I was born to Christian parents in 1943, Somerset, PA. At age two my father was killed by a drunk driver on his way home from work leaving my mother with myself and 9 month old sister. My mother's parents provided for us by stepping in until I was 5 years old. When my mother remarried and two brothers followed. My mother did not work outside the home; she said many times "God did not give these children to me for a babysitter, they are for me".

I never remember not going to church. We went every Sunday to Church of the Brethren and Sunday School. Wednesday evening 2 weeks in the fall every night for revival and a 2 week bible school in June. At age 10, I was taught what it meant to give your live to Christ and I was baptized by total immersion. Communion was a meal with fellow Christians, which included washing one another's feet than receiving the elements. We wore prayer coverings and were taught to always have our head covered at church.

My mother led the music, so we all sang in the choir. She gave all of us the opportunity to take piano/organ lessons at \$1.00 per lesson. I was the only one interested. We had many chores and we made working fun. I still love to work. Idle time was filled with games. My father was a carpenter and made \$1.10 an hour. I didn't know how poor we were until I left home. People at the church would send "hand me down clothes"; a wealthy aunt would clothe us for the holidays and she made our Christmas. I remember all of us picking blueberries along the road and mother making flour puffs and pouring the berries over top and my father ask what else was for supper and she said, "That is it till payday." We had a large garden and my mother canned the vegetables for the year and several fruit trees. We raised 2 pigs and a cow and butchered in the fall for meat for the winter. My grandfather had a chicken farm and supplied us with chicken and eggs. Thinking about how poor we were and yet how very rich we were in

love and spiritual things; the love and devotion of good parents. My step father treated us all the same and I called him Daddy.

Things that would stick out in my mind that mother taught us was 1/10 of your income belongs to the Lord and 1/10 of your time each day belongs to the Lord which is 2 hours and 40 minutes. I remember my parents and grandparents taking 1/10 of their income each week to tithe. In the end, rich relatives left money to care for my parents. God does provide. My father is deceased and mother is 96 years old and in a nursing home. I call her everyday.

The money that was left to me from my father's AA sent me to Frostburg State Teacher College, MD and Cumberland School of Nursing, MD . I left home at age 17 years old. It was a struggle and I had to work hard for I had attended a one room school for 6 years then bussed to town for 7-12 grades.

My grandparents allowed me a dog , "Floppy", and let me keep him there for my father said we did not have enough money for dog food. Floppy got hit by a car and had a broken leg and I nursed him back to health and so at age 12 years old I decided to become a nurse caring for those sick or injured.

I spent 2 years as a Supervisor at a Mental Institution (PA) after graduation than to Kent General Hospital (DE). I worked med-surgery, maternity, emergency room than as House Supervisor for 40 years. I chose to work 11pm—7 am, than 7pm—7am so that I did not need child care and I could go to church on Sundays. I met my husband Paul of 38 years. He was a Delaware State Policeman and retired after 20 years and did building and home repairs. He built the home I live in now. Paul's parents were both ministers and he kept the family in tune with Christian living. Paul died after a 3 year battle of cancer at age 63 years and reunited with his parents in heaven.

We were blessed with a son Christopher, a pharmacist at Kent General Hospital and his wife a Christian Counselor at Delmarva Christian School, living in Millsboro, DE.

I have two grandchildren, Lydia 3rd year student at Regent University, VA and a grandson Noah a senior at Delmarva Christian School.

We prayed for another child, sought adoption and the waiting list was 7 years. I received a telephone call from a second cousin in PA who stated her 14 year old daughter was pregnant; would we be interested in adopting. Oh, how God

answers prayers and we were blessed with Karen Kathleen, named after my mother and grandmother. Karen graduated from the University of Delaware with a hotel and restaurant degree and went on to get a degree in Wine, and than got a second degree which gave her the job as the Wine Rep for the State of Delaware where she has other employees. She married her High school sweetheart at age 33 years old on March 13, 2013. She said, "Mom I think 3 is my lucky number." Her husband has a culinary degree and works in the restaurant industries. They live in Rehoboth and have his and her dogs.

