There is a statistic that says 250 pastors leave the ministry every month. I suspect that in 2020 and the coming years that this number will only increase as a result of the stress of the pandemic, the polarization in our communities and churches, and a culture that expects pastors to work without rest. This isn't just pastors as teachers and other professions are under higher levels of stress and frustration that lead to mental and emotional breakdowns.

One of the best way to encourage anyone is to tell them how much we appreciate that person. Several years ago, I tracked down the addresses of people who made an impact in my life at church and at camp in order to tell them the impact that they have made in my life. The results were surprising as the simple note of gratitude encouraged some and reaffirmed others that God was using their ministry in fruitful ways.

October has been designated Pastor Appreciate Month since 1992 as a way to say "thank-you" for the clergy people who serve our churches. In a church like Avenue, with multiple pastors and staff, it is more accurate to call the month "Staff Appreciation Month" as the ministry of the church is a team effort and not dependent on just a single pastor or staff person.

happens that is excellent here at Avenue, it is the result of our team that works together! Will does a great job of building relationships that point to Jesus with our youth while helping us move forward with technology in worship. My journey started as a small child. My mother taught me about God and Jesus. She taught me how to pray. And we had grace at dinner and bedtime pavers. Mom also made sure I went to Sunday school. Dad wasn't one for church but I knew he believed and was a Christian. There were 3 of us kids. Me, the youngest, and my two older brothers. Mom let us pick the church. When we moved from Washington state to Pittsburgh, PA when I was 4, my brothers (in junior high and high school) picked a nearby church. I don't recall the denomination. I went to Sunday school and they went to church services with Mom. Later, we went to a Luthern church down the highway a ways from our development. I started in choir in  $2^{nd}$ grade and went to Sunday School every Sunday. I memorized Bible verses and the books of the bible. We got ribbons for our Bibles for every verse we learned. I remember my Bible had lots of ribbons. My mother was raised Brethren at the turn of the 19th century in McPherson, KA. She had some very strict ideas about the Bible...it was a sin to write in it or drop it! I was pretty much a little afraid of handling it until I got to high school. By then we had moved a lot. First to a farm in Kansas when I was 9 and a small ranch in Southwest Missouri when I was 13. In those years there weren't kids my age to play with and my horses, nature, and my Bible were my go to for my spirituality. I think that's very true today. Horses have a pretty Christian idea of how to be. Treat me like you'd want me to treat you (and I will treat you the same)! They always center me on what's important in relationships. In Missouri we had finally found a non-fundamentalist, non-rural church. We went to a Presbyterian church in the suburbs of Springfield, MO. I liked it. I asked the pastor to be baptized and confirmed. And there I professed my faith. Once we got to Massachusetts when I was 14, the pastor of 1st Congregational Church wanted me to be in his confirmation class and join when the other kids did. I wasn't sure why but went along with it. I learned a lot. I joined the youth group. It was a college town in the 60's and the pastors gave very intellectual sermons. I got interested in reading Paul Tillich and Dietrich Bonhoeffer from them. So, by the time I graduated high school, I had a teen's faith. It was firm, but not mature, and somewhat intellectual. In college, I married at 19 and continued as a married woman. My then husband was raised American Baptist but we worked our way through college by being youth pastors at Mansfield Congregational Church. I felt at home there as I'd come from a Congregational (United Church of Christ) church. My marriage was a rocky one and when it broke up, I applied to Andover Newton Seminary in Newton, MA.

They rejected me. I was hurt and angry and stayed away from the church until I had Adam and my new husband Jon and I had moved to Delaware. (God knew best. I hate committee meetings and administrative paperwork and would have made a poor pastor). Jon wasn't one for church, so Adam and I went to the New Ark United Church of Christ in Newark, DE. I finished my Master's degree and Adam got a taste of church and Sunday school. Then I went to Med school at 37 years old. I didn't have time for church or much else besides taking care of my son and school. Jon's an amazingly supportive husband and father and we made it through those years. I'd say none the worse for the wear, but that would be a stretch. My faith in God deepened a little in med school. I was enthralled with how expansive and how submicroscopic the world is. It awed and amazed me that God could create something so vast and so tiny and complex at the same time!

