# Making Time for Sabbath

We took our kids on a family trip after Easter Worship. It was much needed as it was my first real time off since the summer. Holy Week is always a load with four worship services in one week, on top of everything else going on in the church and in our family calendar. The winter season brings about its own kind of tiredness and then we have the pandemic which creates a strange weariness that is hard to put a finger on.

One of the challenges of the age that we live in is that we are accessible 24 hours a day. Smart phones have made it easier to do our jobs, but the tradeoff is that we are now available at all hours. When we get up in the middle of the night, there is the temptation to check social media or email. When we wake up in the morning, we can respond to emails before saying good morning to our family or spend time with God. Our bosses and supervisors can text us after hours and expect that we respond. In a busy world, how do we find rest?

In the book of Genesis, God gives us the practice of Sabbath. Sabbath is stopping all work in order to rest, recharge, and to worship. In the Creation account (Genesis 1 & 2), we can see that humans were created to work. Just as God created the earth, humans are called to work to care for the earth. In the same way, just as God rested from work on the seventh day (Genesis 2:1-3) humans are called to observe a day of rest. Moses records the Sabbath command in the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:8-11).

Built into the rhythm of our faith is the idea of work and rest. Too often, we fail to rest, to recharge, and to worship. When we rest, we remember that God rested. When we rest we declare that our identity is more than what we are able to produce. When we rest, we acknowledge that we are not machines. When we rest, we remind ourselves that we are not gods and that the success of the world does not hinge on our constant toil.

In an increasingly virtual world where we can do our work from any place at any time it will become more important for Christians to re-discover the practice of Sabbath. When we practice Sabbath, we are living in resistance to a world that bases our value on what we produce and what we accomplish. In Sabbath, we can rest because we know that our identity is found in God who calls us sons and daughters.

As we seek to live a life of discipleship, how are you practicing Sabbath? What difference would Sabbath make in your life?

### From: Carolyn Humes

My freshman year in high school was 1953-1954. One Sunday evening in October, 1953, the Presbyterian Church here in Milford, presented a Billy Graham film. My friend, who was a member there, invited me to go with her. I can still remember where we sat, watching the film, and the overwhelming feeling I had, that forced me to go forward at the Alter Call afterwards! There was no "thinking about it", or "should I get up and go?" It was GO, loud and clear! That night, at that Alter, I gave my life to Jesus, and been a follower ever since. Also, that night, the feeling was again forceful that I start reading the Bible each night, before turning out the light. (68 years later, time has been moved to earlier in the day.) There's no doubt that God had planned this for me to happen, on that October evening, I just hadn't known it.

That same year, Young Life came to Milford, led by 2 college students from Kings College, located upstate Delaware. The meetings, every Monday night, were held in homes where there was a piano, and often were held in our house because of the piano. Our home was a big one, in the style of those being built in 1898, and the living room was double size. You should have seen how many enthusiastic kids were packed in there every week. At one time, the group totaled close to 75, filled the living room and overflowing. From that group, a Sunday afternoon Bible Study also started.

The summer of 1954, 11 of us went to the Young Life Camp in Colorado. (I'm certain if our parents had seen the broken down bus that we rode in, all the way across country, they would not have allowed us to go!) It was nursed along from West Chester, where we met the rest of the group, until we reached St Louis, when it went into the repair shop! We Delawareans had never felt 102 degree weather before, but we sat under a tree for all the time it took to repair the bus,

and felt it. That was an eye opener!

The meetings, followed by summer camp, created the solid support for us, all the following year. Especially for me, in that it was a continuation that followed my accepting Christ. Unfortunately, Kings College had to close the following year, but we all had been given a firm foundation to uphold us.

All during this time, Harry Humes was serving his 4 years in the Navy followed by 4 years in college. Since he had been born and raised in Milford, as I had, I knew him, but only as my friend's big brother. I don't think I had seen him since 1951, when he went into the Navy, until one summer evening in 1959, I was having dinner in the Post House, on Market St in North Wilmington, and in he walked! . We started dating in the Fall, and married summer of 1960, a year before I graduated from UD June 1961.

There is no doubt in our minds that this had all been planned, long ago by the Master Planner! Everything was just too perfect. My Christian husband had been chosen and was waiting for me to grow up!

We have been Blessed with 4 wonderful "children". (Can you still call your offspring who are ages between 52 and 59, "children"?), grandchildren and greatgrand children. God is in all their lives too. Truly Blessed!
