2020 Annual Conference Report

The 236th Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference met under a revised format, due to Coronavirus restrictions and concern for the safety of all clergy and laity involved. Through the miracle of Zoom, separate clergy and laity sessions were held on October 24, followed by a joint session on November 13. The Zoom format worked very well, with the added benefit of a \$100,000 cost savings over the usual 3-day live conference.

Attending the conference on behalf of Avenue were Pastor Steve LaMotte, delegates Beth Parker and Barbara Rutt, and alternate delegate Ed Steiner. Avenue ably provided the musical offering for the Laity Session, thanks to Kevin Chamberlain, Harriet Davies, Elaine Devita, Ginny Van Tine, and Susan Newark.

In addition to usual business matters, two major items were presented at Conference, a request to redistrict, and requests from four local churches to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church.

Conference approved the petition to reduce the number of districts from the current 4, Wilmington, Easton, Dover and Salisbury, to 3, Northern, Central and Southern. The shift will result in annual savings of approximately \$300,000. Specific geographic boundaries will be established by Bishop Johnson. Churches should see minimal impact, and every effort will be made to preserve ongoing partnerships between local churches. Most likely Avenue will become part of the Central District.

Conference also approved resolutions allowing 4 churches to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church. The requests came from Antioch, Calvary, Groome, and Nelson. Some background information may be useful to understand the handling of these requests.

In 2019, at a Special Session of General Conference, a plan was authorized by which a local church might, for reasons of conscience regarding issues of human sexuality, ask to sever all ties with the United Methodist Church. Such disaffiliation would be subject to the financial satisfaction of apportionment, outstanding debts, pension and health insurance liabilities. The General Conference authorized this disaffiliation design by the very narrow margin of only 2 votes. The UMC Judicial Council is in the process of determining the constitutionality of the plan. Additionally, when General Conference next meets, tentatively August/September of 2021, the matter may again be considered.

The Pen-Del Annual Conference 2021 spending plan was approved, \$5.1 million, an amount 7% lower than 2020 and reflecting savings to be realized through consolidating 4 districts into 3. Apportionment calculations were set for the upcoming year. It is anticipated that Avenue will experience a reduction of \$4,887 in our 2021 Apportionment.

The Conference Annual Appeal was designated to benefit the following programs: BOOM (Board of Ordained Ministry) scholarships, Congo Partnership, providing clean water, agricultural, educational and medical support, and Salisbury Urban Ministries.

Finally, Conference recognized retiring pastors, including Earle Baker, who faithfully served for many years here at Avenue.

"Many people are experiencing grief during the COVID-19 pandemic. Grief is a normal response to loss during or after a disaster or other traumatic event. Grief can happen in response to loss of life, as well as to drastic changes to daily routines and ways of life that usually bring us comfort and a feeling of stability." Common grief reactions include:

- Shock, disbelief, or denial
- Anxiety
- Distress
- Anger
- · Periods of sadness and crying
- Loss of sleep and loss of appetite

"Some people may experience multiple losses during a disaster or large-scale emergency event. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, you might be unable to be with a loved one when they die, or unable to mourn someone's death in-person with friends and family. These losses can happen at the same time, which can complicate or prolong grief and delay a person's ability to adapt, heal, and recover."<u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/daily-life-coping/stress-coping/arief-loss.html</u>

Together we must understand that the inability to say goodbye to a loved one before they die is difficult. Family and friends miss the last holding of the hands, giving a hug or kiss or just being by their loved one's side to say goodbye. This adds to the grieving process.

COVID-19 has added another dimension to grieving. The grieving of our health care workers. They try to care for their patients in hopes of recovery. When they lose the battle to death, they feel pain and defeat. Watching their patients die alone, even though they try to be with them, is difficult. They grieve for their patients and the patient's family.

We need to work together, love each other, be patient with ourselves as well as each other. We must remember foremost; God is stronger than all of us and He will help us through this challenging time!