But my faith didn't really grow a lot until we came to Avenue. We had moved to Lower Delaware after my residency and I took a medical staff position at Nanticoke Memorial Hospital and I went into private practice. I had a crisis of both faith and profession when 2 patients committed suicide within two weeks. One I knew well, and one I hadn't met (he was admitted on my unit at Nanticoke, but I had yet to meet him). I took a week of vacation time to get my head together and came to the church to pray. Earle Baker was pastor just appointed pastor then and we'd been attending for about a year. Well, when I was praying, Earle walked into the sanctuary. I had been praying for God to put someone in my path who could help me sort out my doubts and fears when he had walked in . So, I asked him if we could talk. That began a time of growth in my faith that has continued ever since. Earle had me read the Gospels, one a month, and stopped by my office at lunch time to discuss them on his monthly trips to The Methodist Manor House to see parishioners. I studied with Earle for several years and felt my faith expand and grow. Earle was a lot more conservative in his views about some things than I tend to be, but he never tried to force me to see it his way. Together we discussed everything from the Trinity to homosexuality and the state of the world. Earle always let me find my way in my faith, and to find a theology I could match with my experience. I'll be forever grateful for his mentorship. In those years, Cilla Maxham recruited me to teach everything from Wellness and Spirituality to the Disciple series. I grew to love Avenue and its members. My mother had always said church was the people and how we act in the world, not the building, and I truly found that at Avenue. I joined the bell choir, and then after I retired, the voice choir. I've been a charter member of the Exploring Your Faith book club for 20 years now. Avenue is very much my church family. I continue to grow in faith as I grow older. And all of you at Avenue have helped me along the way. Thank you.




# Sinus Infection (Sinusitis)

Stuffy nose that just is not getting better? You might have a sinus infection, also called sinusitis. You do not necessarily need an antibiotic for the infection to go away.

What can cause a sinus infection? A Sinus infection occurs when fluid builds up in the air-filled pockets in the sinuses located in the face. When this happens, germs can grow in the sinuses. Most sinus infections occur due to viruses and sometimes they occur due to bacteria.

#### Sinus Infection



When a sinus infection occurs, the sinuses become inflamed and fluid builds up, causing congestion and runny nose.

# Factors that can increase your risk of getting a sinus infection:

- · A previous cold
- Seasonal allergies
- Smoking and exposure to secondhand smoke
- Structural problems within the sinuses (such as growths on the lining of the nose or sinuses, known as nasal polyps)
- A weak immune system or taking drugs that weaken the immune system

# Common symptoms of sinus infections include:

- · Runny nose
- Stuffy nose
- · Facial pain or pressure
- Headache
- Mucus dripping down the throat (post-nasal drip)
- Sore throat
- Cough
- Bad breath

### When should you contact your healthcare provider?

- Severe symptoms, such as severe headache or facial pain.
- Symptoms that get worse after initially improving.
- Symptoms lasting more than 10 days without improvement.
- Fever longer than 3-4 days.

<sup>\*\*</sup>Contact your healthcare provider right away if your child is younger than 3 months old and has a fever of 100.4 °F or higher.



You should also seek medical care if you have had multiple sinus infections in the past year.

### Treatment

Your healthcare provider will determine if you have a sinus infection by asking about symptoms and doing a physical examination. The Healthcare Provider will determine the best treatment for you.

"For some sinus infections, your healthcare provider might recommend watchful waiting or delayed antibiotic prescribing.

- Watchful waiting: Your child's healthcare provider may suggest watching and waiting to see if
  your child needs antibiotics. This gives the immune system time to fight off the infection. If your
  child doesn't feel better after 2–3 days of rest, extra fluids, and pain relievers, the healthcare
  provider may write a prescription for an antibiotic.
- **Delayed prescribing:** Your child's healthcare provider may give an antibiotic prescription but suggest that you wait 2–3 days to see if your child is still sick before filling it."
