We are in the home stretch for the 2020 Presidential Election marked by the first debate held last night. Campaign text messages and phone calls are increasing. There is an increased amount of angst being peddled by media outlets and talking heads based on their political bias. Over the last several weeks in worship, we've been talking about how to live a life that is shaped by Jesus. With that said, how do we prepare for the elections in a way that reflects Jesus?

- No political party fully encapsulates the teachings of Jesus. No candidate is "God's chosen" candidate. Each party and candidate are deeply flawed because of sin. As Christians, we must look at each issue and candidate through the lens of the teachings of Jesus.
- Democrats/Republicans are not the enemy. As Christians, we should seek to avoid polarization and the labeling that occurs in the culture at large. We must remember that our identity as Christians is more important than our political party. Paul reminds us in Ephesians 6:12 that "our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms."
- Do not do the work of the enemy by spreading lies, innuendo, fear, or accusations.
- Listen to those who are different than you. Try to seek understanding and to build bridges rather than finding ways to "win arguments."
- As Christians, we should not gloat over victories, but serve one another out of love. When candidate "A" wins the election, think about all the people who will be discouraged, depressed, saddened, joyful, or smug by his victory. Take time to pray genuinely and humbly for them. Likewise, when candidate "B" wins, do the same for those experience

the same range of emotions. Continue to pray for your own heart, as well.

• As those who believe in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we will not fear tomorrow, nor will we cause others to fear. In this life, we are called to do the work of redemption that God is bringing about. This will be unfinished work until the final resurrection. We have hope, then, that God will make all things new.

There are certainly other ways that Christians can prepare for the coming election, but this is a starter list. Let us repent of the sin and evil in our lives and in our nation. Let us be guided by the Holy Spirit to pray for one another and to show love towards all people, including those different from us. Let us pray for Donald Trump, Joe Biden, and their running mates that they would respond to the Spirit's movement in their own lives.

I learned a little about being a Methodist and a lot about the love of Jesus in action in the tiny one room Methodist church where I grew up in rural NE Pennsylvania. My first Sunday School teacher was the older sister of my friend, Esther. We memorized the books of the Bible and shared many Bible stories. Not only was she our Sunday School teacher; she also taught us to ice skate. She became a WAC—we weren't sure what that meant, but we knew she was special.

Another Sunday School teacher was the mom of my other friend, Julie. Again, not only was she our teacher; she was also our 4-H leader and taught us sewing during our meetings at her house.

Then there was Ellen Sheffler, who was always there. She acted as the SS superintendent, but she also made sure the furnace was up and running on Sundays and kept the place clean. She lived across the road from our little two room, grades 1-6, elementary school. She let us come across the road and pump drinking water from her hand pump. When I think of the "poor widow" story I think of Ellen.

Widowed as long as I knew her, she always had a nickel for the collection plate. I'm afraid sometimes we snickered when we heard it drop—ugh!

And then, "Aunt" Mae Harvey, our neighbor on the farm next door. Aunt Mae was, hands down, my mother's best friend. She was with Mom in her bedroom long before Dr. Davenport arrived for the birth of five of the six of us. (Because she was 40 when #6 arrived, Doc insisted Mom go to the recently-opened hospital—she was not happy!) But Aunt Mae also was president of the Ladies' Aid. I wanted to be just like her because she got to call people to ask them to "furnish" particular dishes for church dinners. Oh, if she could see me now as I make my begging calls for food for funeral receptions!

Beginning when we were around 12 and through our teen years, we had a pretty active MYF. We could never afford a "real" pastor, so we had a succession of supply pastors shared with two other churches. However, the one who started the MYF is the only one I really remember. Several of us were confirmed during his years. He had a gift for preaching so that I felt I could see and hear Jesus in his sermons, and he really cared about us young people.

About that time, Bob Harvey (no relation to Aunt Mae), our pianist, offered to start a choir. I didn't realize until later that he was really a pretty awful pianist, but again, he loved us, made time for us, and taught us as much as he could about singing in a group.

My dad was a worker bee. I seem to remember he was treasurer for a period of time. But if a manual job needed to be done, he could be counted on to help with it. Because he had been up for hours milking cows before church, I don't believe he ever heard a whole sermon; he was usually asleep by then. But he did show up!

My dad gave me the nature bug without realizing it. I remember the night he asked me if I would like to stay out in the barn to watch my first calf being born. I was nine; it was amazing. One of my jobs was to walk out through the pastures during the spring and summer to bring the cows home to be milked. From the highest point of our farm, there is a good view of the small mountain that is the backdrop for the town eight miles away. I still love time in the mountains and nature is my spiritual home. Whether I'm paddling a local river, biking or hiking a local trail or one in a distant state, it's in nature that I feel the presence of the Holy Spirit most profoundly.

I cannot forget Irv. When I announced that I wanted to be married at that little church, he gathered a group of the farmers together and they gave the interior a fresh coat of paint! No one could remember the last wedding there—most people just went to a minister's house or if they wanted a larger wedding, they went downtown. They were pleased and wanted to show Russ and me that they cared.

I was there last November for the memorial service of Peggy Harvey, daughterin-law of Aunt Mae, and the love shown that day was palpable. Several hundred people arrived at some point to pay their respects to her. Using their comments and my own, I spoke for the four of us siblings who left the area after we graduated from high school about Peggy's and the community's influence on us. I also thanked those whose spirits could be felt there that day. The people in that little church helped shape my world view, supported me early in my journey of faith, and helped me become and remain a United Methodist.

Music, my love for nature, especially mountains, Methodism and showing love through action, my passions today, and the foundation was set all those years ago in that tiny Pennsylvania church and community.



Tetanus is different from other vaccine-preventable diseases because it does not spread from person to person. The bacteria are usually found in soil, dust, and manure and enter the body through breaks in the skin — usually cuts or puncture wounds caused by contaminated objects.

Today, tetanus is uncommon in the United States, with an average of about 30 reported cases each year. Nearly all cases of tetanus are among people who did not get all the recommended tetanus vaccinations. This includes people who have never received a tetanus vaccine and adults who don't stay up to date on their 10-year booster shots. The first sign is most commonly spasms of the muscles of the jaw, or "lockjaw."

Symptoms of Tetanus

- Jaw cramping
- Sudden, involuntary muscle tightening (muscle spasms) often in the stomach
- Painful muscle stiffness all over the body
- Trouble swallowing
- Jerking or staring (seizures)
- Headache
- Fever and sweating
- · changes in blood pressure and heart rate

Tetanus bacteria can infect the body through breaks in the skin caused by:

- wounds contaminated with dirt, poop (feces), or spit (saliva)
- · Wounds caused by an object puncturing the skin (puncture wounds), like a nail or needle
- Burns
- · Crush injuries
- Injuries with dead tissue
- Clean superficial wounds (when only the topmost layer of skin is scraped off)
- Surgical procedures
- Insect bites
- Dental infections
- · Compound fractures (a break in the bone where it is exposed)
- · Chronic sores and infections
- Intravenous (IV) drug use
- Intramuscular injections (shots given in a muscle) <u>https://www.cdc.gov/tetanus/about/index.html</u>


