors of Christmas. What we have are many reminders of the symbols of our faith. How many can you spot on our tree?

Chi Rho (X P) are the first two letters of "Christ" in Greek.

A **Fish** represents the first letter in Greek of the titles of Jesus (Jesus, Christ, Son of God, Savior) which spell the Greek word for "fish", (icquV, ichthus).

The **Crown** symbolizes the fulfillment of the prophecy of the Savior's birth, and Jesus as the Son of God and Prince of Peace.

The **Star** represents the sign God placed in the heavens to guide the Three Wise Men to Jesus.

While the holidays are considered a joyous time of the year, for some it can be a very difficult and depressing time of the year.

What are the signs and symptoms of depression?

Sadness is only one small part of depression and some people with depression may not feel sadness at all. Different people have different symptoms. Some symptoms of depression include:

- · Persistent sad, anxious, or "empty" mood
- · Feelings of hopelessness or pessimism
- · Feelings of guilt, worthlessness, or helplessness
- Loss of interest or pleasure in hobbies or activities
- · Decreased energy, fatigue, or being "slowed down"
- Difficulty concentrating, remembering, or making decisions
- · Difficulty sleeping, early-morning awakening, or oversleeping
- Appetite and/or weight changes
- · Thoughts of death or suicide or suicide attempts
- Restlessness or irritability
- Aches or pains, headaches, cramps, or digestive problems without a clear physical cause and/or that do not ease even with treatment

Does depression look the same in everyone?

No. Depression affects different people in different ways. For example:

Women have depression more often than men. Biological, lifecycle, and hormonal factors that are unique to women may be linked to their higher depression rate. Women with depression typically have symptoms of sadness, worthlessness, and guilt.

Men with depression are more likely to be very tired, irritable, and sometimes angry. They may lose interest in work or activities they once enjoyed, have sleep problems, and behave recklessly, including the misuse of drugs or alcohol. Many men do not recognize their depression and fail to seek help.

Older adults with depression may have less obvious symptoms, or they may be less likely to admit to feelings of sadness or grief. They are also more likely to have medical conditions, such as heart disease, which may cause or contribute to depression.

Younger children with depression may pretend to be sick, refuse to go to school, cling to a parent, or worry that a parent may die.

Older children and teens with depression may get into trouble at school, sulk, and be irritable. Teens with depression may have symptoms of other disorders, such as anxiety, eating disorders, or substance abuse.


December 22nd during 9:30 a.m. service