My husband Paul fought his cancer 3 years and after attending the Cancer Center in Colorado and eating no meat, no processed food and nothing with sugar he lost his battle with cancer at age 63 years old and joined his parents in heaven.

Five years later I joined the hospice group and made many friends who had lost their spouses. Going to church alone was hard for me and my future husband Tom said I'll go to church with you. (He attend Whatcoat Methodist Church) That was the beginning of our husband wife relationship. He lost his wife to cancer.

Things I have done were I ran the Marine Marathon (26.2 miles) in Washington, DC twice and while training for the Pittsburgh, PA marathon I suffered a knee injury and my running stopped. I than became a horse rider and trained to be a Mounted Patrol for the State of Maryland and rode for the Olympic Trails, the Scottish Games and Memorial Day Races at Fairhill, MD. We were required to put in 100 hours of patrol time. I did this for 15 years. My horse "Glory" now 25 years old still spirited and we ride frequently.

I have 3 horses and have mentored teenagers in riding and jumping. The first two children I started at age 6 year and 7 year. The 6 year old just graduated from ophthalmology (eye dr) school and practices in Dover. The 8 year old graduated from college in Kentucky and has a degree in horse industry. The next two were Carey Phalem (from Avenue) who graduated from college in Vermont with a degree in animal science, the other girl is in nursing school. The last 2 girls just graduated from high school, Anna Humes (Avenue) and is in nursing school. The other is working and going to college next year. I have spent many hours with these kids on the back of a horse talking to them about drugs and the affects and alcohol and it's affects and keeping Christian values. I believe I have made a difference in their lives.

After Paul's death I retired from the Kent General and applied for a job at the

Veteran's Home. I remember interviewing for the job and they asked me why I had applied and I said I because I think God wants me here, and the Director an Administrator said I want her hired and gave me my choice of positions which I chose night supervisor. Afterwards, I later thought what a stupid answer I have. This job helped me to prepare for retirement after 40 years from a high stress job at Kent General to a much less stress job. I have nursed 54 years, but have enjoyed my retirement caring for my animals—3 horses, 2 dogs and 4 barn cats.

I have really enjoyed the Tuesday Bible Class, learning a lot, serving on SPRC and trustees, my Sunday School Class, singing in the choir, playing organ/piano duets. I served as a proprietor for a Alzheimers Caregiver group for 10 years at Avenue Church. I have been a member for 45 years. I am a member of Giddeon's Auxiliary and Bayhealth Auxiliary.

At each crossroad of my life, God has blessed me. I thank God daily for his blessings.



Antibiotic Use from CDC

Why is it important to Be Antibiotics Aware? Antibiotics save lives. When a patient needs antibiotics, the benefits outweigh the risks of side effects or antibiotic resistance. When antibiotics are not needed, they will not help you, and the side effects could still hurt you. Reactions from antibiotics cause 1 out of 5 medication-related visits to the emergency department.

Antibiotics are not always the answer.

Why does taking antibiotics lead to antibiotic resistance? Any time antibiotics are used, they can cause side effects and lead to antibiotic resistance. Antibiotic resistance is one of the most urgent threats to the public's health. Always remember:

- 1. Antibiotic resistance does not mean the body is becoming resistant to antibiotics; it is that bacteria have become resistant to the antibiotics designed to kill them.
- When bacteria become resistant, antibiotics cannot fight them, and the bacteria multiply.
- 3. Some resistant bacteria can be harder to treat and can spread to other people.

What is the right way to take antibiotics?

If you need antibiotics, take them exactly as prescribed. Improving the way healthcare professionals prescribe antibiotics, and the way we take antibiotics, helps keep us healthy now, helps fight antibiotic resistance, and ensures that these life-saving drugs will be available for future generations.

Talk with your doctor if you have any questions about your antibiotics, or if you develop any side effects, especially diarrhea, since that could be Clostridioides difficile infection (also called C.difficile or C. diff), which needs to be treated. C. diff can lead to severe colon damage and death.

What are the side effects?

Common side effects range from minor to very severe health problems and can include:

- Rash
- Dizziness
- Nausea
- Diarrhea
- Yeast infections

More serious side effects can include:

Clostridioides difficile infection Severe and life-threatening allergic reactions
